LEGO Speed Champions Porsche 911 RSR and 911 Turbo 3.0. For the 911 fan of all ages. Regardless who builds it, I've seen Legos on more than a handful of corporate desks.



MID-WINTER TRACK SEMINAR

Sunday, January 20th, 2019 11:00 am to 1:00 pm Carolina Motorsports Park, Kershaw, SC

Have you considered participating in Carolinas Region's Drivers Education Events but have not had the opportunity to do so? Or maybe you have some questions: What to expect? Will it damage my car? Who are the instructors and how do they teach me? What do I have to do to my Porsche to participate? – If you have any of these questions or others, this event is for you! This is our annual off-track seminar to introduce the concepts behind the Carolinas Region's Driver Education Program, which is a series of high performance driving schools conducted at local tracks like Carolina Motorsports Park – IT IS NOT A RACING SCHOOL!

You will have the opportunity to casually discuss the program with instructors and club members that have been enjoying "life on the track" for years. We will discuss the operation of a Drivers Ed weekend, concentrating on what you need (or want) to know as a participant. We will also talk about some of the fundamental concepts of performance driving such as turning, braking and accelerating properly, and the vocabulary used to describe track driving. Videos and other materials will be used to give you a thorough understanding of what a weekend at the track entails. We'll discuss the roles of the instructors and how they can help you understand your car and your driving. We will discuss the safety check and tech inspection that is performed on each car to ensure a safe and enjoyable event. Finally, if time and weather allows, we'll tour the Carolina Motorsports Park track.

This seminar is open to all Carolinas Region members who have not participated in a Drivers Education event, or who have very limited experience on the track. **Region members with no prior track experience will receive a \$100 rebate after completing their first Carolinas Region DE event** You MUST pre-register to receive this rebate.

Driver's Education:

How To Be A Better Student

I've mentioned before that I subscribe to a weekly email called Speed Secrets Weekly that Ross Bentley distributes. He's a professional driving coach and author and absolutely adamant about continuing education and making yourself better as a driver and in life. His emails include a feature article by a guest writer and then a follow-up article he writes. One of his guest contributors is Ingrid Steffenson. She was a suburban mom and college professor who at age 41 decided to semi reluctantly follow her DE addicted husband to an event at Watkins Glen Raceway where she used her daily driver Mini Cooper for her first track event. The rest, as they say, is history. She quickly became a track addict and chronicles it all in her book "Fast Girl". She currently is still very active in track events and participates as needed either as a classroom instructor or doing in-car instructing.

The article she wrote for Speed Secrets Weekly had an interesting twist. Instead of reaching out to her fellow instructors to help them do a better job at a DE, her focus was on what a student could do to help get the most from their instructor. It's what she called "training your instructor". What I found fascinating was that most of the items she mentioned are the basics we teach to our new instructors at our annual Instructor school but just sort of in reverse. Here's an example. In our Instructor school we discuss doing a "5 minute interview" wherein the instructor would ask the student before going out in their first session a series of questions regarding their car, upgrades, driving history, tracks driven, learning style, professional background, etc. Ingrid's advice for students is "Tell Them About Yourself!" You may safely assume your instructor knows nothing about you beyond your run group and the car you drive. ... Your instructor is going to be making a psychological assessment of you, whether you're aware of it (or even like it), and anything you can share... is going to be really helpful in creating a useful dynamic between the two of you."

Another bit of wisdom for students she mentions is to "Establish a Baseline". Assuming this isn't your first time on track, your first session should concentrate not on proving what an aggressive and fast driver you are, but on running smooth and consistent laps. Hitting your marks the same each lap establishes a baseline that you and your instructor can work from on future sessions. And those smooth consistent laps puts your instructor at ease giving him a sense of security that he's working with someone he can trust. At the same time you're establishing this baseline your instructor has been taught to use this first session to make mental notes about areas they can help the student improve on over the weekend.

Next up is "Establish a Game Plan". Your instructor has made those mental notes above and is putting together a list of possible things to work on - his game plan for you. His list may be focused on things he's had good success teaching others to do...such as late braking for turn 8, using a bit of curbing

at the apex and then accelerating a bit sooner and harder out of that corner. But as a student you should have already been thinking prior to the event about a few things you want to work on - maybe for you it's threshold braking and trail braking. Have a discussion and reach mutual agreement on a game plan with no more than 1-2 items to work on each session. That keeps both the student and instructor in sync and focused.

