The Evolution of Roebling Roads

Much of the content of this article was obtained from the SCCA Bucaneer Region's webpage, which is much appreciated.

Before Carolina Motorsports Park came into existence, and Virginia International Raceway re-opened in 2000, there were relatively few choices for Club Racing on a true road course in the Southeastern Region of the country. You could head down to Road Atlanta in Braselton Georgia, or head north to Summit Point West Virginia. They were the closest;, both about a 4 hour drive away. Other than that, the other big name tracks were a much farther drive. There was one other great road track that was relatively close, under a 4 hour drive that still exists and flourishes today;that being "Roebling Roads" just a little north of Savannah Georgia in the small town of Pooler.. It's a little hard to find the first time. You actually have to drive through a neighborhood to get to it! All I remember is that you make a right at the brick Baptist Church off of Highway 17, to get there. But most long time PCA members that attend club and driving events over years, know how to get there, and speak highly of this track. Brumos Porsche of Jacksonville has used this track

often in the past. going all the way back to the early Peter Gregg years. I am writing about the history of Roebling Road this month, because of its unique history and my fond memories racing Enduro Carts there back in the early 1990's with the Roebling

Road Kart Club. A little over 2 miles with a long front straight, challenging turns on the back side and very forgiving run off areas all around it, which I really needed sometimes during my learning phases! The really first track I cut my teeth on, but was and still is one of my all time favorites!

Roebling Road Race is a race track that got started under another name, didn't do too well, almost died and then somehow was reborn to become one of the great Club Racing tracks on the East coast. It would take volumes to relate the countless efforts of hundreds of volunteers that made this come about.

The beginning of sports car racing in the Savannah area goes back to 1910 when the first Vanderbilt Cup Race was held on the streets of Savannah. There was occasional racing in the Southeast over the years, but as time went on the Sports Car Club of America was developed and worked its way south, races were held at Hunter Air Force Base, part of the Savannah area, and other airport tracks. Among the regular participants were Robert Roebling and John Rueter.

Mr. Roebling was very important citizen of Savannah and scion of the Roebling Wire Rope family, which built the Brooklyn Bridge. As a racing enthusiast, he attended many races and had several sports cars of the day. He had the financial resources to back up his desire to race, and he was also very interested in promoting sports car racing.

His close friend, John Rueter, was very well known in sports car

racing around Atlanta and in the SCCA. He was a driving force in sports car racing for many, many years. The Southeast Division established the John C Rueter award in his name, which was awarded to Buccaneer Region member Tom Nehl in 1980.

Mr. Roebling and Mr. Reutter got together and said, "Let's build a race track." That sounds a little like Mickey Rooney and Judy Garland saying "Let's put on a show."

They found a piece of property in South Eppingtam County; an old farm of about 800 acres with very limited access, with just one little muddy trail about 20 feet wide. Mr. Roebling bought that land, probably for a song. It wasn't worth a hell of a lot, but on it were some good, high, dry parcels, and that's where they designed a track.

Mr. Roebling was not only a very important person in the Savannah area, but I think a politically influential person, too. It just happened that at the time Mr. Roebling wanted to build the race track, the State was building Georgia Highway 17, which went north of U.S. 80

from Faulkville and up into Georcentral gia, just west of the property. As state officials building were the highway, they needed a place to store their road grading equipment and dump trucks.

Mr. Roebling

very graciously allowed the Georgia Highway Department to store all its road building equipment on his newly acquired land, and as the road building equipment went in and out of his property, they were able to scrape a little here and there, move a little dirt here and there. They "practiced" on Mr. Roebling's land so they could do a perfect job on Georgia Highway 17.

But the result of all that practice was that the base of this 2.05 mile track was constructed. As a matter of fact, it was built to the exact same specifications as Georgia Highway 17; even to the point of putting drainage culverts in certain areas of the track. You can see one under turn one and under turn seven. Mr. Roebling paid for the paving, but I don't think for anything else!

A Grand Opening Day and race was staged in August 1958. It was well covered by the press and attended by racing VIP's of the time. The new track was christened "Savannah International Raceway" Roebling and Ruetter worked with the local SCCA Region, then called the Savannah region, and put on a few racing events.

In 1958, Roebling organized a corporation, called the Council for Traffic Safety, and named Marvin Davis as president. He then donated the track to this group and received a large tax credit. Davis coincidentally was Executive Director of the Savannah Foundation, which was the equivalent of the United Way in Savannah at the time. John Ruetter was Manager and First Instructor for this facility.

