JANE & BURPEE MUSEUM OF NATURAL HISTORY

The Little Museum That Could

Formation in Montana was where he and a team of paleontology enthusiasts from Burpee Museum excavated Jane, a stunningly complete juvenile T. rex skeleton that lived 66 million years ago.

You and your family can take the short trip to Rockford and experience Jane's world as it was 66 million years ago during the Cretaceous Period when today's Badlands were a lush, moist and warm floodplain. You'll view Jane's fully restored 21-foot skeleton, learn about the world she lived in, visit the Burpee expedition's Montana base camp and much more.

"Jane is one of the top ten finds in the history of paleontology," said Peter Larson, who led the team that discovered Chicago's Sue. Although there are few paleontologists in the world who wouldn't give his or her favorite rock hammer - and the arm that swings it - to have found Jane, she is just one star in Burpee's constellation. There's much more to do and see at the museum CNN dubbed, "the little museum that could" in downtown Rockford.

"Windows to Wilderness" is a fascinating, in-depth look into the sights, natural sounds, smells and unique character of our region's upland prairie, wetlands and woodlands. The exhibit features live animals and many interactive elements.

"The Carboniferous Coal Forest" utilizes technology to create a two-story tall prehistoric coal forest complete with thunder and lightning. Visitors experience a sudden rainstorm as they explore our local landscape, insects and amphibians as they existed 300 million years ago. "And those are just two examples of other things to do and see here," said Lew Crampton, President. "Burpee is easily a two-hour stop for most families."

No wonder Robert Bakker, the renowned Paleontology expert, said of Burpee, "pound for pound, it is the best natural history museum in the country."

When you visit Rockford, make time to experience this intimate, fascinating world-class museum for yourselves. Parking is free and admission is a modest \$5 for adults and \$4 for children. Visit visitjane.com or gorockford.com for information. Burpee is located in downtown Rockford. After taking a look at the jaws of Jane, go next door and explore the Discovery Center Museum or the Rockford Art Museum. Hungry? The Olympic Tavern, a local favorite, is just a short drive north on Main Street.

THE DISCOVERY CENTER A Childhood Dream Come True

It has long been said that The Forest City is a family town. For proof look no further than the Discovery Center Museum. Right next door to Burpee Museum of Natural History and sharing a building with Rockford Art Museum, the Discovery Center is tied with Baltimore's children's museum as the fourth-best in the country according to Child magazine. Discovery Center is the only museum rated in the Top Ten in the state of Illinois.

"When we say this is a great place to raise a family, we mean it," says Sarah Wolf, Executive Director. "And we go out of our way to improve our city's family friendliness all the time."

The Discovery Center was Wolf's brainchild and has grown from a virtual baby in 1981 to a big daddy on the Riverfront Museum Campus downtown in the new millennium. Boasting 18,000 square feet of interior exhibit space and an 8,000 square foot "Outdoor Science Park," the Discovery Center is truly a childhood dream come true. Kids tend to have so much fun there, they scarcely know they're actually learning while they're doing it.

What, exactly can kids do at the Discovery Center? Visit the Planetarium and a Flight Simulator and pretend they're astronauts. Climb a spiral staircase with a giant Mouse Hole Maze. See their endless reflections in the Infinity Tunnel. Build

robots in the Robotics Lab. Impress themselves and see the video results on the Giant Pinscreen. Hunt for dinosaur fossils in the Dino Dig (and much more) in the outdoor Rock River Discovery Park.

A typical year sees more than 250,000 individual and family visitors to the Discovery Center. Students from far and wide make field trips, and in 2004 alone buses arrived from 96 Illinois cities and 18 counties and 17 cities and 6 counties in Wisconsin.

Discovery Center is centrally located in Rockford's Riverfront Museum Campus, parking is free and admission is just \$5 for adults and \$4 for children. Visit discoverycentermuseum.org for details.

Discovery Center is located in downtown Rockford. After exploring at the Museum Campus don't forget to check out the Riverview Ice House, located just across the Rock River.



MAGIC WATERS

A Million Gallons Of Fun

"Kids love the water - it's really as simple as that," explained Karen Weis of the Rockford Park District when asked why families from all over the Midwest come to splash around at Magic Waters Water Park. "They get very excited because there are so many great ways to beat the heat!"

With the liquid distinction of being the second-largest publicly owned water park in the United States, this 43-acre water retreat is a staple for residents and out-of-town families escaping the sweltering heat of Midwestern summers.