At the end of the session, day or event "Ask for a Status Report". This can sometimes be a challenge for an Instructor with two students who is jumping in and out of cars but they should be making time during the event and hopefully after each session for a post drive discussion where they review again what the goals were for the session and how you did. We provide log books to students that Instructors should be taking time at the end of the weekend to fill out for their student. It normally would list things that were worked on and things to think about for the next events game plan. As a student, if you're not getting enough feedback just ask "How'd I do?". But be prepared to discuss your game plan and how you felt you executed it. Then be ready to listen and accept honest and constructive criticism.

One other thing Ingrid mentions as a closer is to "Thank Your Instructor". Remember that they are all volunteering their time to help make you a better, smarter and safer driver. They don't have to do it and there's no huge financial reward. Most do it as a way to give back to the sport and because they love to "see the lightbulb come on" when a student finally "gets it" - whatever that "it" was they've been working on with the student. And that positive relationship you've built with the Instructor just may come in handy when you're looking for someone to give you a check ride to advance a run group in the future.

I thought these tips might be helpful to the rather large number of Green and Blue run group students we have registered for our upcoming season finale DE on November 16-18 at VIR. This again looks like a sold out event. We had 120 participants signed up within the first 24 hours after registration opened and with a month still to go we're essentially at the limit of the run group sizes we utilize and have started a waitlist. The Track Team would like to once again thank Porsche of Greensboro, Porsche of Hickory and Quantum Speed Works for their sponsorships and support of this DE. Just a reminder that during the lunch hour on Saturday (noon) and Sunday (11:00), weather permitting, we will be conducting Charity Parade laps. This is open to any Carolinas Region member interested in driving the track at a slower speed. For a \$10 donation per car you'll go out with a group of 10-12 cars for several laps around the track using a lead/follow car to control speeds. It's a great way to experience the track while helping a charity.



Upcoming Events in 2019

Have you been thinking about doing a driver education event but still aren't sure what it's all about. We have our Winter Seminar coming up on January 20, 2019 at Carolina Motorsports Park. Look for the flyer and registration information in this issue of Tobacco Roads and mark your calendar.

Perhaps you've been a DE participant who has advanced to the point where you'd like to give back to the club as an Instructor. Our annual National Instructor School is set for Friday March 15, 2019 at CMP. If you've got the experience and desire, contact Shane Tisdale our Chief Instructor or look for the event posting on www.clubregistration.net. The PCA National Instructor School as taught by the Carolinas Region is accepted by the Motorsports Safety Foundation for Level 2 Instructor Certification.

Our first DE of the new year is scheduled for St. Patrick's Day weekend - March 16-17, 209 at Carolinas Motorsports Park in Kershaw, SC. Registration opens mid-January using www.clubregistration.net. HBi Auto has stepped up as sponsors for our spring and fall DE's at CMP in 2019. We thank them for their continued support and look forward to some special times at their hosted socials on Saturday evening!

THE GREAT AMERICAN ROAD TRIP

(Or, having fun fast in a Panamera) by Tom Reedy



The great American road trip is alive and well and still a lot of fun. My wife and I just completed a 7,100 mile roundtrip from Pinehurst, NC to San Francisco. Along the way we made many stops and saw some of the beauty of our country. We drove our 2015 Panamera 4S that we purchased in January 2017. This was our fourth driving trip to San Francisco in the last 15 years to visit our daughter, son-in-law and two wonderful grandchildren. Along the way we visited Pikes Peak and the Colorado National Monument, drove on several scenic byways, enjoyed time in Lake Tahoe, attended the Porsche Werks Reunion in Monterey and spent some time in Santa Fe. By the numbers we were on the road for 23 days, drove 7,126 miles, and averaged 25.4 miles to the gallon and 59 miles per hour. This article shares our trip and highlights why the Panamera helped make it so enjoyable.

