# Hysterical Ramblings

#### **Last Month's Trivia Questions**

Question 1: For 20 points, what margue has been kinky since 1961? Answering correctly were Tim Scopes (25 points) and Dixon Johnston (20 points). This month the responses just trickled in. Here's the answer, courtesy of BMWblog.com. Yes, I know this elevates a competing-of sorts-marque but I've been driving Bimmers since 1981 and Porsches since 1986. While I have loved my Porsches more, I appreciate the qualities of the BMWs. This question illustrates that the 911 shape is not the only design feature that has survived many years of changes in automobiles. For BMW that includes the kidney grille, since the 1930s and the Hofmeister kink, since 1961.

"One of my favorite automotive design cues of all time is quite possible the smallest of any car and it happens to be on BMWs. It's something that most average BMW drivers would never notice and it's something that only the BMW faithful really know about. If you're reading this, I'm assuming you're one of the latter and you already know what I'm talking about.

"The Hofmeister Kink, or H-Kink as I'm going to call it, is a small inward kink at the base of the C-Pillar. As the C-Pillar slopes back towards the trunk of the car, right before it would normally end, it kinks back inward. Named after BMW design director, Wilhelm Hofmeister, the famous Kink first debuted on the 1961 BMW 1500, which was part of the "Neue Klasse" of BMW vehicles.

"I think the thing I love about the



Hofmeister Kink is the longevity. It seems like such an insignificant design, yet BMW has put it on every single car since the Neue Klasse cars in the 1960's. It's so simple yet if BMW were to take it off of a new car, enthusiasts, BMW or otherwise, would throw a fit. I get it, though. The H-Kink is a fabulous little design quirk that truly gives the C-Pillar a sporting look and accentuates the rear wheels and the cars rear-wheel drive nature."

Question 2: In this age of "telling it like it is" or at least the appearance thereof, perhaps we should recall an artist who, on the verge of retirement, recorded what might be considered the first feminist song to reach #1 on the charts. For 20 more points, name the artist and the song. Tim Scopes (25 points), Dixon Johnston and John Carr (20 points) correctly identified Kitty Wells and "It Wasn't God Who Made Honky Tonk Angels." Kitty Wells, according to Wikipedia, was an American pioneering female country music singer. She broke down a female barrier in country music with her 1952 hit recording, "It Wasn't God Who Made Honky Tonk Angels" which also made her the first female country singer to top the U.S. country charts, and turned her into the first female country star. Her Top 10 hits continued until the mid-1960s, inspiring a long list of female country singers who came to prominence in the 1960s.

In 1952, Paul Cohen, an executive at Decca Records, approached Wells to record "It Wasn't God Who Made Honky Tonk Angels." Wells was disenchanted with her career prospects and was considering retirement, but agreed to the session because of the \$125 union scale recording

payment. "I wasn't expecting to make a hit," said Wells later. "I just thought it was another song." "It Wasn't God Who Made Honky Tonk Angels" was an answer song to Hank Thompson's "The Wild Side of Life," and its lyrical treatment of seductive, wayward women. Wells' single

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retorted, "It's a shame that all the blame is on us women."

The record's message was controversial at the time, and was banned by many radio stations. NBC, in particular, was troubled by the lyric, "It brings back memories of when I was a trustful wife." Wells' slight alteration of "trustful" to "trusting" lifted the network ban on the song. Nevertheless, audiences couldn't get enough of it. Thanks to her breakthrough, she received a membership to the Grand Ole Opry, which had originally banned the single.

#### Did you know?

There used to be an automaker in New Bern, NC? Here's an article from the Raleigh News & Observer, 9/17/2015, which republishes an N&O story from 9/23/1928.

In 1928, New Bern's Gertrude S. Carraway introduced N&O readers to Gilbert S. Waters, a man before his time.

New Bern might have been a Detroit of the South and Gilbert S. Waters, of this city, might have been a Henry Ford of North Carolina, had he succeeded 25 years ago in interesting local capitalists to give financial backing to his plan to manufacture horseless carriages....

He was in the buggy business but was eager to convert his buggy factory into an automobile factory....

Many bankers were interviewed in vain but they could not decide to risk capital in such a new and untested venture. "If I had known then what I know now, Mr. Waters and I might both have been among the rich men of the country now," recently stated one of the businessmen who turned down Mr. Waters' pleas for aid.... And so, failing to get financial backing from any source, Mr. Waters had to stick to his old trade. Yet, he had made successful automobiles and believed implicitly in their future.

In 1899, he had visited Baltimore. There were then four horseless carriages in that city, he says. He came back home, much interested in the new machines. Although he had never seen a gasoline outfit, he began to experiment with gasoline cars rather than steam cars like those he had seen.