The Council for Traffic Safety operated in 1959 and 1960 and persuaded Georgia Teachers College and the state police, the local



high school, and local police to utilize the facility to train drivers. In fact Georgia Teachers College had a course at the time to train students in driving. I don't think they called it racecar driving, but maybe defensive driving?

ButRuetter passed away, and Roebling's enthusiasm for racing, and the track diminished. And after that the Council for Traffic Safety never did that well.

The Savannah Region was never very strong with only about eight members, and was essentially an inactive sports car club. But the track was in it's assigned territory, so they ran a race every year or so with help from other regions. The track had the same pavement as Georgia Highway 17, and was hard on tires, and the car owners complained. As a result it was hard enough to get entrees. Car counts were as low as 50-60 for a weekend of seven races and twenty classes of cars. By 1971, the Savannah International Raceway was getting very little use.

The Gator region of Northeast Florida rented the track every year

from the mid 1960's through 1971 to hold National Races, which was a big event for the Gator Region. For 1972, the Gator Region asked Tom Nehl, a member since 1967, to be Race Chairman. Organizing a National Race is quite an undertaking, and those who have done it know how much work is involved. We were required to furnish insurance to the property owner and arrange to rent the track. The track was then owned by the Savannah Foundation.

In the process of delivering the race insurance to Marvin Davis, President of the Savannah Foundation as well as the President of the Council of Traffic Safety. Nehl got acquainted with Davis, who was impressed with the business –like way everything was handled. After we ran the race in 1971, Davis contacted Nehl and asked if he would like to take over the track, rent it, and operate it.

After a few seconds of thought, Nehl said "I don't think I want to do that. But I might buy it from you." Davis said "Make us a proposition" After studying all aspects, Nehl put

together an offer designed to be attractive. A meeting was held in Brunswick, and the two Regions decided how to merge. It was decided on the name Buccaneer Region, which is really the proper name because pirates raided on the Florida and Georgiacoasts in the 1700's and 1800's. Thus, the Buccaneer Region came into existence in 1972.

The Buccaneer Region came into existence in 1972 as a result of the merge between the Savannah Region and the Gator Region. Following the merge, the track (Savannah International Raceway) was rented to the BuccaneerRegion for \$1 per year by Nehl. The lease included three stipulations: pay the \$1 per year; run at least three(3) SCCA-sanctioned events every year; and keep the insurance up to date.

All three of the covenants were carried out and the checks were never cashed. They are in one of Nehl's files somewhere.

The Buccaneer Region ran a Driver's School, a Regional Race, and a National Race each year,

with success, but attracted few entries because of the problem with the abrasive track surface. Still, many improvements were needed.

First, a concession stand and restrooms were constructed. Work parties moved some guardrails and added more with donated material. Communication lines were buried to every racing corner so activities could be reported between officials and corner workers. Nehl donated a used truck body for equipment storage and a used flatbed truck for various chores. A 1500-foot deep water well and water pumping system was put in. An old road grader was bought, fixed-up, and added to the Nehl farm equipment, and frequently used by Buccaneer Region to improve the access road, make a new entry road from an adjoining public road, and other work when needed.

A Tech Shed was constructed using material donated and hauled to the track by Tom Nehl Truck Company, who also salvaged an old diesel truck and had a dump body installed. It was used for years by the track and thefarm for many chores.



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Next, Nehl traded a used pickup for material from a demolished bank drive-thru. The trade included the material loaded on a borrowed flatbed trailer. Using a truck-tractor borrowed from the truck company, all of the material was hauled up to the track and stored in the barn that came with the land.

He then designed a three-story Timing and Scoreing building and made a model of it scaled to the dimensionsof the material from the bank. A local builder was hired to put the jigsaw together. He did a great job and usedmost of the material, including the stairs, the air conditioner, the colored glass windows, and panels.

MrNehl either donated material or financed part of the cost and worked many weekends with Region members and friends to complete the various projects. The Buccaneer Region always paid the loans as agreed.

In 1976 idea was developed to rename the track in honor of Roebling. At the time, Nehl still owed the Savannah Foundation \$4,500 on his payment pledge, so he told them "If you will forgive that \$4,500, we will rename the track and build an entrance wall with a plaque on it, calling it 'Roebling Road'." They were happy to honor Roebling, and gave the go-ahead. The Buccaneer Board approved.

MNehl had a lot of fun designing the plaque on a drawing board in his office, and came up with a full-scale drawing for the plaque. The design is still in use for patches, stationery, etc. A Jacksonville brass foundry made a mold and cast the plaque in bronze. It was taken to the track and installed in the newly built wall.