Our first three days were a straight shot to Colorado Springs. We were not expecting any fun driving but we did find some. West of Asheville from the Maggie Valley exit in NC to the Foothills Parkway exit in TN (about 30 miles) I40 is a demanding highway with many sharp curves and lots of up and down. The speed limit is 55 mph. Trucks are restricted to the right lane only. Usually your speed is determined by the car in front of you in the left lane. When we arrived at this stretch there were no cars in the left lane. We switched to Sport mode and "let the big dog hunt" as they say in golf. The Panamera was up to the challenge and demonstrated why it is a great sports sedan. We had the left lane to ourselves for at least 25 minutes and enjoyed a great ride. It was like the Tail-of-the-Dragon on steroids. Afterword we wondered why we did not try Sport + mode. This was a fun way to begin our trip.


The real fun of the road trip began on the fourth day when we drove to the top of Pikes Peak, an altitude of 14,115 feet according to the signs at the top. There was a lot of construction equipment on the way up and at the top. They are building a new Summit House to replace the old and tired one currently at the top. The view was great but somewhat hazy. My wife and I had driven to the top many years ago when the last few miles were gravel. I am happy to report that the road to the top is now paved. The Panamera drove well to the top in Sport mode and down in Manual 1, 2 and 3.





From Pikes Peak we drove on scenic byways to Glenwood Springs CO. The highlight was our drive over Independence Pass on the Continental Divide at 12,095 feet. It is closed from October through May and it is easy to see why. Along the way we stopped at a small place, the Brown Dog Bakery and Cafe, and had a wonderful lunch. One of the enjoyable things about our road trips is discovering small restaurants with good food and fairly priced. No fast food for us. A fast car is enough.

The next day we had a leisurely drive to Grand Junction. We had a late lunch at Spoons, which is an outstanding small restaurant for breakfast, lunch and dinner. Its profits go to local charities. This was another great find. After lunch we drove to the Colorado National Monument, which sits on a 3,000 ft high Mesa. It is filled with beautiful rock formations and is an easy 23 mile drive. The observation points are right next to the road and require no hiking. We also saw a wild mountain goat.





We arrived in Lake Tahoe in time for a late lunch at the Sunnyside Lodge and Restaurant, where we were also staying. It is a lovely old rustic lodge on the northwest end of the lake. It has both lakefront and non-lakefront rooms. We had a charming room on the second floor overlooking the lake. The restaurant is outstanding. The Sunnyside is the hub of activities all day long. There is a lot to see and to do in Lake Tahoe. We only spent one full day, but it would be easy to spend a week. We highly recommend the Sunnyside if you plan to visit Lake Tahoe. This was our second stay.



The next day we drove to Dead Horse Point State Park in Utah. It has an iconic view of the Colorado River from an observation point high above. It was impressive but the air was hazy. We later found out that the haze in Utah and Nevada was from the wildfires burning in California. After visiting the park we did a quick trip through Moab and had great breakfast at the Pancake Haus. The French toast was excellent. From Moab we drove to Wendover UT. Wendover is on the state line of Utah and Nevada. It has several casinos in Nevada and has nothing to recommend it. It is for nightly lodging only. We happily discovered that the speed limit in Utah and Nevada was 80 in some places. On our drive from Wendover to Lake Tahoe we averaged 81 miles an hour on the 400 miles of Interstate even with road construction speed restrictions. The Panamera seemed to enjoy it.



The next big test for the Panamera was at my daughter's house. They live in Bernal Heights high on a hill overlooking San Francisco at the end of a dead-end street. It is narrow and parking is difficult. In addition, the house next to theirs is being restored and they were pouring concrete on two days. It is easy for a car to get some bumps and bruises in this neighborhood. They gave me their garage, but it was questionable if the Panamera would fit. It did with an inch clearance for the side view mirrors and a half inch front and rear.

On Friday we went to the Porsche Werks Reunion in Monterey. The car show was excellent. The classes were all interesting. The featured class was "The Outlaws." These are older Porsche's that were customized to increase power, improve performance and look cool. This was akin to heresy when these modifications were made. Outlaw #46 was there. It is a 1951 356 SL with distinctive aerodynamic wheel spats. It was the first Porsche to win its class at the Le Mans race. Rod Emory, the father of the Outlaw movement, gave a short discussion on the Outlaws and on the historic #46. The "Last Waltz" was there, which was the last air-cooled car built by Porsche. If this was not enough, Magnus Walker, "The Urban Outlaw" was there (with beard). He is a legendary collector of Porsche turbos with 25 cars worth \$7.5 million. He made his money as a fashion designer of grungy clothing that was worn by Madonna and Bruce Willis among others. Hurley Haywood was also there. He discussed his racing experiences and new book "Hurley from the Beginning," which has been well received by the automotive enthusiast community. And







I won't spend any time on San Francisco. It is a city in transition. Its skyline is changing and the many eclectic neighborhoods are becoming so expensive that only those in the upper economic classes can afford to buy and live there. We love to visit and always are impressed by the diversity of the city. My wife is a dedicated gardener and we always visit Golden Gate Park to see the Plant Conservatory and the Dahlia Garden if in bloom. The flowers are always fantastic.