From an old buggy he fashioned a gasoline car. Many persons made jokes and funny comments about the man and his horseless carriage. They even said that he must be insane to think that he could make a buggy that would run without the aid of a horse. Finally his work was finished and Mr. Waters decided to give his car a trial on city streets. A large crowd of skeptical persons gathered to see the fun. They were curious to see the peculiar inventor try out the unusual looking car. Practically all predicted hopeless failure....

The old car did present a peculiar spectacle. It appeared more like a buggy than a modern automobile. It had no top. Its solid double-tired wheels were large, with tiny spokes. The crank was at the side, with the engine under the narrow, high seat. A bicycle chain and muffler were used. A steering rod was used instead of a steering wheel. A bicycle bell warned pedestrians of the approaching machine.

Mr. Waters worked for some time over the engine. Finally he cranked and with a loud noise the motor started successfully. Climbing up into the high buggy seat,



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he started the machine. To the amazed surprise of the spectators, the car moved forward. Many of them could scarcely believe their eyes. They ran along by the side of the slowly moving car, to be sure that they were seeing correctly. When it stopped, they dared the inventor to try to start it again. To their surprise, it did start again successfully. The New Bern inventor had won his struggle.

Then came the revolutionary decision to give up his thriving buggy business. At that time there were only a few automobiles in the State. W. T. Hill had brought to New Bern some steam outfits that he ran for hire, charging 25 cents for the pleasure and novelty of riding.

J. V. Blades had brought a car from Elizabeth City by boat to New Bern. Mr. Waters could not get the money to back his enterprise....

Staying in the buggy business from necessity, Mr. Waters continued to be interested in automobiles. Following his first effort in 1900, he made a second car in 1906. This had a buggy body and the motor under the seat.

"It was a great success for the time," says Mr. Waters. "It weighed 540 pounds and went so fast I could hardly steer it at the height of speed. It went 25 miles an hour when I was in it by myself. If I took along another person, it would go only 20 miles an hour. If three people were in it, it would go only 15 miles an hour."

In spite of his failure to be able to market his cars or to cash in on his inventions, Mr. Waters has always been an automobile fan. For about 20 years he has owned, as a souvenir, an old "speed car" that belonged to the race king, Barney Oldfield. In this old car, a Locomobile, Oldfield won a pioneer race in Chicago in 1899, according to Mr. Waters, attaining the "wonderful speed of eight miles an hour...."

Mr. Waters has in his office a number of early automobile catalogues. Many of the cars sold for a dollar a pound, he says....

At one period during the history of his buggy industry he made and sold an average of four buggies a day. Until recently he sold at least 100 buggies a year. But now there is no demand at all for buggies, he says.

Note: It seems the use of ellipses .... was very popular in 1928.

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# PCA Instructor Profile: Jim Buchanan

Back in the 60's Jim's "playboy bachelor" uncle took him for a ride in his oh-so-cool Jaguar XKE and Jim was hooked. A lot of us may have been into car mags in high school, but Jim soon was into books about Ferraris and he wondered if he could ever afford \$20,000 for a Dino. He kept the dream alive when he got to drive a Daytona in college. But it was much later before he got to buy

and challenge myself to add the skill to my own repertoire."

Jim's most important safety tip for students? "I remind them they have a family to get home to on Sunday night and they need to drive their car home, not have it towed. They should anticipate potential situations both in front and behind."

his own Ferrari. It was a F355 and he says "After throwing money into that hole for three years he moved to his 2007 Cayman S." It's the meteor gray #57 with the flowing checkered flag graphics we have seen Jim driving on the track since 2009.

Jim's first DE was at Carolina Motorsports Park that year when he "had the good fortune to draw Shane Tisdale as his instructor for his 2nd DE at CMP and his 3rd DE at Virginia Raceway." Jim loves the great balance and adequate power of his '07 Cayman S, saying "I can't stay with the big horsepower cars on the straights, but I can in the turns."



But what about their inevitable mistakes? One common problem he sees a lot is abrupt inputs (gas, braking and steering). He works on these by emphasizing the 9 and 3 o'clock hand positions on the steering wheel as well as using a great visual aid. He tells students "Visualize a half-empty glass of water on the dash and driving without sloshing any water out." That sounds like a great way to smooth out the inputs!

One student stands out in Jim's instructing career: He remembers that "light coming on" moment of a young driver around 20 years old

Jim's favorite tracks? VIR: It has technical sections for handling skills and big straights to "satisfy the speed freaks" (Isn't that all of us?). He also likes Road Atlanta with the "fun-to-drive" turns 1 through 7 and that exciting roller coaster ride down the hill after turn 11 into the front straight in turn 12 with all that concrete wall staring at you. Whoopee! Add to that list Mid Ohio: It has a rich history and is a "safer version of Road Atlanta."

