EDITORIAL

December is a good time to reflect. To look back on what has happened, and also a time to look forward to the coming year.

To use an analogy from the world of business, you can analyse your Balance Sheet. Have you achieved what you intended? How is your health? Are your relationships still in good order, and perhaps have you reduced your liability to others, and made yourself more of an asset to friends and neighbours? Are you solvent financially and emotionally?

And for the future – Do you know where you're going, can you see the road ahead, and do you know what you need to do to achieve your forecast?

Well perhaps not everyone looks at things this way, I can't help myself, and of course I accept that others will see things differently from me.

However at least everyone reading this has the chance to review their life and make plans for the future if they choose. Tragically, we have learnt that at least 130 people in Paris have been denied the opportunity to plan a future. The lives of their extended family, their friends and work colleagues, have changed forever.

At the time of writing the position is rapidly changing, but events like this cause even the most cynical of us to stop and think. What kind of world are we living in, where (and this is my personal view) a group of terrorists can hijack a country, a religious faith, an ethnic group, and feel that they have a justification for murdering people enjoying a relaxed Friday evening in a cultured European capital city?

What on earth is their business plan, do they want to attract others to their cause, provoke a reciprocal violent reaction, highlight a security weakness, or maybe achieve a change of regime? Is there a financial gain in their actions, or do they want to attract attention to a perceived injustice?

It has been said that Democracy is the very worst form of Government - apart from all the others. Fortunately it is the system that allows us the freedom to plan our own lives. So when we stop to reflect on the events of this appalling weekend in Paris, we should remember that these actions and consequences were due to a group of criminals, who do not represent anyone other than themselves, and they should be dealt with accordingly.

Ramblings from the Rectory...

I heard a story the other day about a 5-year-old boy who missed his biscuit at school. His mum had asked him what sort of a day he had enjoyed. Not very good, was the reply, and so his mum asked him why. I missed my biscuit today, he said, because I was too busy.

So what were you too busy doing, asked his mum, and he replied, I was too busy eating cake!

Well, from the young boy's perspective, cake was no substitute for his biscuit, whereas you and I might quite welcome a slice of cake for a change!

But he saw things with a child's logic from a completely different perspective.

Christmas is an invitation for us to look at things from a different perspective. The miracle of the birth of a child is something that we almost take for granted. A human baby is a symbol of life and hope and each new human life is miraculous. In the birth of Jesus, what moves us is not the thought of the power of God, but the vulnerability of God. It is the vulnerability of a baby being born in fragility and danger, with no wealth and power or privilege to protect him.

Christmas is a time to be enjoyed, a time to be celebrated, and maybe especially a time of joy.

People seem to know that Christmas is a time of joy, even if they can't quite explain why.

It's as though there is a deep instinct inside us, that Christmas is a time for seeing the good in each other, and the world. And that can be quite hard for us to do sometimes, but I am reminded of last year's Christmas advert for Sainsbury's which showed that even amongst the guns and slaughter of the 1st World War, there was a moment of peace and goodwill.

And as we reflect on the Paris bombings and indeed upon much of the rest of the needless slaughter happening in different parts of our world today, we are reminded that Jesus came to bring peace. As Christians we know that evil will not have the last word, because it has been dealt with finally and decisively upon

the cross. We perhaps may think of the words of Martin Luther King...."Darkness cannot drive out darkness, only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate, only love can do that". Soon we will hear familiar words from St John's Gospel in our Christmas services - The light has shone in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it. Among the many landmarks lit up across the world with the colours of the French flag, perhaps the most moving was the Brazilian statue of Christ the Redeemer. Christ the Redeemer, whose death has won the final victory, empowering us by his Spirit, to respond to hate with love, to respond to violence with peace, to respond to darkness with light.

And so at Christmas, as we prepare to celebrate the light of Christ coming into the world, we remember gift and generosity and open expressions of love. You don't need a faith to understand that these things make life worth living. But the Christian story suggests that gift and generosity and love are basic to what God does at Christmas, although we sometimes need to re-learn this truth from others. In the birth of Jesus, God offers us a new perspective on life - a new way and a new outlook. In that baby we see the whole loving activity of God at work within his creation. And this Christmas, once again we prepare to meet him with joy, and thanksgiving for his gift, so freely given; the gift of love; God's very self in Jesus Christ.

May the peace and joy of the Christ Child be with you this Christmas.

The Smannell and Enham Church of England (Aided) Primary School is currently in need of new Foundation Governors.

Governors are one of the largest volunteer forces in the country and have an important part to play in raising school standards. The role of the governing body is absolutely key to the effectiveness of a school. Ofsted (the national inspection body for schools) has noted that the most effective schools demonstrate effective leadership and management, and that includes the leadership brought by the governing body.



Our school Governing Body is made up of people who come to us through a variety of routes and with a range of different backgrounds, skill and experiences, but they are all volunteers who work together for the benefit of the School and are the link between the School and the community it serves.

The role of the Governing Body is a strategic one and its key functions are to set the aims and objectives for the school; set the policies and targets for achievement; monitor and evaluate the progress the school is making. All this while being a source of challenge and support to the headteacher (a critical friend).

This isn't an application to be taken lightly, as it involves time, energy and a willingness to become involved in the life of the school on a regular basis over at least four years. However, it is very rewarding, as together we can strategically input into the school and see another generation of children growing in knowledge and development within our community. A Foundation Governor represents the Church of England and should be a regular communicant within the Church.

We would be delighted to hear from anyone who has an interest in the performance of the school, but also a willingness to listen and help us make informed decisions to develop the school forward.






