EDITORIAL

The forthcoming election inspired me to look back in time. 100 years ago in 1917, the Electoral Reform Bill passed through the UK Parliament and was to change the course of history. The resulting Representation of the People Act 1918 came into being and allowed women over the age of 30 and with property the right to vote – this represented 40% of the women in the country at the time. Additionally, men in the Armed Forces could vote from the age of 19. The electorate increased from eight to 21 million – the population of the UK at the time was circa 38 million. The struggle to achieve electoral reform began in the mid-19th century but it was not until the Equal Franchise Act 1928 that women won the same voting rights as men.

Since 1918, with the lowest ever voter turnout of 57.2% - attributed to be low because of the end of the First World War - and then a growth to a turnout of 83.9% in 1950, there has been a steady decline of voters with the 2015 General Election achieving a 66.1% turnout. There is much debate about why people don't vote, not least the weather or that that they believe their vote isn't important or won't make a difference.

The total number of UK parliamentary electors in December 2016 was circa 45.7 million - the UK census in 2011 showed the population to be circa 63.1 million people. Since the General Election for 2017 was announced, more than 2.3 million people have applied to register to vote (as of 21st May). In the 2015 General Election, 34% people didn't vote and more people didn't vote than those who supported either of the two main parties.

Here are some points raised by the $\underline{votingcounts.org}$ website to consider your own voting behaviour on 8th June:

- 1. It gives you the power to create change.
- 2. Get politicians working for you.
- 3. Voting is important even if you don't think your candidate will win.
- 4. Many movements have campaigned to give you the right to vote.
- 5. MPs represent your local area in parliament and solve issues for local people.
- 6. Voting is a way to show support for electoral reform.
- 7. You can leave your ballot blank if you do not agree with any of the parties.

Those that fought for electoral reform over 100 years ago seemingly considered the right to be able to vote to be exceedingly important. I particularly like the sentiment of a quote from Herb Kohl "I will vote my hopes and not my fears".

Ramblings from the Rectory ...

I have recently visited Rome, a place I have been wanting to go to for nearly 50 years. As a teenager, I read a life story of Michelangelo called the Agony and the Ecstasy. And since then, seeing the Sistine Chapel has been high up on my list of places to visit. It was not quite as I imagined. The ceiling is at a great height and everyone was standing with their heads angled upwards. There were crowds of people and it reminded me of being at an air show when I was younger with everyone staring upwards.

There was so much to see on the walls too, but it is the ceiling that grabs your attention as you walk into the room, and especially the Creation painting with God giving life to Adam.

I would have liked to have stayed and held on to the moment, but it was so busy and noisy. Not with just the awed comments from my fellow bystanders but from the Vatican staff managing the crowds with their 'Keep moving' and 'No phones!' as well as the loud 'shushes' every now and again.

It would have been lovely to lay down on the floor in an empty chapel building and to gaze up in wonder, but that will never happen I guess, as beautiful buildings always attract crowds!

But there was a sense of wanting to hold on to the moment and it reminded me of the three disciples, Peter, James and John, who were on the mountainside with Jesus at the Transfiguration. You can read the story in Mark, chapter 9, verses 2-9. Peter suggested building tabernacles to somehow capture the holy moment that they found themselves in with Jesus.

Perhaps nowadays we all try to capture holy moments by taking photographs, but you can't do that in the Sistine Chapel, or indeed in quite a few churches I have visited. But we can more easily photograph awe-inspiring visits to beautiful

gardens or wonderful landscapes. On our day visiting Rome, I also went to the Pope's summer residence in Castel Gandolfo and had a tour of the wonderful garden there. Pope Francis opened up the gardens to the public just two years ago. But there is much more to see in Rome and perhaps a week's visit is needed.

Meanwhile we have much going on in our parish this month, the highlight perhaps being the celebration weekend with the Bishop on the 17th and 18th of June. Please do try to come and join us for a part of the celebrations. There are more details about this in a separate article.

Then we have our regular monthly Family Service with the theme of discovering the Bible. We will find out more about John the Baptist this month, at Smannell Church at 10.45am on Sunday 11th June. Messy Church, for children and their families, is on Tuesday 13th June at Smannell School from 3-5pm.

The Smannell and Enham Church of England (Aided) Primary School is currently

Ofsted (the national inspection body for schools) has noted that the most effective schools demonstrate effective leadership and management, and that includes the leadership brought by the governing body.



Our school Governing Body is made up of people who come to us through a variety of routes and with a range of different backgrounds, skill and experiences, but they are all volunteers who work together for the benefit of the School and are the link between the School and the community it serves.

The role of the Governing Body is a strategic one and its key functions are to set the aims and objectives for the school; set the policies and targets for achievement; monitor and evaluate the progress the school is making, all this while being a source of challenge and support to the head teacher (a critical friend).

This isn't an application to be taken lightly, as it involves time, energy and a willingness to become involved in the life of the school on a regular basis over at least four years. However, it is very rewarding, as together we can strategically input into the school and see another generation of children growing in knowledge and development within our community. MAURICE GEORGE BULLEN

7th August 1930 – 15th April 2017



Maurice George Bullen was born in Dorchester in the summer of 1930. The son of a fireman on the Southern Railway, his grandfather Bullen was manager of a seed merchant in the town and his mother's father a colour sergeant with the Dorset Regiment.