How about instructing? Jim says after the excitement of moving up in run group levels, he needed a new challenge. He knew that

in a Cayman. He learned the line very well Saturday and Sunday morning, so Jim decided to up the game a bit in the last Sunday afternoon session "because everyone is tired by then and that's when mistakes happen." He challenged his student to drive without his instruction (even though Jim remained in the car with him). He told him they would stay out until he made three mistakes (or strikes). About two-thirds through the session he had accumulated two strikes – one more and he was out! A couple of laps later he took the checkered flag and his student gleefully pounded the steering wheel shouting "I did it! I did it!" Jim says of the moment "I was just as happy as he was!"

instructing would require him to step up his skills "to be able to articulate and demonstrate to my students." It also makes him a better driver. Seeing students do something either better or differently "makes me analyze it



Jim sums up instructing this way: "It's good to give back to the sport and help keep it going. I think the students truly appreciate your efforts."

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## Tech Werks – Settings Avoiding Blind Spots

How many times have you been driving along and wanted to change lanes to pass or for some other reason and were surprised by a car riding in your blind spot just off your rear quarter panel? This can be scary, even cause an accident. We Porsche drivers know all too well the limited rear sight we have in our beloved cars, yet seldom seek a solution to the problem. Well,



I offer this procedure as a tip to help those who want to cure this malady.

First, find a nearly empty parking lot with lampposts in it. An empty school or church



parking lot for instance, or a shopping center or mall prior to opening for business. Pull up next to a lamppost to your left, with your car positioned about 3-4 feet away from it.

Position the inside rear view mirror so that it shows an equal rear sighting on both sides of the interior. Now, slowly pull forward until the lamp pole appears in that mirror just inside the rear window. When it



does, stop. At this point, adjust the left outside mirror until the lamp pole appears in the left inner edge of the side mirror. Allow some overlap.

Repeat this procedure for the right side of the car.

Bear in mind that as you obtain these



settings in your mirrors, your head should remain in its normal driving position. Do not turn or tilt your head to attain the view of the lamp pole.

After completing the above, save your mirror settings if you have that capability. Why does this work? By making these adjustments you eliminate the blind spot by enabling vision between the inside mirror and the side mirrors to overlap. As a passing car disappears from the inside mirror view, it will grow in the side mirror view until it is very nearly within one's peripheral vision.

As with anything, improvement often begets sacrifice. This is no different. Essentially, you will have moved the blind spots much closer to the side of the car and shrunk them. Knowledge of this is extremely important when backing into tight places such as parking spaces, garages, etc. It is also worth noting that motorcycles and bicycles that are close to the side of the car may be in the "new" blind spots, so care must be taken when they share the road with you. It may take a while to get used to these settings and gain trust in them, however once comfortable you will find it a safer driving experience.

# The Journey is the Reward:

## Two Weeks in a 1972 911: Rennsport Reunion V

PART I | Go West Young Man!

I've been fortunate enough to attend 3 of the 5 Rennsport Reunions.

My first was back in 2007; I rode down to Daytona, FL with my partners in our race transporter where we set up in the infield on Nascar 2 to host an informal PCA/ RGruppe gathering spot with a great view of the action. Then again in 2011, this time flying to the event in Monterey, CA, to support & represent our fledgling product company, where I experienced Laguna

Seca from the rental car. However, this year I had the opportunity to drive out to Rennsport - in my 1972 911.

What follows is a brief synopsis of my two-week journey, in an attempt to preserve the experience by chronicling it, both for myself and for anyone else who might be entertained by such a retelling.

## Preparations

I'd made hotel reservations and purchased the appropriate tickets and passes as soon as the dates for Rennsport were announced, long before the actual event, and before Porsche decided to reschedule the entire thing to work around their WEC/919 Fuji race schedule. After the mad scramble to change reservations resulting from Porsche's date change in January was concluded, I promptly forgot about both the tickets and the reservations, focusing instead on day-to-day matters at the shop.

That is, until the third week of September; when fortunately, the envelope containing the Rennsport tickets and Corral passes was too large to feed into the shredder unopened. As you might expect, after having almost destroyed my tickets, I was suddenly and remarkably quite able to focus on the upcoming trip.

