Families and audiences of all ages are invited to Lincoln Center's free Open House for a day of creativity, community, and inspiring performances! For the third year, David Geffen Hall welcomes guests to experience the performing arts up close—with free workshops, participatory art-making, music, and dance. All are encouraged to dress in costumes to celebrate the festivities!

This full day of events includes all-day art installations, art stations and various timed performances. Events in the Wu Tsai Theater are also part of our **Relaxed Performance** series, open to all, but designed for people with autism, sensory and communication disorders or learning disabilities.

This event begins at 11:00am and runs until 8:00pm and is General Admission, first-come first-served. Drop-in throughout the day and stay as long as you'd like!



Program Information:


This Open House includes a full day of events. Some events are timed performances, and others are available all-day as installations or stations. Below are the timed events.

David Geffen Hall at Lincoln Center

David Geffen Hall is located between West 64th and 65th Street on Columbus Avenue. The entrance is accessible and has automatic doors. It is next to Josie Robertson Plaza and across from the David H. Koch Theater.





Getting to David Geffen Hall

BY SUBWAY:

David Geffen Hall is a short distance from the **1** train at West 66th Street and a slightly longer distance from the **A, B, C, D** or **1** trains at 59th Street-Columbus Circle. Both subway stations are accessible via elevator.



BY BUS:

The M5, M7, M10, M11, M66, and M104 bus lines all stop within one block of The Rose Theater at Jazz at Lincoln Center

Access-A-Ride:

If you need an address for Access-A-Ride, use **20 Lincoln Center Plaza**, Lincoln Center's designated Access-A-Ride stop.

Pick-Up/Drop-Off:

West side of Broadway between West 65th Street & West 66th Street.



Parking

Main Campus Parking (operated by ICON) is available beneath Lincoln Center's plaza. Advanced reservations are recommended.

- Entrance for the Reserved Parking Section is on Amsterdam Avenue at 64th Street.
- Designated accessible parking spaces are located in the yellow section of the garage.
- Parking permit and/or sticker must be displayed.
- · Advance reservations include a \$5 service charge.
- · Height restrictions for vans apply.

Audience Entrance and Security Gate:

David Geffen Hall is accessible from Columbus Avenue by ramps and stairs, as well as from the concourse level via escalator.



At 10:30am, guests are welcomed to enter David Geffen Hall through an Evolv machine at the security checkpoint, located just outside on the plaza. The Evolv machine might light up or make noise. A security guard might ask to check bags, and a working dog might sniff guests or their belongings.



Once inside, guests can explore the activities and performances throughout the building.



Lobby:

The LeFrak Lobby in David Geffen Hall includes chairs, tables, benches, and couches and is a comfortable place to sit during the Open House. Guests are welcome to stay in the LeFrak Lobby or in to relax and eat.

Restrooms:


All gender accessible restrooms and a water bottle filling station are available in the LeFrak Lobby. Coat check is available in the LeFrak Lobby behind the large lobby screen.



Accessible companion restrooms, single restrooms designed for one person who uses a wheelchair and one companion, are located on the orchestra level and all tiers.

Infant changing tables are available at every level.



Accommodations

This venue has accessible routes, with designated wheelchair and companion seating

Hearing Loops are installed in the Wu Tsai Theater, as well as in commerce points. Guests can access the sound wirelessly through the hearing loop through their own telecoil-enabled hearing devices. Loop receivers are available.







A chill out space is located the Music Box on Hearst Tier 1. Noise-reducing headphones, earplugs, fidgets, and other sensory items are available to borrow from Information Table in the Lobby.

Live closed captioning will be available to access on personal phones and tablets via a QR code at the Head Usher Podium for events in the Wu Tsai Theater.



Access Concierge Service: Staff, trained to support guests with disabilities, are available to provide 1:1 support for individual guests and their party. To schedule, email

What to Expect at a Relaxed Performance

- Guests are able to enter and leave the audience space throughout the event, as needed
- Guests can vocalize or move throughout audience space
- Fellow audience members are asked to create a no "shushing" zone
- House lights adjusted so that venue is never fully dark
- Attention to bright lights, loud noises, and surprise sensory elements, described in advance
- Chill Out Space for guests to take a break and rejoin performance when ready
- Visual guide, with clear instructions, shared before event
- Noise-reducing headphones and fidgets available to borrow
- Staff members and artists are trained in access and inclusion best practices
