


Welcome to the Stanley H. Kaplan Penthouse at Lincoln Center!

The Stanley H. Kaplan Penthouse is located at 165 West 65th Street on the 10th floor of the Samuel B. and David Rose Building.

It is next to the Walter Reade Theater and the Irene Diamond Building of The Juilliard School and across the street from Lincoln Center Theater and the Elinor Bunin Monroe Film Center.



Getting to the Stanley H. Kaplan Penthouse

BY SUBWAY: The Stanley H. Kaplan Penthouse is a short distance from the **1** train at West 66th Street. It is a slightly longer distance from the **A, B, C, D** or **1** trains at 59th Street—Columbus Circle. Both subway stations are accessible via elevator.

BY BUS: The M5, M7, M10, M11, and M104 bus lines all stop within one block of the Stanley H. Kaplan Penthouse.

Access-A-Ride:

The recommended Access-A-Ride address for drop off closest to the main entrance is **165 West 65**th **Street** (between Amsterdam Avenue and Broadway).

Parking

Main Campus Parking (operated by ICON)

- Designated accessible parking spaces are located in the yellow section of the garage
- Entrance for Reserved Parking Section is on Amsterdam Avenue at 64th Street
- Parking permit and/or sticker must be displayed
- Advance reservations for parking include a \$5 service charge
- Height restrictions for vans apply

Venue Access

The Samuel B. and David Rose Building is accessible from West 65th Street by elevator, stairs and escalator.

The entrance to the Samuel B. and David Rose Building has manual, revolving, and accessible door options.




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Audience Entrance and Security Gate

The Box Office for the Stanley H. Kaplan Penthouse performances is located in the lobby of the Rose Building. Guests will be greeted by Lincoln Center staff and will be directed to enter through a security gate to reach the elevators.

To get to the Stanley H. Kaplan Penthouse, guests can enter the Samuel B. and David Rose Building go past the security gate and use the elevators to get to the 10th floor.



Once the doors open on the 10th floor, guests will be in the lobby (pictured below). The entrance to the Stanley H. Kaplan Penthouse is on your right.

Performance Space

The Lincoln Center staff can assist guests in finding accessible seating and directing them where they need to go.

Many different types of events take place in the Penthouse, so the setup may look different depending on the day.

Accommodations

This venue has accessible routes, with designated wheelchair and companion seating.

FM assistive listening devices with headsets and neck loops are available for all performances. Additionally, guests are welcome to bring their own headphones and standard jack headsets.

Access Concierge Service

As part of our continued commitment to making Lincoln Center **accessible and inclusive**, we are excited to offer a new service to our guests who request additional assistance. Access Reps, trained to support guests with disabilities, provide **1:1 support** for individual guests and their party.

Guests attending performances at this venue may request in advance:

- An Access Rep to meet them upon arrival on campus, escort them throughout the performance space and assist them with any of their requested accommodations. Access Reps can supply and push guests in a wheelchair, provide sighted guide technique, or simply escort and assist.
- Check in at intermission, see if the guest needs anything, answer questions/receive feedback.
- Assistance with departure from the performance venue.

Inquire about this service when purchasing a ticket through the Lincoln Center Box Office or CenterCharge. Guests who already have their tickets can email guestexperience@lincolncenter.org for further information. Please note that this service should be requested at least 7

business days prior to the performance, and assistance is based on staff availability.



Restrooms

Men's and women's restrooms with one accessible stall each are located down the hall to the right across from the theater on the 10th Floor. Lincoln Center welcomes guests to use the restroom that most closely aligns with their gender identity or expression, while the law requires gender binary signs.

Food and Drink

For most performances, food and drink is not permitted in the theater.

There is a water fountain near the men and women's restrooms on the 10th floor. It is a bottle-friendly machine that has cups next to it for guests without a water bottle.
