

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# INSTALLER FINED FOR ILLEGAL USE OF HETAS LOGO

A heating installer from Devon has been ordered to pay almost £3,500 by Barnstaple Magistrates Court for offences including the misuse of the HETAS logo.

Warren Emo trading as Fired Up pleaded guilty to all three charges which included giving a customer incorrect advice on the installation of woodburning stoves.

The case was brought to court by Devon Trading Standards, who were assisted by statements from HETAS confirming that Fired Up was not a HETAS registered business, despite the fact that Mr Emo had used the HETAS logo in advertisements in the North Devon Gazette. The court also found that Fired Up had contravened the Consumer Protection from Unfair Trading Regulations (2008) by falsely advising a customer that he could not have a woodburning stove in each of the rooms of his property, and also that it would not be possible to have a woodburner in one room and a fire grate in another.

The fine for misuse of the HETAS logo was £1165, with an additional fine of £665 for the charge of giving incorrect advice. Mr Emo was also ordered to pay £1000 towards costs, and £603.50 in compensation to the customer with a victim surcharge of £15.

Commenting on the case, HETAS Head of Registration Tina Seymour said "We take any misuse of the HETAS logo very seriously, and work closely with trading standards across the UK to clamp down on any illegal use. With a growing number of HETAS registered businesses and increasing awareness of the HETAS logo amongst consumers we are keen to protect the reputation of legitimately registered installers."

# HETAS H003 REFRESHER TRAINING COURSES

New Government Legislation means that from June 2014 any engineer who hasn't completed a HETAS Assessment or Refresher Training Course within the past five years must undertake a **re-assessment**, otherwise they risk losing their Competent Person status. In the past, there has been no follow up provision after an installer has gained their original training qualification in solid fuel heating system installation. The new initiative will help to ensure that engineers undertake follow-on training and keep up to date with the latest regulations and safety directives.

HETAS is responsible for overseeing the new regulations which came about after the Department of Communities and Local Government put in place authorisation for Competent Persons Scheme operators and their Members. These requirements come into full force from June 2014. One requirement of the conditions is to ensure the HETAS Competent Persons Scheme registrants are kept up to date and maintain their Minimum Technical Competence. The current and relevant Minimum Technical Competences require technical qualifications to be renewed on a five-year cycle. From June 2014, the changes mean that HETAS Registered Engineers must have completed a relevant HETAS Course or Refresher Course within the last five years. HETAS has already started to advise registrants of the need to carry out refresher training, initially from those trained prior to 2008 will need to be reassessed. After that, it plans to capture all those with training older than five years by 2014.

HETAS has therefore created a H003 Refresher Course that is designed to cover all changes to the Building Regulations, Health and Safety, BS EN Standards legislation and Technical Standards since 2002. The course and assessment must confirm the installer's competence through practical and theoretical assessments. The assessment comprises a choice of one or two day refresher courses, or to take the full 3 day H003 course if required.

The courses have been designed to be flexible so that people with different training requirements can work towards achieving the standards. The courses have a modular and practical format, giving installers the chance to be assessed and undertake a refresher course if necessary, in a one or two day visit to the NACS National Chimney Training Centre. This means installers need only spend the minimum amount of time away from their workplace to be reassessed.





Candidates can make a decision from the following two refresher course options, however the NACS strongly recommends that all delegates consider Option 2

# **Option 1**

A one day assessment. This is suitable for installers that feel fully competent, however they must pass a preliminary test in advance of an assessment. If the test is successfully completed, candidates may then continue directly onto assessment. (This assessment is the current HETAS H003 exam and assessment). If candidates are unsuccessful then they must continue to Option 2. Please note, if candidates are unsuccessful they will need to pay the full fee when attending the next available option 2 course.

# **Option 2**

A full two day training course. The first day is classroom based covering relevant changes to the Building Regulations, BS/EN standards and technical standards, using the current H003 training manual. The second day comprises a theoretical and practical assessment as per Option 1.

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# THE NATIONAL ANNEX TO BS EN 15287:2007 CHIMNEYS - DESIGN, INSTALLATION & COMMISSIONING

Proposed revisions to BS 8303:1994 – Installation of Domestic Heating and Cooking Appliances burning solid mineral fuels.