Los Angeles and it was an important factor in the growth of that city. We made a quick visit to Sedona and also stopped at the Painted Desert and Petrified Forest National Park east of Flagstaff. It was interesting to see the fossilized remains of ancient trees and the beautiful landscapes of the painted desert.



The overhead highway road signs on the interstates in Arizona paid tribute to John McCain. They read "Country First. Rest In Peace. Senator McCain." A fitting tribute.


On our way home we took I40 to the south and old Route 66, "The Main Street of America," from Topock to Kingman Arizona. This 45 mile drive went through an old mining town, Oatman. It is a quaint old town with many of its original wooden buildings still standing and in use today. Burros wander the streets looking for handouts.

Our trip home was highlighted by a three day stay in Santa Fe. It is a fun city to visit. The adobe architecture is unique and attractive. Its setting in the mountains is beautiful. The shops and museums offer a wide range of art. Native Americans offer a wide variety of self-made artifacts. Good restaurants are plentiful.



Santa Fe has the oldest church in the continental United States, the San Miguel Mission, dating from around 1610. It has been rebuilt several times, but much of the original Church still remains, especially the interior.

Clark Gable and Carol Lombard honeymooned at the Oatman Hotel in 1939. Some of the gold mines are still being worked by private individuals. We enjoyed this side trip through history. Millions of people used route 66 to go from Chicago to





We drove to a small town, Chimayó, which is on the High Road to Taos. Every year during the week before Easter Sunday thousands of pilgrims start walks to El Santuario de Chimayó, a small mission renowned for its supposed healing effects from the earth around this humble shrine. By Easter Sunday more than 30,000 people make this pilgrimage. It was crowded when we visited and we could see that many people were there seeking its healing powers. This shrine is authentic, not tainted by any commercialism. It is a true spiritual experience for many of those who visit. Thousands of artifacts and pictures are visible from those who found spiritual and physical relief after visiting the shrine. On our drives around Santa Fe we saw a lovely cemetery high on a hill overlooking a beautiful mountain range.





Did we enjoy this road trip in the Panamera? Yes we did. Some of the features that helped to make this a fun trip include:

Navigation - it worked very well and helped us in both rain and at night when it was hard to see road signs. On a couple of occasions it did not get us to our destination, but it got us close. By restarting the navigation it did get us to our destination. We did know what routes we wanted to take and overrode the navigation several times. This was especially true when we followed scenic byways in some of the states.

Fold down rear seats - this feature allowed us to fit a cherished family dollhouse and all our luggage with room to bring home the many additional purchases we made on this trip.

Juke Box - we could listen to our music, appropriate to the drive we were on at that moment. We have more than 100 albums and 1,400 tracks stored in the juke box.

Sport Mode - great on winding roads and up and down stretches on both interstates and scenic byways.

Car Information - the analog gauges and the information on the dashboard display were helpful throughout the trip.

Trip Information - the ability to monitor daily trip information as well as capture the complete trip information was helpful.

24 Gallon Gas Tank - this gave us a 500 to 600 mile range every day and usually meant only one trip to the gas pump per day.

All Wheel Drive - the Panamera was always sure-footed both in dry and wet weather. A few short stretches on gravel and dirt roads were handled effortlessly.

Gas Mileage - we averaged 25.4 miles per gallon for the entire trip. This is much better than our previous trips and with \$4 to \$5 per gallon in California, Utah and Arizona we saved some money.

Climate Control - we set my side to 72 degrees and my wife's to 76 and never needed to change. Some days started in the 50's and reached the upper 80's and the car was comfortable all day.

Comfortable seats - even on long days we never felt sore; we also used the seat ventilation after short hikes that left us hot and sweaty.


