### UNIT DESCRIPTION

## Concept

God always accomplishes his plans.

## Goal

Students will learn that God's plans always happen and He promises to give us eternal life if we ask for His forgiveness. He wants to give us a joyful life.

# Background Information/Teacher Helps

## God's Incredible Plan • U3#1 1st-3rd Grade

Jacob's life is a story of God's patient and sovereign grace, as He slowly molds a deceptive schemer into a surrendered, godly man. It is also a story of the consequences of choosing not to trust God to fulfill His promises. Because Jacob didn't trust God to work out His promises, he forfeited the personal blessings God intended to freely give him.

"The ancient law of primogeniture provided that, under ordinary circumstances, the younger of two sons would be subservient to the older. God's election of the younger son highlights the fact that God's people are the product not of natural or worldly development but of his sovereign intervention in the affairs of men. Part of this verse is quoted in Ro. 9:10-12 as an example of God's sovereign right to do 'whatever pleases him' (Ps. 115:3)--Not in an arbitrary way (see Ro. 9:14), but according to His own perfect will. In ancient times the birthright included the inheritance rights of the firstborn (see Heb. 12:16). Jacob was ever the schemer, seeking by any means to gain advantage over others. But it was by God's appointment and care, not Jacob's wits, that he came into the blessing. Esau in despising his birthright proved himself to be 'godless' (Heb. 12:16), since at the heart of the birthright were the covenant promises that Isaac had inherited from Abraham."<sup>1</sup>

Jacob's life is an example of God fulfilling His plan, often in spite of our actions. In His sovereignty, God has provided a solution to all mankind's foolish choices by providing the way of salvation to all who turn to Him in faith.

And as believers, Jacob's life continues to sound familiar. All too often we set out to accomplish God's will in our way, forgetting about our blessings in Christ Jesus. The children and we can learn from Jacob's life the folly of not trusting God to accomplish what He has promised. As a result, we can experience His promised blessings as we learn to depend on Him to work out His Incredible Plan.

### Activity Stations:

- **Craft – “My Way / God’s Way Maze”**
  - **Instructions:** Give each student a copy of the maze. Have them try to solve the maze by coloring the path of the water with marker, pen or pencil. After several attempts have been made to solve the maze, give a copy of the transparency with the solution. They will lay the transparency over the maze to see the correct path.
- **Research – “Birthright”**
  - **Instructions:** Give each student a copy of the worksheet. Read about Jacob and Esau on pages 24-25 of Children’s Guide to the Bible. Look up “birthright” in the Baker Bible Dictionary for Kids. Discuss the concept of a birthright with the students.
- **Missions Prayer**
  - **Instructions:** Talk about and pray for the Oasis Giving campaign.

### Drama - "I'll Do It My Way" skit performed by the drama team.

Today we are going to learn about a man who believed in God but didn’t trust Him to keep His promises. Let’s gather with the other classes to see a skit about Jacob.

We’ve seen that Jacob’s way and God’s way don’t agree. But God chose Jacob to be the one through whom He would work to carry out His plan. Our key verse is, "People can make all kinds of plans, but only the Lord’s plan will happen" (Proverbs 19:21). Let’s go back to our classrooms and learn how we are often like Jacob and how we can learn to trust God.

**Instructions:** As the students respond to the first three questions question, draw the corresponding symbol on the white board.

Let’s do a quick review of God’s promises we have learned so far this year.

- Who remembers the promise God made to Adam and Eve? (He promised a Messiah to pay for their sin. Draw a cross.)
- To Noah? (He promised He would never destroy the earth again with a flood. Draw an ark – the symbol of salvation or a rainbow – the reminder of the promise that He would never again destroy the earth by flood.)
- To Abraham? (He made a covenant, promising land, descendants as many as there are stars in the sky and that all people of the world would be blessed through descendants. Draw a globe w/ lots of ☺ all over it.)
- Were any of these promises part of His plan to save us from our sin? (Yes, all parts were.) How? (Savior, Noah’s ark a picture of salvation, Messiah to come through Abraham’s descendants.)
- Some people have trusted God a little, some a lot and some not at all. Does the way people view God have any bearing on His ability to accomplish His plan? (No. God is able to accomplish whatever He wishes.)

### Transition Learning Activity# 2 Sm. Groups

- What does that tell you about God? (God is powerful, wise and in control.) This is what we call God's sovereignty.

#### **Instructions: Read pages 46-51 of Grandpa's Box.**

Some of you may be fighting and struggling like Jacob because you don't even know that God has amazing promises for you. He promises to give you a full life, to provide everything you need and to be with him forever. All you must do is to tell him you know that you need his forgiveness for all your bad choices and bad attitudes. Tell him you want to be his child. When you do that, he will forgive you because Jesus paid for your sin when He died on the cross. In John 10:10 Jesus said, "I came to give life—life in all its fullness." That is what God wanted to give Jacob. But because Jacob didn't depend on God, he was fearful, and separated from his family. "People can make all kinds of plans, but only the Lord's plan will happen" (Proverbs 19:21).

Let's get into small groups to discuss this. Bring your Bibles.

Jacob schemed to accomplish God's plan his way. And Jacob experienced the consequences of his sin. But God chose to bring the Messiah to the world through him.

- In what way is Jacob's life an example of God's grace? (Jacob didn't deserve God's acceptance or favor. He went about getting God's blessing in a very sinful way. Yet God was patient; He blessed, protected and pursued him.)
- If God said it, He will do it the right way, even though it looks impossible to us. What promises has God made to us?
- Where can we find these promises in the Bible
  - Those who aren't His children
    - He promises that He wants to have a relationship with you – John 3:16;
    - that you can have a relationship with Him – John 1:12
    - He doesn't want anyone to go to hell – 2 Pet.3:9
    - He wants to know you – Jn. 12:32; Rev. 3:20
  - Those who are His children
    - He will never leave us – Rom 8:38-39; Ps. 37:28; Heb. 13:5
    - He will always provide what we need – Matt. 6:8, 32; Lk. 12:22-30; Jn. 10:11-16; Heb. 4:16; 1 Cor. 10:13; 2 Peter 1:3
    - We will be in heaven with Him after we die – Jn. 14:2-3; Eph. 1:13-14.
- Has there ever been a time when you couldn't see any way for things to work and yet God provided in a way you could never have guessed? Explain. (Teachers, be ready with an example from your life when you saw something as hopeless and told God you needed His help, then He supernaturally provided.)

## **Learning Activity# 2 Continued**

In John 10:10 Jesus says “I came to give life—life in all its fullness.” That is what God wanted to give Jacob. But because Jacob didn’t depend on God, he did not live a fulfilled life. Instead he was fearful and alienated from his family. “People can make all kinds of plans, but only the Lord’s plan will happen” (Proverbs 19:21).

Let’s pray and thank God for His plan, especially His gift of salvation. Pray that we will learn to depend on God and trust Him to do the seemingly impossible.