#### **CE MARKING**

Many installers fail to realise that the 'Requirement' contained in ADJ is a single page shown at the start of the document - which in the current version appears on page 9. The remainder of ADJ are Notes for Guidance in order that the Requirements J1 to J6 can be achieved. ADJ also states 'If the guidance in an Approved Document is followed, there is a presumption of compliance with the requirements covered by the guidance. However, this presumption can be overturned... if one particular case is unusual in some way, then 'normal' guidance may not be applicable....so, there may be other ways of achieving compliance with the regulations'. It also states - 'There is therefore no obligation to adopt any particular solution contained in this Approved Document if you would prefer to meet the relevant requirement in some other way. However, persons intending to carry out building work should always check with their Building Control Body, either the local authority or an approved inspector that their proposals comply with building regulations'. ADJ also points you to a list of documents to the rear of the document headed 'Standards referred to'. This list includes 59 British and European Standards which can be used as an 'alternative approach' covering solid fuel, gas and oil installations. Thus, adoption of a European Standard which differs from ADJ is permitted, provided you can prove this approach will not compromise the safety of the installation. Of course all this can be complex and confusing to all parties concerned, so in practice most installers sensibly stick with the guidance in ADJ. However, it is amazing how many times questions arise about how to 'bend the rules'. The National Annex to BS EN 15287 is one instance where the 'alternative approach' applies as the adoption of a 450mm horizontal flue is contrary to ADJ (which still limits the horizontal run to 150mm) but could be permitted. You may recall from previous reports, the most contentious issue in the NA revision was the proposal to allow 450mm of horizontal flue pipe from the rear of an appliance or after 600mm of vertical flue pipe. However, since publication last year much has happened with regard to the content of the National Annex. Following the distribution of the final copy of the National Annex, numerous individuals and organisations raised objections to the content as it was perceived the proposals represented a lowering of UK safety standards. As a consequence, it was agreed to call a joint meeting of the two BSI Committees most closely involved in this sector, together with representatives from

other interested parties. The authors explained they had tried to bring the Standard into line with common European practices which they felt would remove obstacles to fitting twin wall insulated flue systems. Following considerable discussion it was eventually agreed to issue a corrigenda which would introduce various safety checks. Adopting these alternative methods could only be applied if it could be proven the chimney performance would not be affected in any way. The corrigenda details drawings illustrating correct installation practice and a list of 7 criteria to ensure safe practice. I am informed it will be April/May 2013 before this amendment is published. With the appointment of Robert Burke as Chairman of RHE/28 the draft of BS 8303 prepared by Chris Pederson and tabled in November 2011 has been dusted off and will now move forward. A working group has been formed to review the draft changes and progress this important project. The working group is to look at - Shielding of Combustibles, Flue Pipe Thickness, Hearths, Open Convector Box, Register Plates, Ducted Warm Air Systems, Pellet Appliances, Mechanical Ventilation Systems and Commissioning Tests.

The introduction of CE Marking will soon be upon us as part of the Construction Products Directive. 1st July 2013 is the set date and it will be mandatory. As reported last year — where products have not been tested by an independent laboratory and do not have a CE mark, it will be illegal to import and sell them in the UK after this date. Hopefully, appliance manufacturers and importers should by now be aware of this requirement. The main impact is likely to be on the importation of low cost units from the Far East. I understand it is the responsibility of appliance manufacturers to declare conformity with the technical standards. It is unclear how this requirement will be policed, but I suspect it will fall to Trading Standards Officers to monitor the situation. Alas, testing by an authorised independent laboratory is both rigorous and expensive.

#### **ECO-DESIGN**

And lastly - let me enlighten you to yet another move by Europe to make our lives so much better! It hides behind the benign label of Lot-15/20 and is an attempt by Europe to improve the standard of appliance design in relation to efficiency and particulate emissions. Unfortunately, the proposals are so onerous that I predict many current designs will not comply. This is a very complex issue which I believe is designed to curb the use of poorly designed coal / wood burning appliances common in parts of Europe. As usual a 'one size fits all' approach is likely to adversely impact on non-offending states such as UK. Robert Burke has tabled figures which suggested that of the 668 appliances in the current HETAS Official Guide, only 88 will meet the proposed levels within 6 years of introduction! I trust that appliance manufacturers are taking these threats seriously. The UK must fight these proposals tooth and nail. Potentially, it could destroy the market for solid fuel appliances - especially wood burning units due to their higher particulate emissions.

