**The Smannell and Enham Church of England (Aided) Primary School** is currently in need of new Foundation Governors.

Governors are one of the largest volunteer forces in the country and have an important part to play in raising school standards. The role of the governing body is absolutely key to the effectiveness of a school. Ofsted (the national inspection body for schools) has noted that the most effective schools demonstrate effective leadership and management, and that includes the leadership brought by the governing body.



Our school Governing Body is made up of people who come to us through a variety of routes and with a range of different backgrounds, skill and experiences, but they are all volunteers who work together for the benefit of the School and are the link between the School and the community it serves.

The role of the Governing Body is a strategic one and its key functions are to set the aims and objectives for the school; set the policies and targets for achievement; monitor and evaluate the progress the school is making, all this while being a source of challenge and support to the headteacher (a critical friend).

This isn't an application to be taken lightly, as it involves time, energy and a willingness to become involved in the life of the school on a regular basis over at least four years. However, it is very rewarding, as together we can strategically input into the school and see another generation of children growing in knowledge and development within our community. A Foundation Governor represents the Church of England and should be a regular communicant within the Church.

## REPORT ON PCC MEETING HELD ON 1st DECEMBER 2015 AT JUBILEE HOUSE

All PCC members were present and the meeting was chaired by Rev. Alex Randle-Bissell, who opened with a reading from the Epistle of St. Paul to the Corinthians, followed by prayers.

The Minutes of the previous meeting were approved and signed as correct by the Churchwarden.

Rev. Alex informed the meeting that it was hoped to arrange a Benefice website to incorporate a central diary system and a separate page for each Parish.

Rev. Val and Elizabeth agreed to continue their efforts to find new Governors for the School.

Two Safeguarding Officers had been appointed to the Benefice and were in training.

Further enquiries would be made regarding the safety of the uphill path in the Burial Ground at Christ Church.

Elizabeth explained her proposals to celebrate the 160th anniversary of the consecration of the churches, both called Christ Church, in Smannell and Hatherden. The Council welcomed the ideas put forward by Elizabeth and she agreed to form a small sub-committee to take the matter further.

Mr. & Mrs. Michael Dawson had kindly offered to provide the wine and mince pies for those staying after the Christmas Eve Service at Christ Church. Rev. Alex did not wish to alter the pattern of Services for the time being, but it was agreed that in future, services at Christ Church would commence at 1030. The Remembrance Service at St. George's had gone extremely well. Efforts to organize the cleaning of Christ Church were continuing.

Agreed charitable donations of £100 each had been made to the British Red Cross (International), Naomi House (Regional) and the Hampshire Air Ambulance (local). A donation towards the cost of floodlighting Christ Church over the Christmas period had been received from a local donor.

A meeting of the Benefice Treasurers had been held, the main topics of discussion being the need for a Benefice bank account to pay for shared central

costs and the actions by the Weyhill Treasurer to standardize funeral costs across the Benefice. All accounts payable were up to date and receipts banked up to the end of November. An Administrator would be needed to organize dates and venues for weddings, baptisms etc. and the centralization of forms etc. throughout the Benefice.

The Craft Group was continuing to meet. There would be a Christmas Eve service at Christ Church at 11.30 p.m. and a Christmas Day Service at St. George's at 10 a.m.

Rev. Alex then outlined his plans and hopes for the future of the Benefice.

The next PCC meeting would be held on 2nd February at 6 p.m. at Jubilee House.

The meeting closed with the Grace at 8.13 p.m.

I would just like to mention we have lost 2 good friends lately: Rev. David King and dear Lil Robson. I got to know the King family many years back when he married my son John and his fiancé Debby, also his wife and daughter ran yoga classes at the New Church in Colebrook Close, Weyhill Road.

I don't quite know when Frank and Lil were married. Frank was in the Army pre-war and one time was up on the North West Frontier in India as a Despatch Rider with a Signals Unit. #### **Neighbourhood Watch**

#### **Safer Christmas**

Leave it to the last minute to put presents out under the tree and don't leave them in view of the window.

If you are buying or receiving valuable gifts such as bikes, mobiles or electrical items, register them for free at <a href="www.immobilise.com">www.immobilise.com</a>. Doing this can assist the police in returning your property should it be lost or stolen. Refrain from keeping large amounts of cash at home.

A secure home will reduce the chance of burglary. Make sure that windows and doors are locked and remove keys from sight every time you leave the house. When you do go out at night make it appear that someone is at home. Draw the curtains and leave a light on. You could always put a lamp or radio on a timer switch.

Dispose of packaging by breaking it down before putting it in the bin. Empty boxes left outside can advertise that you have nice new goods inside.

Ensure that your contents insurance adequately covers the additional things that you have in your home over Christmas.

#### **Credit / Debit cards**

Before inserting your card have a look at the machine to check it looks normal. When inserting your PIN number make sure others around you cannot see the code.

Avoid carrying large amounts of cash. Only withdraw what you might reasonably need.

Put your money and cards safely away before leaving the machine.