In 1939 the family moved to Andover where George Bullen became an engine driver based at Andover Junction. They lived in Weyhill Road and Maurice attended New Street Junior School before securing a scholarship to Andover Grammar School in 1941.

An active member of Andover Boys' Brigade and, later, an officer in the Life Boys, Maurice had happy memories of camping on the Dorset coast. He would ride his bicycle from Andover while a furniture lorry transported the kit and tents. Once everything was set up, the boys would arrive in a utility bus, delighted to see the sea after all those miles on wooden seats.

In 1946 Maurice left school and embarked on a career which was to last 70 years. He worked for Dick Barnett, a chartered accountant with Mills, Hawes, Barnett and Company whose offices were above Ruggs retail shop in Andover High Street.

National Service soon called – two years with the Royal Army Medical Corps stationed at Crookham – before Mr Barnett bought out his partners and Maurice

rejoined him at Lloyds Bank Chambers. Later, Hugh Morgan was taken into the partnership and the practice traded for many years as Barnett, Morgan and Company.

By this time Maurice's parents had moved to a house in Junction Road from where he walked to his office in the High Street.

Also walking to work of a morning was a young lady called Leonora Pinkard whose route to the Rural District Council offices took her along the same road. They met, they married in Christ Church, Smannell in 1953 and set off on honeymoon in Penelope, the ex-Post Office van Maurice converted to a prototype hatchback.

He had windows cut in the sides and the rear doors altered so that they lifted up. With a bus seat fixed in the back – supported by a wooden egg crate – their Rolls Royce got them from A to B at a stately 30 miles an hour.

Sixty-three years of marriage followed, marked by a devotion to each other, immersion in village life, lasting friendships, the gift of grandchildren, happy holidays and hard work in the home and garden they developed and nurtured with great love. Contented with their lot, they counted themselves both privileged and blessed.

Shortly after their daughter was born in 1962, Maurice became self-employed. He worked three days a week for Barnett Morgan and two days in the commercial world, mainly for Salisbury and Wimborne timber companies.

By the mid-1960s he was company secretary of the Salisbury operation and company secretary and financial director at Wimborne. He thoroughly enjoyed the work and carried on his professional and commercial activities when he opened his own office at Motley Mill, Weyhill.

At the age when many people were looking forward to more leisure time, Maurice paid lip service to the notion of retirement by gradually reducing his office hours over more than two decades. Indeed, many clients' 2015/16 tax returns were completed in the comfort of his room at The Andover Nursing Home where he set up office. He filed paperwork in his chest of drawers and held the occasional meeting in his dressing gown if the business day started before he had completed his 'I'll do it myself' morning routine fired by steely determination and a refusal to give in to increasing physical frailties.

In the business world, Maurice's passing marks the end of an era. He started

out cycling to see his clients, often returning with half a dozen eggs or a pat of butter balanced on his briefcase. Thanks to the unswerving loyalty of his team at Motley Mill he was able to keep his mind occupied until his body could manage no more, totally on the ball until the end.

Maurice was defined by his work but he always found time for his beloved garden, pottering in his workshop, Saints' home matches at The Dell, the beach hut at Mudeford, military and brass band concerts, local history, steam trains and a wide variety of projects undertaken with friends.

Whether building sheds capable of surviving for decades beyond the life span of their owners, bringing on plants by the hundred or making arrangements for the village fete and other events, if not put in charge at the beginning of a project he usually was by the end and was always true to his word. If Maurice said he would do something, it would be done.

A prime example of Maurice's ability to combine friends, fun and charitable work was, of course, Smannell Skittles. In the event's heyday, teams of friends – and clients who had become friends – travelled from surrounding Hampshire villages as well as from Wiltshire, Dorset and Devon to compete in homemade alleys set up in the barn at Woodhouse. Thousands of pounds were raised for the upkeep of the village church, for Riding for the Disabled, the Countess of Brecknock Hospice, village events and for numerous other local charities.

Maurice was proud of his achievements, for which he never sought undue adulation or public recognition. "Help yourself and I'll help you in return," was his mantra and he helped many people, both personally and through the charitable causes close to his heart.

Maurice's determination and the patience, kindness and fortitude of others enabled him to live life his way almost to the end. While he accepted the terminal nature of his kidney problems, he refused to give in to them and made some extremely brave decisions, none more so than moving from hospital to the Countess of Brecknock Hospice last October when his life expectancy was just weeks. The Hospice quite literally got him back on his feet and from there Maurice made the decision to reside at The Andover Nursing Home.

Thanks to the outstanding care provided by the nurses and carers who became his second family, Maurice was granted a further six months of life. He always made time for people and they made time for him, visiting with frequency and in great numbers, always astonished at how well he seemed and the sharpness of his mind.

Accountant, husband, father, grandfather, brother, uncle, great uncle, godfather, cousin, friend ... Maurice George Bullen made a good job of life and was his own person to the end. May he rest in peace.