#### **COWBOY BUILDERS**

We know that many installations are carried out by fitters who

are not registered with any Competent Persons Scheme and are not notified to Building Control. They are often found to be non-compliant and dangerous. I believe that outside our industry detailed knowledge of correct installation practice is poor, especially with some gas installers, general builders and Architects. Perhaps the worse are the DIY jobs. Recently I heard of a case where and elderly customer living in a residential caravan was not willing to pay a qualified installer to fit a stove and twin wall flue system so decided to fit it himself. After the caravan burned down the insurance company asked the same installer to investigate and report. It transpired the hearth was inadequate, lacked ventilation and was fitted with single skin flue pipe. It is clear there is no understanding of the dangers associated with solid fuel fires, whether that be the risk of fire or carbon monoxide poisoning. Perhaps it is complacency. My concerns also surround the current fashion to fit stoves into houses which were built without chimneys. Often, unskilled installers and builders fit prefabricated flues in ways which are contrary to accepted standards. There exists a number of sweeps, heating installer and service engineers who regularly speak with me to complain about examples of poor workmanship they come across in the course of their work, having been called in by the customer. Frankly, they are all appalled at the standard of work seen, as am I. These reports come from engineers who work to the highest technical and ethical standards and it offends them to witness bad work. Of course, the offending engineers do not appear to comprehend that poor work may be deemed to be fraudulent (in breach of contract) and dangerous (risk of

fire and/or CO poisoning). They expose themselves to legal action for damages, insurance claims or worse of all forced to give evidence in a Coroner's Court. As the old saying goes - it takes years to build a good reputation and 30 seconds to lose it. Closer to home - Sweeps often contact me to discuss jobs booked after the first 12 months of use only to discover the installation is unsafe. Sadly, sometimes the installers are HETAS Registered and the customer is advised to make a formal complaint to HETAS. I imagine that with the increase in customer demand for multi-fuel stoves, ill qualified fitters (Cowboys) have seen an opportunity to expand their operations by 'iumping on the bandwagon' to make money. Unfortunately, there is little or no control over non-HETAS Registered installers and the customer is faced with legal recourse or Trading Standards. Of course, suitable training will help to better educate installers on how to carry out correct practice in order to comply with Building Regulations and manufacturer's installation requirements. Unfortunately, 'cowboy builders' can never be 'trained' to change their ways.

On the subject of training – some of you will be aware of the proposal by HETAS to introduce Refresher Courses for every installer who has not undertaken a HETAS training course during the past 5 years. These courses will be run at the NACS Training Centre in Stone starting later from September this year.

# INDUSTRY STANDARD NATIONAL CODE OF PRACTICE FOR CHIMNEY SWEEPS

#### Introduction:

Over the last year the UK's two leading professional Chimney Sweeping Trade Associations, the Guild of Master Chimney Sweeps and the National Association of Chimney Sweeps, have been working together and are now very pleased to introduce the "Industry Standard – A National Code of Practice for Chimney Sweeps". Martin Glynn, President of the NACS said "Protecting the Consumer is our primary concern. We cannot continue to allow the Consumer to be put at risk from untrained or unqualified Sweeps with little or no regulation, as highlighted in the recent HSE prosecution where a Chimney Sweep caused the tragic death of one of his customers". As readers may be aware, there is no statutory regulation of Chimney Sweeps and their work in the UK despite the necessity to safeguard the consumer. The NACS and the Guild have recognised the need for unity in producing a workable Code of Practice for all Chimney Sweeps to work to.

#### What does it mean?

Both the NACS and the GMS Members will be working to the new standard ensuring that the consumer is protected at all times. Information sheets from both organisations and further training sessions will be made available for all Members. The Standard will become widely recognised over the coming year throughout the UK. Consumers, insurance companies and housing associations, local authorities, and other related trade bodies who require the services of a professional Chimney Sweep should ensure that they work to the Industry Standard in order to receive the safest, most professional service. Professional Sweeps advise on many safety issues concerning solid fuel, oil, gas appliances and flues, including ventilation requirements, safety checks and flue termination. Chimney Sweeps play an important role in reporting dangerous situations as well as giving practical consumer advice on chimney problems. Both organiations have full in house complaints procedures in the event that a complaint is made.

As the Standard becomes widely adopted, it is hoped that consumers will choose to use the services of Chimney Sweeps who follow the Industry Standard. In addition, to further enhance the Industry Standard, NACS & GMS Chimney Sweeps will be required to issue an Industry Standard Certificate of Chimney Sweeping (with the Industry Standard printed on the reverse) and, where necessary an Industry Standard Warning Notice and Label will be issued.

Daniel Hodgson, Chairman of the GMS said "Hardly





a day goes by when we don't hear of some issue concerning untrained / badly trained sweeps and occasionally there are tragic consequences. This Industry Standard gives consumers a clear choice and we believe it will be quickly adopted".

#### The Industry Standard covers:

The training, practical and theory assessments of Chimney Sweeps, and covers Chimney Sweeping practices and techniques, approved tool kits, safe working practices, prevention and limitation of soot contamination during the sweeping process, current building regulations, procedures for documentation including the Industry Certificate of Chimney Sweeping and the reporting of unsafe and dangerous appliances and chimneys, complaints procedures, compliance with COSHH requirements, proof of identity, safe use of relevant Personal Protective Equipment, Public Liability Insurance cover.