Whether it's slithering down eleven slides, tubing in the SplashMagic river or just soaking up rays, fun is the order of the

day. In fact, if fun were measured in gallons, the total would be impressive: 1,000,310 gallons of fun, to be exact.

The fan favorite attraction is "Breaker Beach", the 707,000gallon wave pool, with its rhythmic undulating waves that send heads bobbing like buoys and ripples of laughing swimmers towards shore.

Shrieks of delight also whistle like seagull calls throughout the venue. The main culprits: The "SplashBLASTER" and the dreaded "ABYSS"

The "SplashBLASTER" slings riders' tubes up and down through a maze of swirling pipes. The two-minute ascent to the top sets the stage for 45 seconds of dizzying descent.

The "ABYSS" encloses riders on a dark downward spiral that leaves them feeling the thrill of the unknown as they never quite get a solid grip on space and time during the trip.

Magic Waters' location is another major asset that makes the park extremely family friendly. It's easily accessible off I-90 and I-39. Plus, there's plenty to do nearby after families have had their day in the water.

"There is the CherryVale Mall, Kerasotes Theatre and many, many great restaurants within a five minute drive of the park," Weis said.

Cost won't send you out to sea, either; expect rates of no more than \$19.95 for adults and take-in coolers and picnic lunches are welcome. ROCKFORD ART MUSEUM

Conveniently Yours

As you probably know, convenience is a major asset for those of us who live in - and visit - Rockford. So, it won't surprise you to learn that the Rockford Art Museum is literally steps away from Burpee Museum of Natural History and Discovery Center Museum on Rockford's Riverfront Museum Campus. Park you car once (for free) and you can be entertained for hours.

Boasting 17,000 square feet and three galleries of exhibition space, RAM is the largest art museum in Illinois outside of Chicago. Originally founded as the Rockford Art Association in 1913, RAM's permanent collection now contains over 1,600 individual works. As many as twelve distinct exhibitions are scheduled each year.

The Rockford Art Museum's permanent collection consists of works by American Impressionist painters, historical and contemporary photographers, self-taught African-American artists as well as nationally and internationally famous glasswork artists. There has always been a special emphasis on regional and American artists in the permanent collection and it mirrors the evolution of our nation's art history throughout the 19th and 20th centuries. Areas of focus include the Hudson River School, Taos Society, American Impressionism, Outsider Art, self-taught African American art, contemporary studio-art glass and others.

TINKER SWISS COTTAGE

A Visit To Robert Tinker's Love Shack

Robert Tinker was nothing if not romantic. His "Swiss Cottage," built from 1865 - 1869, is not only an homage to the architecture he had grown to love during European travel, but to his wife, Mary Manny, whom he eventually loved even more. Tinker himself designed the building and did most of the finishing work.

When they passed away, the Tinkers left everything. A trip into the cottage is truly like an all-senses-engaged trip into a time machine. Robert and Mary's (and other family members') art, their clothing, their utensils, their books, their diaries everything - remains for your viewing pleasure. And thanks to the Rockford Park District and the Tinker staff, it all remains in beautifully restored condition.

With its astoundingly beautiful gabled roof, balconies opening to scenic views, gingerbread trim, exquisite parquet floors, intricate woodwork, root wood furniture, hand-painted mural ceilings, heirloom rose gardens and other wonders. Tinker Swiss Cottage is a breathtaking place to visit. Perhaps best of all, the back story that informs its creation is as interesting as the place itself.

Tinker traveled to Rockford in 1856 to become a bookkeeper in the Manny Reaper company - the same year Mary Manny's husband and Manny Reaper founder John H. Manny passed away. It wasn't until 1870 that Tinker and Mary Manny were married. The couple took to living in Tinker's Swiss cottage in the winters and Manny's Italianate mansion, across Kent Creek, come summertime. Tinker had built a suspension bridge across Kent Creek to facilitate their



journeys - and the bridge was brought back to life in June of 2005. You can walk across it to this day and feel history swaying (just a touch!) below your feet. Robert Tinker was a gifted businessman and artisan who put his passion to work. His legacies to love and all things beautiful in his eyes are still here for us today in southwest Rockford on the south shore of Kent Creek - where it all

started.



Artificial stars twinkle in the ceiling of the atmospheric Coronado. Real stars twinkle in the sky when the curtain rises at Starlight. And performing stars are shining day in and day out on stages all over the Rockford Region.

