### **GREAT FOOTSTEPS AND FOOTPRINTS**

"We all do think of doing something in life; be it significant or not, do something positive. If you pursue great footsteps, you leave great footprints". This is a quote taken from the book 'Distinctive Footprints of Life: Where are You Headed To?' by the author and philosopher Ernest Yeboah.



Well, Liz Hall is someone who epitomises the phrase "A Truly Remarkable Woman" and she has lived in our community for nearly 50 years. Liz has certainly left a great footprint in many ways through her life and we will explore for the next 2 issues of the Parish Oak her contributions in the development of the charity Mencap and the work of Mencap with learning disabilities here in Andover: the changes she has helped to bring across the UK in the way that we care for those with mental health difficulties. Finally we will describe her love for cricket and her care for the local community here in Smannell and Enham.

Liz Hall was born in Hove in Sussex on March 13<sup>th</sup> in 1926. Still at a young age Liz moved with her family to live in Ascot in Berkshire.

Her father, Adrian Fossbroke-Brigges, was a soldier in the first World War and won the Military Cross when he was only 17 or 18. He was promoted to the level of Major in the Royal Horse Artillery, but before the end of the War he was wounded and left his military career with a permanent injury. He went on to work for the government in London and was given the task of forming the Racehorse Betting Control Board which was created in 1928 and later became known as the Tote. This was the first legalised form of gambling at horse races. Page 10

Major Brigges died a hero in 1935, when he shepherded passengers from a crashed aeroplane to safety. He had just returned to the plane to check that everyone was out when the plane burst aflame with a mighty explosion, killing instantly both him and a colleague.

The aircraft was taking a group of wealthy businessmen to view the King's inspection of the Fleet at Portsmouth. The tragedy was later proved to be caused by the actions of an intoxicated pilot.

Although there was initially generous support from several of the wealthy survivors of the plane crash, Liz's mother was left to raise the 3 daughters with very little long-term income.

The family were staunch worshippers with the Church of England, but Mrs Brigges managed to get Liz a place at the Catholic School, St Mary's, in Ascot. Liz was the only non-Catholic pupil at the school, but she thrived at her first school experience!

It had always been her father's wish to see the girls educated at the Royal School in Bath. This was a military girls' school and each year 5 places were awarded to girls whose military fathers had been killed and could get sponsorship from charitable sources.

Liz's mother wrote numerous letters to the Ladies of England and Liz was eventually invited to be interviewed by a panel of the society high and mighty in London. As Liz recalls "I and my sister were paid for by the Ladies of England. We had to walk into an enormous room in the middle of London with a row of ladies all sitting with their backs to the windows, so we couldn't see their faces properly. We had to walk in with my mother and face their questions. All three of us were sponsored to go to Bath. My mother had no money at all."

When World War II began, the pupils of the Royal School were evacuated to Lord Bath's magnificent home at Longleat, as the school in Bath was taken over by the government, and the Admiralty's Hydrographic Department was installed at the Lansdown premises.

Liz remained at the school, in its new setting of Longleat, until the summer of 1944 when she was accepted to study for a degree in Social Work at the Liverpool University. It wasn't until 1946 when Liz finally went to Liverpool however, as first she worked in Ascot and then in London to earn money to fund her university course and her stay in digs at Liverpool.

Liverpool had been ravaged by the bombing of the war and the streets and people were in desperate straits during her stay in the city. Liz still has vivid memories of the houses she visited during the practical part of her Social Work course; memories of the children dressed in rags, starving for lack of food and covered in fleas.

Train trips back to Ascot were in carriages full of soldiers moving out to the war front in France as the war came to an end, but still the trains ground to a halt as there were bombing attacks overhead and the trains were hopelessly late in reaching their destination.

Liz had left home to go to Bath as a young child – now she was returning to Ascot as an adult, but it was to a different world devastated by war and to a community still bereft of men ... men who would never return from the fields of Europe.

### A WEEK IN THE LIFE OF A COUNTRY VICAR

When I was at theological college, one of the tutors asked me to read a book called, 'The Life and Work of a Priest' by John Pritchard. It is a good read, but should perhaps be called 'The Life and Nervous Breakdown of a Priest' as the role of a vicar, especially a rural one is not for the faint-hearted. I was asked to give you a flavour of a typical week as your Priest-in-Charge so here we go..!

### Monday

I always start my mornings in prayer, either I follow the Anglican lectionary or I do an Ignatian meditation.

After prayer, I'm out visiting parishioners all day and well into the evening. This can be in a variety of contexts such as at home, in care homes, at one of the hospitals in the area and often for many different reasons; illness, loneliness, bereavement, even conflict resolution between families. With such a wide-ranging benefice encompassing what will eventually be eleven churches, there are always overwhelming pastoral needs, and it is an enormous privilege to be able to journey with people in very challenging circumstances.

### Tuesday

I supervise Val, your parish priest's work in Smannell and Enham and we meet weekly for Bible study, prayer and to discuss parish matters. Afterwards, I am preparing to give a speech at a debate on Saturday so have driven to Sarum College in Salisbury to use their library. I then have a funeral in Basingstoke which are always very emotionally draining times. Conducting a funeral is a very special responsibility, as there is always a need to commend that person to God's care and to celebrate their life. Sometimes, I have been with people towards the end of their lives, or have known them well, so there is often a very real emotional attachment, but there is also a need to be professional and allow others to have space and time to grieve.

### Wednesday

After some imaginative preparation, I go to a number of nursery and primary schools to do a collective worship (assembly). I am an active governor at Hatherden school so spend extra time there developing links with the church – at the moment we are rehearsing for our crib service on Christmas Eve, two performances of a play I have written called 'Strictly Come X-Factor!' Having been a deputy head of a large secondary school this presents me with an enormous challenge ... how on earth do you keep a large number of 2 to 11-year-olds engaged for 20 minutes each week? Plenty of fun and games mixed with lively songs and a look at how it all relates to a Bible passage works ... mostly!

### Thursday

Time today preparing my sermons for the next week. I like to spend time over at least four days reflecting and praying about the Bible passages and what message I have discerned we as a congregation need to hear. I have been preaching for about seven years now and still think of myself as just a beginner.

PCC meeting in the evening, one of six I will chair or attend, sometimes two on one night! My days and evenings are often taken up with meetings of various kinds of groups; treasurers, pastoral care, home communion, church wardens, service leaders, baptism and confirmation, wedding and funeral visits, etc., and I rarely get home before 9.30pm.

### Friday

A day off spent with family, my wife Bev and two children Jacob and Brontë, our lab Noah and cat Jessie.

### Saturday

Speaking at an environmental conference. I serve on the Diocesan Environmental Group and often speak at various environmental events. Then I am off to chair a meeting of our strategy group. This year has been spent in lots of meetings, consulting with lots of people and beginning to build a sustainable infra-structure across what will be one of the largest benefices in the diocese. Please see the pastoral letter I have written, available at any of our churches, to see the exciting plans we have for the next few years!

Then I am dashing back to conduct a wedding – we are lucky to have such special churches and we have conducted over 35 weddings and blessings during 2016!

### Sunday

After a Sunday service, there will be baptisms (an enormous amount throughout 2016, well over 60) and then more pastoral visits with often a service to attend or lead in the evening, or just planning for the next week to start again!

I hope this has given you just a flavour of a typical week. However, I would relish the opportunity to meet with you, so please do get in touch and we can meet over a cup of tea! (01264 512161)