There are only two organisations in the UK whose Members meet the requirements of the Industry Standard. Martin Glynn, NACS President advises that all Chimney Sweeps should adopt this Industry Standard and Certificate of Chimney Sweeping, which in turn raises the standards of Chimney Sweeping thus protecting the consumer at all times.

#### **Finally**

- Your Association will be implementing training sessions on the new Code of Practice & Certificate of Chimney Sweeping.
- Information sheets will also be available on how to meet the requirements of the new Code of Practice.
- This joint venture between the NACS & GMS is a positive step forward in helping to "Protect the Consumer"
- It also demonstrates that unity in working together benefits and enhances the role of the Chimney Sweep.
- All Chimney Sweeps have a duty of care to their customers and we the NACS & GMS must ensure our Members are fully competent in their work.
- This a major step forward initiated by the Chimney Sweep trade bodies to raise standards.



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# CHIMNEY SWEEP FINED £5,000 FOR PENSIONER'S DEATH



A Chimney Sweep has been sentenced after his failure to remove a bird's nest blocking a chimney flue led to the death of a pensioner in his South Wales home. Phillip Jones, of Porthcawl, was fined £5,000 and ordered to pay £2,500 in costs at Cardiff Crown Court following a prosecution by the Health and Safety Executive (HSE).

The court was told that 73-year-old retired miner Derwyn Rees of Maesteg Road, Llangynwyd, Maesteg had experienced problems keeping his solid fuel fire alight. Mr Jones, who has been a sweep for 25 years, was asked to sweep the chimney and carried out the work on 5 September 2008 while Mr Rees' sister, was away. The next day - Mr Rees' birthday - his neighbours noticed his curtains were still drawn and found him dead in his bed.

Following a police-led investigation an inquest in October 2010 revealed he died of carbon monoxide poisoning. Further investigations by HSE and a solid fuel specialist revealed an extensive bird's nest inside the chimney. Although Mr Jones had encountered a blockage of the chimney while sweeping, he did not check to see if his brush cleared the chimney pot which would indicate the blockage had been cleared. In addition, he failed to carry out a proper smoke test after completing the job, give advice to Mr Rees on ventilating the property or give any verbal or written warning.


HSE Inspector Stephen Jones, speaking after the hearing, said: "This was a tragic incident and a great shock for Mr Rees' sister and their local community. "Chimney sweeping is a vitally important job. Sadly Mr Rees paid for substandard work with his life. "Sweeps must ensure work is done thoroughly and householders are given full information about proper ventilation of their homes to ensure similar tragedies do not happen in the future." Mr Rees niece. Janet Jones, said: "Derwyn's death was an avoidable tragedy and has had a huge impact on the family. We hope this case sends a clear message to sweeps so that this sort of incident does not happen again and other people are not put at risk. "Every year around 15 people die from carbon monoxide poisoning and prolonged exposure can also lead to paralysis and brain damage."

Phillip Keith Jones, of Lakeview Close, Porthcawl,

pleaded guilty to a breach of Section 3 (2) of the Health and Safety at Work Act 1974.

Martin P. Glynn, President of the National Association of Chimney Sweeps (NACS), said: "Anyone booking the services of a Chimney Sweep should only employ a registered and qualified sweep from the NACS or Guild of Master Chimney Sweeps (GMS). Members from both organisations work to a Code of Practice and issue a Certificate of Sweeping. It is always best practice to conduct smoke evacuation checks on chimneys and flues after chimney sweeping to ensure that they are left in a safe working order. This tragic case highlights the necessity of using a trained and competent Chimney Sweep who works to a professional standard as stipulated in the National Code of Practice. Unfortunately the Chimney Sweep in this incident was not registered or approved."

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



Vic Crompton, the NACS Technical Director, and I have been friends for a number of years, and it had been a few years since I had travelled across the pond to a NACS Trade Show, so I gave him a jingle. He gave me some additional information about the gathering, Jennie Lynn scheduled a flight, and in April I was airborne, en route to Manchester, England (via Paris) where Vic met me at the airport. He actually lives a short distance away in the historically picturesque English Town of Chorley - complete with the narrow cobble stone streets, little business shops and outdoor cafes. Depending on the bladder you use, it can be connected to "any" solid fuel, gas, oil or other fuel heating system! Now that is impressive! The system is not a cheap date, but a good date. With that having been said, I shall say no more....but check it out, impressive!

There was a terracotta wine cooler/chimney pot, made by W.T. Knowles & Sons Ltd. in Elland, England - now how neat is that? They have been making standard and custom chimney pots and related items since 1906, and I do believe they may be the largest supplier of chimney pots and related item in the UK.
