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ESAU AND JACOB

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Here are some striking ironies:

- Isaac lies to Abimelech; Jacob lies to Isaac
- Jacob, the great liar is deceived by an even greater liar: Laban
- The Ten trick Jacob re: Joseph; Joseph tricks the Ten

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LIES, LIES AND MORE LIES

What are some examples you read of lying in Genesis?

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We witness deceit all around, contrasting with God's promises:

- Abraham and Isaac to Abimelech(s), Pharaoh
- Rebekah and Jacob to Isaac
- Jacob and Laban to one another
- Brothers to Shechemites

In light of Genesis 3, this is a revealing pattern, especially since one of the few things we learn there is that the Serpent is a liar.

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SPIRITUAL TRAINING AND PARENTHOOD

Isaac's Passivity and Sensuousness:

- "Now Isaac loved Esau, because he had a taste for game [Lit. game was in his mouth]"
- Gets Hittite Wives for Esau
- No indication of deep teaching, very ignorant sons
- Remarkable silence on Isaac overall (Cf. 8 or so Abrahamic Theophanies vs. one for Isaac)

Later in the Pentateuch:

Deut 11:18,19—You shall therefore impress these words of mine on your heart and on your soul; and you shall bind them as a sign on your hand, and they shall be as frontals on your forehead. You shall teach them to your sons, talking of them when you sit in your house and when you walk along the road and when you lie down and when you rise up

REVELATION AND SPIRITUAL DEVELOPMENT

God patiently helps Jacob progress from total ignorance to appreciation of the God of History:

- 28:12-22 Incongruity of Jacob's Vow after God's promise
- 30:37; 31:12 Jacob's Magic, Manipulation vs. God's Promise
 - 32:9-12 Jacob prays and cites God's revelation to him (finally!)
 - 32:22-32 Wrestles with God (Cf. Abraham's before S & G)
 - 33:20 Jacob sets up an altar in Shechem
 - 35:9-15 Jacob called to return to Bethel, Promise Confirmed

REVELATION AND SPIRITUAL DEVELOPMENT

God patiently helps Jacob progress from total ignorance to appreciation of the God of History:

- 37:11 His father kept the [dreams] in mind
- 42:36 "All these things are against me"
- 45:27 The spirt of their father Jacob revived.
 - 48:3 "God Almighty appeared to me at Luz ..."
- 48:15,6 "The God before whom my fathers Abraham and Isaac walked, The God who has been my shepherd all my life to this day, The angel who has redeemed me from all evil,"
- 49:24,5 [Joseph's] arms were agile, From the hands of the Mighty One of Jacob (From there is the Shepherd, the Stone of Israel), From the God of your father who helps you,

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TEXTUAL PUZZLES

Within Genesis there is disagreement on Esau's wives:

There are theories about the distinct names, but peculiar commonalities are so striking as to suggest textual corruption.

AN EDITORIAL UPDATE?

Genesis 36:31 is claimed to be evidence of some kind of editorial updating (redaction):

Now these are the kings who reigned in the land of Edom before any king reigned over the sons of Israel.

How could Moses know there would be a king? How about the following references to Israelite kings:

- Gen 17:16-...kings of peoples will come from [Sarah] ...
- Gen 35:11-... And kings shall come forth from you [Jacob].
- Gen 49:10-The scepter shall not depart from Judah . . .
- Numbers 24:7,17-his [Israel's] king shall be higher than Agag ... A scepter shall rise from Israel
- Deut 17:18-Now it shall come about when [the king] sits on the throne of his kingdom...

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BROADER CAUTION ON COMMENTARY

Regarding Esau's genealogies:

In all likelihood, the narrator has contribed this list in order to have twelve "grandsons" ... counted as such by excluding Amalek the son of a concubine and by including the sons of Oholibamah. (Waltke, 484)

Reasons for Caution:

- The text really does not support this arrangement: if Moses wanted to use pattern, he could have not listed Amalek.
- Moses does use numerical devices for framing at times; Waltke strikes every number as a nail because he has a hammer.
- Generally, advanced knowledge can be useful but it can also confuse.
 Commentaries are not themselves Scripture.

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A peculiar theme running throughout Genesis is that even those who aren't elect are nevertheless formed into nations:

ISHMAEL Gen 17:20- "As for Ishmael, I have heard you; behold, I will bless him and will make him fruitful and will multiply him exceedingly. He shall become the father of twelve princes, and I will make him a great nation."

ABRAHAM'S DESCENDANTS

ISHMAEL Gen 21:13-"And of the son of the maid I will make a nation also, because he is your seed."

VIA KETURAH "And the sons of Dedan were Asshurim, Letushim, Leummim"

ESAU Gen 25:23-The Lord said to [Rebekah], "Two nations are in your womb ..."

Implication: God forms nations and provides land for Abraham's children far beyond the children of promise.

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JUDAH AND TAMAR

Some claim that this episode is a late addition, presumably because it breaks Joseph's narrative.

Reasons why this break actually fits:

- These are semi-chronological. It's the most natural place to put the narrative, since it's during the interim between Judah giving up Joseph and his arrival in Egypt.
- Rough pattern of godly sons being discussed later and longer
- 38:1- "Judah departed from his brothers," indicates a deliberate contrast with Joseph's forceful exile.
- The break could be for establishing a literary sense of exile. It heightens the tension to have a digression before seeing how God redeemed the situation.

JOSEPH'S LIFE OF WAITING

- GEN 37:2 Age 17-Received Dreams
- GEN 37:36 Age 17(ish)- Sold into Slavery (Pejorative "Dreamer!")
 - GEN 39:2 Age Early-20s?- Potiphar's Chief Servant
- GEN 39:20 Age Mid-20s?-Thrown in Jail
 - GEN 41:1 Age 28- Stuck in Jail, Interprets Dreams for Cupbearer, Baker
- GEN 41:46 Age 30-Interprets Pharoah's Dreams, Appointed Chief Administrator
 - GEN 45:6 Age 37-Brothers Appear in Egypt
 - GEN 45:6 Age 39-Reveals himself
- GEN 47:9, 28 Age 57-Jacob Dies, Brothers Fear Joseph (use Gen 25:26)
 - GEN 50:24 Age 110- Dies, Requests Burial in Canaan

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FULFILLMENT OF PROMISE

Let's review God's work through Abraham's descendants so far:

- 1 In Genesis 11, Abraham was in Ur with no children.
- 2 At age 100, Abraham has one child (no nation, no property in Canaan).
- 3 Threat to Promise: Jacob in exile, in danger of murder
- 4 Gen 33:18, Jacob returns to Canaan safely, worships God.
- 5 Threat to Promise: Joseph in exile, Simeon captured by tyrant, Benjamin caught in theft! Plus, there's famine in Canaan!
- 6 The whole family settles in Egypt, granted most fertile land for national development.
- 7 Abraham, Isaac and Jacob are all buried in Canaan, the promise land. (50:14)

What should we take from this?

FULFILLMENT OF PROMISE

What should we take from this?

- 1 When God makes a promise, he means it.
- 2 God is still working even amidst apparent total chaos.
- 3 We know from our standpoint that Israel becomes a nation, receives the land and Abraham's seed comes 2000 years later! God will not allow his word to fall to the ground.

Matthew 24:35-Heaven and earth will pass away, but My words will not pass away.