#### Scam

There has been a recent series of incidents whereby fraudsters either phone or attend the home address of elderly members of the public claiming to be police officers.

The fake officer/s will claim that they are investigating a fraud where an elderly person is the victim. They will then request to see their bank cards and PIN numbers of the victim claiming that they are needed for investigation purposes.

REMEMBER the Police will NEVER ask for your PIN, Passwords or Bank Account details. NEVER give them to anybody.

A short while later I received a call from an 'Accounts Manager at Amazon' informing me that as the package was already on the van, the bill of £987 had been paid from my account and the only way that this amount could be refunded to me was if I gave him the last 4 digits of my Debit card. I went to get my card, but decided to play it safe and refused to give him the digits. He was very persuasive - but eventually hung up. It was a very upsetting experience and I urge everyone to be on their quard.

#### I don't need to have a Good Memory

A while ago an accusation was levelled at me that was intended as a criticism, but I had to accept the comment was totally accurate – and I don't care. My accuser (there is a long waiting list if you want to join), told me that they knew a dark secret. They said that I had been gossiping. Now I don't know about you, but talking to my friends and neighbours is the staple diet of my daily routine. If that's gossip, then I am guilty as charged.

However there is just a small problem – my memory does let me down from time to time, so to make up the short fall of detail, I do tend to exaggerate. Actually I have never let facts get in the way of a good story. As a rule, people that know me take a pinch of salt with everything I say.

On those occasions that I get a bit carried away (obviously very few), there is a safeguard. It comes in the form of Mrs Hampshire, who will interrupt my flow with an injection of her version of the story. Of course this creates an opportunity for me to counter attack with my recollection of events. To the untrained eye, this looks like bickering, but we are skilled practitioners, and the difference of opinion can dissolve as quickly as it flares up, and we move on to the next area of dispute.

## Edwin George William Clarke "Nobby"

B: 4th March 1925



Born in Andover Edwin moved to The Firs Malthouse Lane in 1932 aged 7 when his father purchased a piece of land to build a new home for his wife and son. Edwin attended Smannell infants school moving to the Grammar school in Andover. When he was around 11 years old he was being a typical boy climbing trees at the park in Enham and fell smashing his right elbow. He was taken to London for pioneering surgery using pins and plates to save it. Thankfully it worked although he was never able to completely straighten it again.

When war came Edwin was called up and went into the Royal Navy Fleet Air Arm and found himself fixing aircraft as they returned from conflict. He was posted to many points in the UK and Ireland but his fondest memories were of his time at HMS Goldcrest in the Welsh town of Dale Pembrokshire. Edwin loved the area so much he returned many times after the war with his wife Mavis and daughter Elaine for happy family holidays and loved nothing better than taking his small dinghy out into St Brides bay fishing.

Towards the end of the war Edwin elected to take a course in woodwork offered by the navy which is where his love of wood began. As a test he had to make something in class and he made a stand for his metal lathe which was very heavy and when he was finally demobbed at Yeovilton he brought it home on the train carrying it the final few miles.

Probably the happiest and proudest day of his life was the 6<sup>th</sup> September 1947 when he married his beloved Mavis at St Marys Church. Mavis and Edwin shared a very happy 68 years together although like every marriage there were some ups and downs.

Once back as a civilian Edwin started a career as an Auto Electrician: he was always proud that he never had a single day out of work. His most fond memories were of his time at Anna Valley Motors. Friends he made while working there he kept contact with for many years. When Anna Valley Motors closed down Edwin started work for Wheelers Newbury but that winter was especially harsh and he decided to get a job nearer home. Monro's of Andover fitted the bill and he stayed there until retiring.

In 1952 Edwin's father gave him a piece of land next to the Firs which Edwin with his wife Mavis made into the Anchorage and this remained his very happy family home raising their only daughter.

After he retired Edwin was never bored, his comprehensive workshop filled his days making and fixing all sorts of things. He was expert in creating spinning wheels, he delighted many a child (& adult) with his beautiful rocking horses, he fixed all sorts of things & I'm sure many of you have visited his workshop with something broken or damaged and picked it up a few days later back how it should be. He had a wonderful sense of humour and was always ready for a laugh or micky take. He made many friends in and around the area and they meant an awful lot to him.

When his daughter and son in law bought the property from Edwin's sister opposite, Edwin spent many many days working alongside the builders doing any amount of varied building jobs. When questioned as to what he thought he was doing on the roof at the age of 80 he simply said "putting tiles on what do you think ??"

Edwin adored his wife & daughter and was thrilled when he became a grandad with his only grandchild Samantha. Samantha has a passion for horses and has two that live next to The Anchorage. At the age of 84 Edwin decided he would like to get back in the saddle he used to occupy when working on the farms as a young lad so the horse was saddled up and Edwin was installed.

Edwin was a fantastic husband, provider & father. He was generous to a fault and was always willing to help anyone. He was loved by all that knew him and leaves a huge unfillable hole not only in the hearts of his family but to the community of Smannell, Little London and Enham.