The Track and the Region invited Mr. and Mrs. Roebling to "Roebling Day", a celebration to unveil the plaque and introduce the new name. The design drawing was mounted and frames, and all the racers and workers who were present signed it, and presented it to Roebling. The presentation of the drawing and the unveiling of the plaque were followed by a banquet under the trees. In subsequent correspondence, Roebling was lavish in his praise of a very memorable day and the "Ducal" hospitality he enjoyed. He said he and Mrs. Roebling were made to feel at home from the very moment they arrived at the gate.

By then, the Track was up and running well, but still suffered from the coarse pavement. It was soon realized that the track would have to be paved with a new tire-friendly surface if increased entries was to be attained. The best racetrack paving known at that time was at Road Atlanta, where many of the Region members had raced their cars, and it was always a good racing surface.

The Finley Company in Statesboro, GA was contacted and asked to communicate with Road Atlanta and find out who had paved it, and what the formula was (the mixture of sand, gravel, etc.). The Finley people were able to come up with the formula and get the materials. However, they had to use a substitute for the sand because it was different in South Georgia than North Georgia. The estimate for a complete repaving was \$63,000. Where would that money come from?

The Regional Executive at that time was Andy Johnston. He and his wife, Jackie, were very active in the Buccaneer Region, and the two of them were a good team. They worked hard and did a lot of good things for the Region. Here in Jackie's own words is how the money was raised:

"The Region didn't have the funds it would take. The Board got together to try to figure it out and the consensus was that Tom Nehl could afford to pay for it. A few of us were "volunteered" to approach the intimidating owner, and see if he would pay for the repaving. To this day I remember vividly sitting in Tom's living room and what his answer was. Quote 'I could pay for the repaving of the track, but I would rather burn fifty-thousand dollars in my front yard than just give you the money. Show me the Region is behind this by

raising half the money, and I will match it."


The Buccaneer Region accepted the challenge, and Jackie went after contributions from SCCA members and Nehl went after racing suppliers and his many racing friends. The Region raised \$24,000, which Nehl matched and then loaned the Region the \$15,000 needed to bring the total to \$63,000.

In the process, the Roebling Road Runners& Pavers Club was established to honor all contributors of \$100 or more with their name on a display board located in the paddock area, and now located in the Tech Shed. If you look at the board the next time you are at the track, you will recognize some pretty good racing names.

At the first race after paving, Nehl was asked to take the first lap in his Lotus Super-Seven. With the new pavement, lap times were found to be about five seconds faster!

Following that first race on the newly paved track, Roebling Road became extremely popular for not only racing, but for testing and other kinds of racing, such as motorcycles and historic cars. The track is now rented about 300 days a year where racers and their families come to test, race, camp out and enjoy Roebling Road.

Over the years, Regional Executives and Board members have managed the track well and it continues to generate substantial income, which is spent on improvements. Among them: a new Timing and Scoring building at Turn 4 (since then converted to a race officials meeting room); a state-of-the-art computerized scoring system; radio communications from tower to corners; PA system; medical building; track wrecker; new residence for line-on-property



track managers; new covered pavilion and benches in front of the concession stand; pipe-in water from a centralized system; electrical outlets for campers; paved infield roads; another track repaving in 1997; and expanded infield with new facilities for camping and viewing. The result of this prosperity and success has seen the Buccaneer Region membership grow from less than 100 when it was born in 1972 to almost 500 today (ed. note: now almost 600).

In 1979, the Buccaneer Region started the Tom Nehl Classic National Race weekend, held in the middle of March each year. It draws ± 200 entries each year, as do most of the track's events.

The Robert Roebling era was from 1955 to 1972. The Tom Nehl era was from 1972 to 1992. The Buccaneer Region era began in 1992 when the racetrack was sold to the Region for about 1/3 of its value. Mr. Nehl took a 15-year mortgage, which was paid in full in less than 10 years.

The Buccaneer Region of the SCCA has become one of the most prosperous Regions in the Country, and the only one to own its racetrack — fully paid for. It has become one of the finest non-spectator facilities in the Country. Buccaneer members, past and present, can be proud of what they have accomplished.

"I Get Around"

"Anticipate or perish." I used these words with my daughters when they were learning to drive. It worked. My daughters survived their teen years behind the wheel, intact. Although I can't quite say the same thing about the Civic they used, occasionally as a bumper car. There was the incident where the older one, parking her car in front of the garage, said her foot accidentally slipped off the brake and onto the accelerator... the car then slammed into the garage door. She called me in the office, and I had the presence of mind to ask if she was all right. I'm very proud of that. Then I called my wife, and asked how the garage door was... and she said there was

no garage door. But the girls remember those words, to this day. Which is the point. And which got me thinking about sayings for driving. And, you know what? I couldn't actually think of many adages, at all.

