Diary of A Rookie's First Club Race Weekend

Apologies in advance for the length of this but I wanted to give as detailed a description of the weekend from the Rookie Candidate's point of view for those that are thinking about going Club Racing.

I finally make the jump from DE to racing which I have been on the fence for quite some time and just decided to either do it or quit thinking about it. My first race was this past October at CMP (Carolina Motorsports Park). I think what was taking me so long was the decision to race my GT3 or to get something else. I realized that racing in a class with the GT3 would put me in a class that would have only a couple of entrants on a good weekend. On the other hand I decided to take the experienced racers advice and select a class FIRST and then the car. G stock seemed to be very well populated (even at the low turnout weekends) and had some great drivers in it. I decided on G and went with a '93 RSA.

So, was it all I thought it would be? Absolutely, and a whole lot more.

Summary of my weekend from rookie orientation to rookie candidate school to rookie to racing......

Thursday night: Rookie Candidate orientation meeting with Vicki Earnshaw (PCA Steward for this event). This was the typical "welcome to our organization here's what to expect" talk. These will normally put you right to sleep but Vicki obviously has an immense amount of passion for Club Racing and it showed. She shared stories, insight to the process, what to expect, and patiently answered our rookie candidate questions. Thanks Vicki for a great meeting!

Friday morning: Rookie school starts first thing in the morning. Now it's not like there is a "special" school for the rookies but rather your school is baptism by FIRE! Vicki made a great juxtaposition between DE and Club Racing to illustrate to us exactly what to expect in our group. In DE you are separated into groups by experience but in Club Racing you are separated by type of car. This means you either swim with the sharks or go home. What this means is that in your group are racers of all skills levels and experience. Being able to demonstrate you can coexist with everybody is vital to graduating from rookie candidate school and being allowed to race.

As a requirement for our school we were had to participate in all three practice sessions as well

as the practice starts and fun race session. Let's just say that the first practice isn't at all what I anticipated. I assumed "practice" would be your typical red run group (most experienced solo and instructors) at a DE weekend. Was I surely mistaken! Passing, diving underneath, shooting around the outside, and everything you can think of was being PRACTICED! Took me all of 1 lap to figure out this was not your average rodeo.

After our 3 practice sessions we had the practice starts and fun race. We grid up 2x2 and are brought to the green and then race at the drop of the green flag to a designated corner where the field stops racing and is gridded up again for a second practice start and then subsequent gridding up. The last start (3rd practice start) is the beginning of the fun race and goes on for 9 laps. Those were the most intense laps I have ever experienced on a racetrack.

I have never felt my heart beat more than it did at the moment we rolled down the front stretch for that first start. A feeling I will never forget. However, it should be pointed out that there is one very important piece of advice to take in. Rule #1....don't forget to shift! This is something my rookie mentor (Bob Saville) told me, something experienced racers told me, something even Vicki told us the night before. I kept telling myself that over and over and wouldn't you know it, I didn't shift and ended up bouncing off the rev limiter for a few seconds until I figured out what just happened. Typical rookie!

At the end of the morning and all the preceding activities, there was a drivers meeting. This could not have been any more incredible. Most drivers meetings at a DE are boring and we don't usually look forward to them but they are a necessity. However, this one was special. At the conclusion of the meeting Vicki announced that all the ROOKIE CANDIDATES had successfully passed their school requirements and are now officially rookie RACERS!!! We were all called up one at a time and presented with a really nice certificate—I will be placing mine in a frame! The most amazing part was not that we got the certificate but that ALL the experienced racers welcomed us with open arms and would come over and congratulate us and shake hands and welcome us aboard. Almost like we were officially welcomed to this fraternity. Really made me feel welcomed. So thanks to all you guys that showed your support to us rookies!

Friday Afternoon: Sprint #1. Well things didn't go as planned for me as I broke an axle during the fun race with about 2 laps to go. I was out of commission and feared the worst. Fortunately, another racer (in my class of all places) had a

spare axle that was loaned to me for the weekend. My shop had the axle in by the end of the day and I was able to race the rest of the weekend. Big time classy move and one I am indebted to my fellow racer for. Unfortunately, I watched my first sprint from the sidelines.

