


Welcome to the Clark Studio Theater at Lincoln Center!

The Clark Studio Theater is located at 165 West 65th Street on the 7th floor of the Samuel B. and David Rose Building.

It is next to the Walter Reade Theater and the Irene Diamond Building of The Juilliard School and across the street from Lincoln Center Theater and the Elinor Bunin Monroe Film Center.



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Getting to the Clark Studio Theater

BY SUBWAY: The Clark Studio Theater is a short distance from the **1** train at West 66th Street. It is a slightly longer distance from the **A, B, C, D** or **1** trains at 59th Street—Columbus Circle. Both subway stations are accessible via elevator.

BY BUS: The M5, M7, M10, M11, and M104 bus lines all stop within one block of the Clark Studio Theater.

Access-A-Ride: The recommended Access-A-Ride address for drop off closest to the main entrance is 165 West 65th Street (between Amsterdam Avenue and Broadway).

Parking:

Main Campus Parking (operated by ICON)

- Designated accessible parking spaces are located in the yellow section of the garage
- Entrance for Reserved Parking Section is on Amsterdam Avenue at 64th Street
- Parking permit and/or sticker must be displayed
- Advance reservations for parking include a \$5 service charge
- Height restrictions for vans apply

Venue Access:

The Samuel B. and David Rose Building is accessible from West 65th Street by elevator, stairs, and escalator.



Audience Entrance and Security Gate:

The Box Office for Clark Studio Theater performances is located in the lobby of the Rose Building. Guests will be greeted by Lincoln Center staff and will be directed to enter through a security gate to reach the elevators.

To get to the Clark Studio Theater, guests can enter the Samuel B. and David Rose Building go past the security gate and use the elevators to get to the 7th floor.



Once the doors open on the 7th floor, guests will be in the lobby (pictured below). The entrance to the Clark Studio Theater is on your right.

Gimme Please:

Gimme Please is a highly visual, interactive play created by Atlanta's Alliance Theatre. It follows the journey of two friends from initial meeting to lasting connection as they use live music, lighting, and magic to pretend, provoke, and persist in getting what they want and need from the world and each other.

This seated, ticketed event has a running time of 45 minutes with no intermission. It is a Relaxed Performance, open to all, but designed for people with autism, sensory, and communication disorders or learning disabilities.

The program will take place in the Clark Studio Theater. It is designed for younger children (ages 2-5) but open to all ages.

About the Theater:

- Guests will be able to choose the seats that work best for them. There will be space to sit on chairs, in wheelchair accessible locations, and seat cushions on the floor.
- There are restrooms available to the right of the theater entrance. Guests may enjoy snacks in the lobby area.
- Lincoln Center staff members wearing a white name badge are available if guests need help or have questions.

This is a Relaxed Performance. This means:

- Guests can borrow noise-reducing headphones and fidgets to use during the performance.
- Guests can vocalize or move their bodies during the performance.
- The theater will never be fully dark.
- If guests need a break, they can leave the theater and sit in the lobby or Chill Out Space.
- Guests can leave and re-enter the theater during the performance if they need to.

About the Show:

- During the show, two performers will act on stage and a musician will play the violin live.
- During the show, the performers will ask guests to do certain movements, like stand up, stretch their arms out, follow a path on the floor, and put a party hat on their head. If guests want to participate in these activities, they can. If they do not want to participate, they can watch from their seats.



Accommodations:

This venue has accessible routes, with designated wheelchair and companion seating.

FM assistive listening devices with headsets and neck loops are available for all performances. Additionally, guests are welcome to bring their own headphones and standard jack headsets.

There is a Chill Out Space located just past the restrooms, with seating, bean bag chairs and sensory items, including weighted lap pads, noise reducing headphones and fidgets. Guests are welcome to take a sensory break there, and rejoin the performance when ready.

Restrooms:

Men's and women's restrooms with one accessible stall each are located down the hall to the right across from the theater on the 7th Floor. Lincoln Center welcomes guests to use the restroom that most closely aligns with your gender identity or expression, while the law requires gender binary signs.

Food and Drink:

Food and drink is not permitted in the theater. Guests can eat and drink in the lobby area outside of the theater.

There is a water fountain between the men and women's restrooms on the 7th floor. It is a bottle-friendly machine that has cups next to it for guests without a water bottle.