Oh, there's the Stirling Moss comment about straight-aways... the boring bits between the corners. And there's the 911 mantra, "Slow in fast out." And there's the line attributed to A.J. Foyt about driving at Indy, "If you're not scaring yourself three times a lap, you're going too slow." And, of course, "Speed is a matter of money... how fast do you want to go?" I got an e-mail from the online magazine Winding Road, offering slogan tee shirts, and all they had were "Keep calm and carry speed" and "It's surprising how many people, including Formula 1 drivers, think the brakes are for slowing the car down, "which is attributed to Mario Andretti.

Not exactly inspiring, are they?

Which is very ironic, because if you're a runner you get inundated with all manner of profundities. One magazine, Runner's World, actually sends you a "Daily Kick in the Butt" by e-mail. And it's even more ironic, because many of the lines I see relate to a lot more than running... like competing in general... and like life.

Take "A man can fall many times, but he isn't a failure until he begins to blame somebody else," attributed to Steve Prefontaine. And another one from Pre, "To give anything less than your best is to sacrifice the gift." And here's my favorite from Steve, "A lot of people run a race to see who's the fastest. I run to see who has the most guts...." In point of fact, the running world picks up the quotes from all sorts of places, and makes them their own.

Take "Success is a peace of mind, which is a direct result of self-satisfaction in knowing you did your best to become the best that you are capable of becoming" – John Wooden.

Or "Twenty years from now you will be more disappointed by things you didn't do than by the ones you did. So throw off the bowlines, sail away from the safe harbor, and catch the trade winds in your sails. Explore. Dream. Discover" – Mark Twain.

Or "We must all suffer from one of two pains; the pain of discipline or the pain of regret. The difference is that discipline weighs ounces and lasts a moment while regret weighs tons and lasts a lifetime" – Jim Rohn

Now, understand, I don't see any of this anywhere in the automotive world... or motorsport world for that matter.

I don't know why. Because when it's a hot and steamy day, and you're wearing a multi-layer Nomex driving suit and full-face helmet, and you're fastened hard into the roll-cage of your car, and you're pounding around a bullring for an hour and a half, and your pulse is soaring, and you're manic to get to the checkered flag, first, I don't care how good your cool suit and your drinking tube are.... it's the same challenge.Here's how Patton described it, "Now if you are going to win any battle you have to do one thing. You have to make the mind run the body. Never let the body tell the mind what to do. The body will always give up. It is always tired morning, noon, and night. But the body is never tired if the mind is not tired.... You've always got to make the mind take over and keep



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going."

Ahh, that little voice. When I ran my first half marathon, I got to mile 8 or 9 and started having a conversation with that voice. It was telling me to stop. And I answered with "what would I say to people?" And the voice kept coming up with scenarios, so to speak, like "I tripped" or "it was too hot." And my conscious kept rejecting them, saying, "no that won't work, nobody will believe me." This went on and on, and on... until I reached mile 12 and realized the end was in sight.

Here's what you're up against, "It's very hard to understand in the beginning that the whole idea is not to beat the other runners. Eventually you learn that the competition is against the little voice inside you that wants to quit" – Dr. George Sheehan.

So what's the problem, drivers?

Try this one on, "Keep the dream in front of you. Never let it go, regardless of how farfetched it might seem" -- Hal Higdon.

Or the gray haired mantra, "Once you're over the hill, you pick up speed."




My Favorite Porsches

This may not be the in the strictest sense of 'My Favorite Porsches', but perhaps rather, *My Favorite Things Porsche*.

Recently my wife and I spent the weekend in Valle Crucis, North Carolina staying at the Mast Farm Inn. If you ever have the chance to dine or stay there, take the opportunity, you will not be disappointed. The historic inn does lean on the nostalgic. In the rooms, corridors and common spaces you will find vintage copies of Life Magazine and the sort of Norman Rockwell image filled general publications from the past. It was a different kind of nostalgia awaiting me as my fingers walked through the magazines in our room. In the lower bin of a reading rack sat a collection of Road and Track magazines dating from 1980-1984. Some being the same issues I also had my grimey hands on as a car obsessed young boy. Not exactly reading about wood sided stations wagons headed to the soda shop, but a real trip down memory lane for me. Inside the pages where stories of how the BMW 528e had no real american counterpart in driving dynamic to compare, how the Vector W2 was a super car unlike any other-just wait for it to be built, and this novel cutting edge technology of the dual cluth manual gearbox. The stories themselves didn't seem too disimilar to today's other than the color of the pages having a bit more yellow to them. However, it was the tour through the ads that seemed to be the most educational, by intent of the ad itself and by the contrast to today's ads. Aside





from some of peculiar messages of cigarette and liquor ads, such as 'Leaders like John Delorean drink Cuttey Sark, because, that's what leaders drink.' Most of the car ads, either single or double page followed a similar formula. Usually an image of the car and large amounts of text describing some techincal feature of the car in greater detail than ever found, if at all in today's advertisements.

