## STUDENT SUCCESS CENTER

A Physical Space to Maximize Every Student's Potential

The center will house all of the new student success programming and initiatives. A one-stop shop in the heart of campus.

## KEY SPACES

### 360 Advising Studio

Offers one-on-one support for students' academic transition, financial planning, social engagement and wellness during their time at the U of A. Currently by invitation only and serves first-year students who are first-generation college students and Federal Pell Grant recipients.

### Writing & Communications Studio

Provides one-on-one assistance to all students at any stage of the writing process. Consultants work with students on course papers, scholarship essays, personal statements, and other application documents.

### Tutoring

Offers in-person and virtual tutoring appointments as well as Chat Tutoring for a wide range of courses from students who excel in their disciplines.

### Supplemental Instruction (SI)

## LIBRARY SERVICES

### Database Access

Through the library landing page students can quick search for academic sources or use one the many databases provided by University Libraries for papers and projects.

### Interlibrary Loan

The University has a large selection of books, journals, and articles students can utilize. If the U of A doesn't have an item, students can request the sources through the library and gain access from another library in the network.

### Research Guides

These guides correlate with a specific field of study or actual course at the U of A and can provide helpful research links, resources, and requirements for courses or even specific assignments.

### Librarians

A librarian is assigned to each academic area and can be contacted for information and assistance in students' research efforts.
