SMANNELL PARISH COUNCIL

Little London Road:

At the suggestion of Little London residents, two parish councillors moved the 30 mph sign at the village entrance to the village to improve visibility. Also, the suggestion for a hard standing by the bus stop outside the village is being reviewed by the Hampshire County Council.

Defibrillators:

Training was given by the Ambulance Service at the Augusta Park Community Centre and some 20 members of the public attended. It was very disappointing that the defibrillator in the phone box in Little London was vandalised. The unit was ripped off the wall, breaking the withholding strap. A smashed bottle was left on the floor. It is not known whether the damage was caused by residents, visitors, or perhaps vandals passing through.

Dog-bins in Little London:

It was proposed at the meeting by members of the public that two dog-bins be installed, one at the top of Big Street the other by the playing fields. Councillors considered the idea to be sound but we have requested comments from other residents. Please contact the Smannell Parish Council chairman.

Green Lane traffic speed:

Hampshire County Council has advised that it knows of very few accidents in Upper Enham and as such it is not wishing to have a 30 mph limit on the road. Residents who can give details of accidents on this road are asked to contact the Smannell Parish Council chairman.

Theft:

Break-ins have occurred around the parish and all residents are cautioned to keep their houses and property secure.

Smannell Road Footway:

Hampshire County Council has now agreed to the funding for the footway from Augusta Park to Smannell village. To re-cap: there would be a footway from Augusta Park to the first two cottages on the left around the bad bend, after this section the verge will be flattened to provide a refuge until Ashley Copse where a path may be put in. The council has said it would prefer a tarmac path but the Parish Council has objected and has said, if necessary, it would be willing to pay for any upkeep of a gravel path and have no paved path by Ashley Copse.

It may surprise you to know that almost 3.5 million disabled people in the UK feel lonely on a daily basis with 350,000 people expected to spend Christmas alone. Here at Enham Trust, we work hard to create various opportunities for our customers to make new friends, learn new skills, and achieve positive emotional wellbeing: opportunities such as Choices, the upcoming 'Hub' café, and our weekly Older Persons' Day Services for those with Dementia.

Many of the 1.4 million unpaid carers that look after loved-ones continue caring during the festivities, contributing over \pounds 22.4 billion-worth of time and energy to the economy while caring for a vulnerable loved one. 166,000 people under the age of 18 will be acting as a young carer for a disabled parent or sibling. All staggering statistics that may be difficult to read at this time of year. The Christmas Story

Long ago, about 2000 years, when King Herod ruled Judea (now part of Israel), God sent the angel Gabriel to a young woman who lived in the northern town of Nazareth. The girl's name was Mary and she was engaged to marry Joseph.



The angel Gabriel said to Mary: 'Peace be with you! God has blessed you and is pleased with you.' Mary was very surprised by this and wondered what the angel meant. The angel said to her 'Don't be afraid, God has been very kind to you. You will become pregnant by the Holy Spirit and give birth to a baby boy and you will call him Jesus. He will be God's own Son and his kingdom will never end. 'Mary was very afraid but she trusted God. 'Let it happen as God chooses', she replied to the angel. Gabriel also told Mary that her cousin, Elizabeth who everyone thought was too old to have children, would have a baby boy whom God had chosen to prepare the way for Jesus.

Mary said goodbye to her family and friends and went to visit her cousin Elizabeth and her husband Zachariah. Elizabeth was very happy to see Mary. She knew that Mary had been chosen by God to be the mother of his Son. An angel had already told Zechariah that Elizabeth's baby would prepare people to welcome Jesus. He was to be called John. Mary stayed with Elizabeth about three months and then returned home to Nazareth.

Joseph was worried when he found out that Mary was expecting a baby before their marriage had taken place. He wondered if he should put off the wedding altogether. Then an angel appeared to Joseph in a dream and said: 'Don't be afraid to have Mary as your wife'. The angel explained that Mary had been chosen by God to be the mother of his Son and told Joseph that the baby would be named Jesus which means 'Saviour' because he would save people. When Joseph woke up, he did what the angel had told him to do and took Mary as his wife.

At this time, the land where Mary and Joseph lived was part of the Roman Empire. The Roman Emperor Augustus wanted to have a list of all the people in the empire, to make sure they paid their taxes. He ordered everyone to return to the town where their families originally came from, and enter their names in a register (or census) there. Mary and Joseph travelled a long way (about 70 miles) from Nazareth to Bethlehem, because that is where Joseph's family came from. Most people walked but some lucky people had a donkey to help carry the goods needed for the journey. Joseph and Mary travelled very slowly because Mary's baby was due to be born soon.



When they reached Bethlehem they had problems finding somewhere to stay. So many people had come to register their names in the census, that every house was full and every bed was taken in all of the guest rooms. The only place to stay that they could find was with the animals. People often kept animals in the house, especially at night, and used them like 'central heating'! People normally slept on a raised/upper level with the animals below to give them extra warmth.

So in the place where the animals slept, Mary gave birth to Jesus, the Son of God.

In those days it was the custom to wrap newborn babies tightly in a long cloth called 'swaddling clothes'. Jesus' bed was the manger from which the animals ate their hay,

In the hills and fields outside Bethlehem, shepherds looked after their sheep through the long night. As the new day began, suddenly an angel appeared before them and the glory of God shone around them. The shepherds were very, very scared, but the angel said, 'Don't be afraid. I have good news for you and everyone. Today in Bethlehem a Saviour has been born for you. You will find the baby lying in a manger'.



Then many more angels appeared, lighting up the sky. The shepherds heard them praising God singing: 'Glory to God in highest, and peace to everyone on earth.' When the angels had gone the shepherds said to one another, 'Let's go to Bethlehem to see what has happened. So the shepherds went to Bethlehem and found Mary and Joseph. The baby Jesus was lying in a manger as they had been told. When they saw him, they told everyone what the angel had said and everyone who heard the story were astonished. Then the shepherds returned to their sheep, praising God for sending his Son to be their Saviour.

When Jesus was born, a brand new bright star appeared in sky. Some Wise Men in faraway countries saw the star and guessed what it meant. They were very clever men who studied the stars and had read in very old writings that a new star would appear when a great king was born. They set out to find the new king and bring him gifts.

The Wise Men followed the star towards the country of Judea and when they got to the capital called Jerusalem they began to ask people: 'Where is the child who is born to be king of the Jews?' Herod, the king of Judea, heard this and it made him very angry to think that someone might be going to take his place as king. Herod sent for the Wise Men to come to him. He told them to go on following the star until they had found the baby king. He said: 'When you have found him, let me know where he is, so that I can go and worship him.' But Herod did not tell them that he really had an evil plan in mind to kill the new king.

The Wise Men followed the star towards Bethlehem (where it said that the king would be born). It seemed to stop and shine directly down upon the place where Jesus was.

The Wise Men entered the house where they now lived and found Jesus with Mary; they bowed down and worshipped him. The Wise Men spread before Jesus the gifts they had brought. The gifts were gold, frankincense and myrrh. The Wise Men were warned in a dream, by God, not to go back to Herod. So they returned home to their countries in the East by a different way.



When the Wise Men had gone, an angel appeared to Joseph in a dream. 'Get up,' the angel said, 'take Jesus and Mary and escape to Egypt. Stay there until I tell you, for Herod is going to search for Jesus to kill him.' So Joseph got up during the night and left for Egypt, taking Jesus and Mary with him.
