*Please note: This performance contains partial nudity and other adult themes. Audience discretion is advised; this show is intended for ages 18+.


This performance is general admission with a run time of about 90 minutes.

It is also part of our **Relaxed Performance** series. Open to all, and especially welcoming for people with autism, sensory and communication disorders or learning disabilities. The artistic integrity of the piece remains unchanged, however modifications to social and sensory environment may be made.



The David Rubenstein Atrium

The David Rubenstein Atrium is located on Broadway between West 62nd and West 63rd Street. The exact address is 61 West 62nd Street, but please note the audience entrance is on Broadway.



The David Rubenstein Atrium (circled in red) is located on the West side of Broadway between West 62nd Street and West 63rd Street. The entrance is accessible and has automatic doors.



Getting to the David Rubenstein Atrium

Travel Options:

The David Rubenstein Atrium is on the Upper West Side of Manhattan, between West 62nd and 63rd Streets and Broadway and Columbus Avenue.

BY SUBWAY: The David Rubenstein Atrium is a short distance from the A, B, C, D or 1 trains at 59th Street—Columbus Circle. It is a slightly longer distance from the 1 train at West 66th Street. Both subway stations are accessible via elevator.



BY BUS: The BXM2, M5, M7, M10, M11, M20, M66, and M104 bus lines all stop within one block of the David Rubenstein Atrium.

Access-A-Ride:

The recommended Access-A-Ride address for drop off closest to the main entrance is **1883 Broadway**, between 62nd and 63rd Streets.

Pick-Up/Drop-Off:

The main entrance for performances at the Atrium is on Broadway, between 62nd and 63rd Streets. This entrance is accessible and has automatic doors.




Audience Entrance and Security Protocol

Tickets are not required for performances at the David Rubenstein Atrium, and admission is free and open to the public, however guests with Fast Track tickets have priority entry up to 10 minutes before the event begins at 7:30pm.

Seating and entry are first-come, first-served. If the Atrium reaches capacity, or shortly before showtime, a line may form at the Atrium's entrance on Broadway, between 62nd and 63rd Street.

Guests will be greeted by Lincoln Center staff and will be directed to enter through a security checkpoint to scan for weapons in a quick and touchless manner.

Key Moments:

Act 1- A traditional Nutcracker ballet performance

End of Act 1- The Snow Queen "welcomes everyone to the dream" Intermission - 15 min

Act 2- A burlesque performance with audience interaction where "everyone is invited to the party"

Sensory Warnings:

There is a gunshot sound at the beginning of the sixth song in act one, about nine seconds into the song. No weapon in visible.

After the first song in Act Two there is a knock on the stage door. Door opens; Audience will hear a vocal greeting that says, "Espresso Martini!".



Performance Venue

Armless chairs are arranged in several rows on two sides and at the front of a raised stage. Guests are welcome to sit in any open seat. All seating is general admission in the main seating area. There may be seats marked "reserved" in some sections.

Please note that seating is available on a **first-come**, **first-served** basis. You are also welcome to stand during the performance or to sit further to the sides on large public benches. There is space to move and walk around in the Atrium during the performance.

You are welcome to leave the Atrium during the performance. If the performance is not at capacity, you can re-enter at any time.

The Independent Café serves food and drinks in the Atrium. During events and performances, guests can purchase beverages at the counter to enjoy.



Restrooms

Accessible, gender-neutral restrooms and changing tables are available inside the Atrium. There is a restroom on the first level behind the desk.



There are additional restrooms on the second floor, accessible by elevator. You can ask a Lincoln Center staff member for directions to this location.





Accommodations

This venue has accessible routes, with designated wheelchair and companion seating.



FM assistive listening devices with headsets and neck loops are available for all performances. Additionally, guests are welcome to bring their own headphones and standard jack headsets.



American Sign Language Interpretation available.



A chill out space is on the west side of the Atrium, nearest Columbus Avenue. Noise-reducing headphones, earplugs, fidgets, and other sensory items are available to borrow.



Access Concierge Service: Access Reps, trained to support guests with disabilities, are available to provide 1:1 support for individual guests and their party. Must be scheduled in advance.

What to Expect at a Relaxed Performance

- Guests are able to enter and leave the audience space throughout the event, as needed
- Guests can vocalize or move throughout audience space
- Fellow audience members are asked to create a no "shushing" zone
- House lights adjusted so that venue is never fully dark
- Attention to bright lights, loud noises, and surprise sensory elements, described in advance
- Chill Out Space for guests to take a break and rejoin performance when ready
- Visual guide, with clear instructions, shared before event
- Noise-reducing headphones and fidgets available to borrow
- Staff members and artists are trained in access and inclusion best practices