Among the ads of this type where the Porsche 'Consumer Orientation' numbered series (shown this page). Each showed the car, some diagrams and a few paragraphs of text orienting the reader to the technical feature found in the latest 944, 911, 924 or 928. As a child, I loved these and collected them, and as a matter of fact I still have them in a binder. 'Consumer Orientation Number 15 in the series, Subject: Torsion Bars' told how the suspension of the 911 worked, how it saved space and how well it performed, complete with a diagram of how torque work along the axis of the bar. Number 26 told us how great the 928S was. Number 8 explained the 924 Turbo and on and on and on. I don't know the final count in the series, but I do know I never managed to collect the complete set, despite my scouring



the issues of *Time* magazine my Dad recevied along with the pages of *Car* and *Driver*, *Motor Trend* and *Road and Track*.


Another facet that I could not help notice was comparing the tact of the typical american car company ad and those of the imports such as BMW, Audi, Volkswagen and Porsche. While the later tended to be technical minded and how that translates to things like fuel efficiency, performance and driving character, the american car copy tends to focus on things like the sort of impression you will make on your friends or passers by while driving your car, or parking at home. How the grumble of the motor will ignite some animal instinct. How the



new Trans Am has gold paint, a large bird painted on the hood, T-tops and gold lights that illuminate on the special hood to tell you how much turbo boost your Firebird is producing while you drive down the imagining you are Burt Reynolds outrunning Jackie Gleason. The irony of the caption of the ad is not lost as Pontiac was not exactly a survivor. Comparing the trends I saw, in what was important about the vehicles for sale makes me think, if the american car companies were more focused on improved engineering rather than selling image, maybe their past and present would look different, but that is a separate topic... I can say, this series of 'Consumer Orientation' ads and the cars they supported, undoubtedly helped form my appreciation of the brand that I have to this day.

At the July meeting we had two volunteers agree to help set up Drive & Dine outings. We are hoping to have one in early August and the other in




late September or early October. Look for an email in the near future with details for the event. We are also in the process of scheduling "Tech Sessions" with Porsche of Greenville, Pro-



Placing a classified ad: how does it work?

This short article explains the process, what to expect, and how to make sure your ad is printed on a timely basis.

The Carolinas Region has a classified ads coordinator who handles all incoming ads. Once the coordinator receives your ad, it is formatted and checked that it includes all of the essential information. The most common reasons for rejection are forgetting to include location (city and state) of the car or parts, forgetting to include your PCA membership number (which doesn't get printed in the ad) and forgetting to include an asking price. Other formatting includes fixing obvious typos and trimming both ad copy if it's too long and resizing pictures to 800x600 pixels. Note that only a single picture is published, and only in the web version. Be aware, too, that you will not typically get a confirmation email or postcard in return. Your notification will be seeing the ad in the next edition of Tobacco Roads and on the web.

Before the end of the month, the coordinator sends the formatted ads and pictures (zero or one per ad) to both the Tobacco Roads editor and webmaster for inclusion. Because Tobacco Roads is a monthly publication, and because there's some prep time required for that, there is a lag between when an ad is received and when it gets

published. To avoid making a mess of ad tracking, the publication of web ads and the Tobacco Roads ads is synchronized so that they both appear at close to the same time.

Ads that are received before the 15th of each month will make it into the following month's issue (and web site) but ads received after that will have to wait another month before publication because of the nature of print publication. As an example, an ad received on the 20th of May will not make it into the June issue, and would first appear in the July issue. This may seem an eternity compared to internet auction or classified ad sites, but is typical for publishing (including Panorama).

The process works well and efficiently, powered solely by the volunteer efforts of your fellow club members. If you try to pattern your ad after the example printed in each month's issue of Tobacco Roads, and if you include all of the required information and email or US mail the ad so that it arrives before the 15th of the month, you'll have the shortest possible duration between when you decide to sell your "baby" and when the ad appears in both Tobacco Roads and on http://www.carolinas-pca.com.