Saturday AM: Time to qualify. I went out for qualifying and really tried to work out a good lap. Better results than I anticipated. I was able to qualify 5th overall in the group and second in class just 2 tenths off the class winning time. There were 7 in my class (G) and 28 overall.

I was very excited for the race and actually so excited that we lost track of time and went to fuel the car when it was time to grid rather than have the car ready to go for grid call. Only problem that we didn't anticipate was the card reader decided to stop working for my credit card at the fuel pumps. PANIC SETS IN!!!! I raced back to my garage stall and we managed to get enough fuel from the jugs (mine and another racer) to get me out for the entire race. Only problem is I missed the grid call and the grid was closed when I went to grid up. I had to start from the pits and join the tail end of the field. I started 28th of 28. At first I thought I was going to get mad at myself and lose focus of what I needed to do. I then realized that this was a great opportunity to try and mix it up with all the classes in my group and get a chance to start working on passing and traffic management! I approached this situation as a time to learn. I had the time of my life charging from the back of the pack and finished the sprint with a top 10 and 4th (of 7) in class!

Saturday PM: Sprint 3 was declared a "handicap" race. Basically the field is inverted based on the previous race. So instead of starting 5th I started 5th from the back....23rd. Not only was the field inverted but also a time gap was placed on the field for each car so that theoretically everybody should finish at the same time (or at least on the lead lap). To give an idea, those of us in the back would have had to pass the leader TWICE in just 30 minutes to win the group!

When I was released I just raced as hard as I could for the entire sprint and made sure to hit my marks. The car felt good and the driver felt even better. Not only was I able to hold off the 5 drivers behind me but I was able to charge through the field from 23rd all the way to 3rd overall and 1st in class!!!! I couldn't believe it. I made up 20 spots and won my first race my rookie weekend. I couldn't have been more excited and I am sure the video shows it. Needless to say, the 1st place plaque presented to me at the awards ceremony ranks right up there with some of the greatest moments in my life. I display that

Sunday (Enduro): Qualifying for the enduro went well. I qualified 5th overall and 2nd in class. I ran a really good race and had some great racing moments. I ended up finishing 4th in class and 7th overall. Unfortunately, the enduro had approximately 32 minutes of caution and that just killed the flow of the race (one double-yellow because of a blown motor in turn one with oil everywhere and the other was a wreck that was the result of that oil a few laps later). Once we finally got to racing we were already 40 minutes in so pit stops were approaching. Pit stops went smoothly and I went out back on track on the bumper of another racer in my class. We raced each other hard for about 20 minutes. However, our racing was cut short when I was accidentally squeezed off track, missed the Armco by a couple feet and debris shot up into the front brakes and I subsequently lost my brakes (pedal to the floor) which took about 5-6 laps to get the pedal fully back. I lost several spots and any chance to challenge the front-runners. I could have held my position knowing I was not at fault but I wasn't going to let a metal to metal contact happen and instead sacrificed my car going agricultural. I wasn't mad at all knowing that the other driver lost sight of me and did not push me off track intentionally. Rather, I was disappointed because I was having so much fun racing him. I was able to come back and missed taking 3rd in class by a few hundred feet! All in all, it was a fantastic race and a great conclusion to my weekend.

Recap: For anybody that is on the fence about making the jump and not sure if you are quite ready......JUST DO IT! You cannot be prepared for this as I quickly realized. You will learn very fast and you will know by the end of the weekend if this is for you or not. While this to



tally changes my perspective on running at a DE event, I will continue to do DE's so I can instruct as I absolutely enjoy instructing but driving without the rush of what I just experienced is going to be hard. Only time will tell............

I owe a tremendous amount of thanks to my race shop (3G Motorsports in Greensboro) and all the PCA officers, volunteers, and most importantly, the racers that welcomed us rookies into the fraternity. Can't wait for the next one!