I know that with any travel of significant distance, preparations should be made before the fact. True to form, I therefore began prepping the car itself almost a full day before departure – by both replacing the throttle bodies (the 1972 US-delivery 911s were all mechanical fuel injected models and mine had a tendency to go unusually lean after heating up) and by raising the chassis for additional clearance (just in case.) As many of you already know, both of these are time consuming jobs. And so, as to be expected, I was still finalizing the ride height and aligning the car on the morning of my departure. Still, I wasn't too worried about it; I had a relatively short first day of travel ahead of me and four entire days to get to Monterey!

## Montgomery

Thus Saturday September 19, saw me packing and leaving by noon; headed from our shop outside of Charlotte, NC to Montgomery, AL to overnight with family (whom I owed a long overdue visit.) I'd packed the



911 with as much bottled water, Red Bull, granola bars and Brad Penn as I could fit around the seats and on the floorboards and installed a wideband O2 sensor to monitor and correspondingly tune the MFI system en route. I was also going to be road-testing some prototypes of our rear spring plate bushings (reproductions of the 1974 RSR part that I'd installed on the car the previous evening) – it was a work trip, after all.

The 435 miles to Montgomery took the majority of the first day, on account of several stops to adjust the MFI pump, and an extended stay in a gas station parking lot to swap the driver and passenger seats (which happen to be reproductions of two different styles of historic competition seats) back & forth to alleviate some knee pain that I was already experiencing in the more 'competition-oriented' of the two.

I arrived at my Aunt & Uncle's home around 7:30 and spent my evening in their driveway re-drilling the seat sliders and mounts to lower the newly swapped driver's seat as far as possible – as

Plano

Rested and with a surprisingly improved seating position, I



made an early start of it Sunday, departing Montgomery around 6:00am, with 660 or so miles to get to Plano, TX where I'd be overnighting with a friend and business partner in order to join a multi-Porsche convoy the following day. Because of the early departure and a beautiful morning, I had roads to myself and could enjoy the peaceful, solitary drive through Selma and on to the interstate.

Less than an hour into the trip on the first day I'd realized the benefit of wearing ear buds. The wind noise in the Targa is a cacophony of buffeting and booming from the fabric top, aging seals, opened break glass in the front vent windows, and the windows themselves (which pretty much have to be open in the warmer months). In my car, all of this is being underwritten by the sport muffler and the combined noise can be 'intrusive' – to put it mildly. Ear buds (like the iPod variety) buffer a lot of those frequencies without obscuring road sounds and are a welcome

addition to a long drive without actually plugging them in to anything. By the second day, however, I was already appreciating having something to play through them. Appropriately enough for my tastes, the early Sunday morning drive through Alabama was

accompanied by Nina Simone.

Despite a few tuning stops - one occurring remarkably at the foot of a monument marking the location of Talisi, visited by De Soto in 1540 - I made good time, crossing the mighty Mississippi around 2pm.

Subsequently, I made Plano TX by 8pm, followed by a quick dinner and a bit of prep for a long day of driving the next morning.



#### Winslow

My partner Bob and I left Plano Monday morning around 5am to meet up with our travel group at a nearby exit in Denton TX. The group was to be one car short; we'd gotten news the previous evening that a fellow RGruppe member and friend of ours (Chris) had caught the front cross member below his 1966 911R-type hot rod on a jutting, broken portion of the concrete slab of a bridge transition, which bent the cross member and bound the front suspension. (Remember my chassis raising exercise?) Although he could limp it to a nearby shop, he would not make the rendezvous in Texas. With Chris out of action our convoy consisted of 5 Porsches: Bob's '08 GT3, Ed's '67 911S (Ed Mayo, www.mayoperformance.com, a virtual guru of early Porsches), Mark's '74 914/6, Kevin's '86 911 Carrera, and my '72 911.

(Tuesday's soundtrack was a series of podcast of all varieties; including but not limited to Trans-Exclusionary Radical Feminism while crossing the great state of Texas)

We made Albuquerque in time for a casual dinner with another couple of vintage 911s; folks who'd be leaving the following day for their own drive to Rennsport. After stretching our legs a bit, we were back on the road to Winslow.

We'd made the 901 miles from Denton, TX to Winslow, AZ as an undulating Porsche convoy, arriving at the La Posada Hotel before 9pm. If you've never been to the La Posada, you should try to visit

at least once (http://www.laposada.org/) - it's a fantastic, historic hotel that doubles as an art gallery and has an award-winning restaurant among other things.

Interestingly, I was a guest in the Wiley Hardeman Post room; Post having been the first pilot to fly solo around the world. I noted the parallel between adventurer Post and myself (beginning and ending with "travelling solo" - and even then a stretch.)

Chris from Tulsa finally arrived in his '66 911R sometime after midnight, having driven all day after the emergency repair to catch up with us.