THE CORONADO PERFORMING ARTS CENTER

Rockford's Original Wonder Theater

The spectacularly historic Coronado Performing Arts Center leaves many newcomers slack-jawed and wide-eyed when they first view its ornate lobbies and auditorium. Having opened its doors in 1927, the Coronado has been wowing theater-goers (and more than a few performers) for decades. In its early years, luminaries of Vaudeville such as Bob Hope, Al Jolsen and the Marx Brothers graced its downtown Rockford stage.

The Coronado is the rare venue where the venue itself is part of the show, a panoramic time capsule of fascinating history and epic architectural beauty lending a sense of magic to every evening's performance. Built in the 'atmospheric' style popular in the Vaudeville era, ornate Moorish, Spanish and Roman architectural influences are seen at every turn and in virtually every nook and cranny.

"The Coronado Theatre is literally breathtaking," said Kristina Reinert about her first visit during a production of the Broadway hit, "Contact." "From the second you walk in the front door the 'wow' factor hits you," she enthused.

The theater re-opened in 2001 after it was generously donated to the community by Kerasotes Theatres and restored to its original luster. The "wow factor" wouldn't have been possible without the \$18.5 million in renovation funds the Friends of the Coronado, the City of Rockford and 5,000 donors raised to keep this historic landmark from crumbling into oblivion.

"The renovations are just beautiful. There aren't many old theaters this spectacular anywhere in the country," said Marty Magnus, longtime Coronado historian, tour guide and member of the Land of Lincoln Organ Society. (The theater has a still-magnificent Grande Barton Pipe Organ, a rare and enormous musical instrument worthy of the Phantom of the Opera himself.) The laundry list of legendary performers and politicians who have appeared there add to the sense of history the theater emanates. Knowing that Johnny Cash picked his guitar, John F. Kennedy delivered a speech or Jerry Seinfeld quipped one-liners here makes a visit

The theatre is home to the Rockford Symphony Orchestra, Coronado Concert Association, the Rockford Dance Company and the Broadway at the Coronado series, which features shows like "The Full Monty," "42nd Street" and "Oklahoma."

DOWNTOWN'S ORIGINAL NIGHTCLUBS

If there are nightclubs on Superman's home planet of Krypton, they're probably a lot like Kryptonite in Rockford's downtown River District. It's a groovy mix of submarine chic and LA cool. The first floor is an uniquely decorated open bar area where the libations are poured and the musicians rock.

The mezzanine, with its rail-surrounded open oval allows viewing to the first floor, and is a comfortable haven featuring overstuffed chairs, couches and moody lighting.

"We wanted to create a unique, intimate scene for music," said owner Chris Wachowiak. "People say Kryptonite would fit in any big city in the country."

Despite its intimate proportions, Kryptonite has played host to a surprising number of international acts: Urge Overkill, Robert Bradley's Blackwater Surprise and Rich Robinson, to name just a few.

At a recent Sleepy LaBeef performance, hometown legend, Cheap Trick's Rick Nielsen, played the part of Sleepy's high-profile sideman for the entire first set. That set, by the way, was almost two hours long. "Sleepy was not sleeping tonight," joked Nielsen.

The fun moves outside come summertime, when Kryptonite, like many other downtown hotspots. offers outdoor seating in the open air - and an expanded food menu. Speaking of other downtown hotspots, there are many. Those offering music include The Irish



Starlight Theatre, Rockford's home to musical theater, sits among rolling hills on the campus of Rock Valley College. It is as much a Rockford institution as high school basketball. If you know Rockford, that's saying a mouthful.

Here's another mouthful: 30 "graduates" of Starlight Theatre's summertime musical productions are currently prowling the stages of Broadway. Simply put, Starlight is to Broadway what the minor leagues are to major league sports. It has afforded thousands the opportunity to say, "I saw Marin Mazzie when she played Liesel in The Sound of Music."

Starlight was founded in 1967 to showcase the beauty of Rock Valley College's then rural campus. Artistic Director Mike Webb has presented classics and contemporary musical productions there for more than 20 years. Given the fact that the actors and musicians are ALL volunteers (including the many professional members of each cast) Webb spends freely on costumes and sets - not to mention livestock. Actors were joined by live camels during the '95 and '96 staging of Joseph and The Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat, for instance.

Now, Webb presents his works in a world-class, landmark building with a mechanical roof that blossoms on starry nights like a wood and steel moonflower. The new Starlight Theatre was designed by renowned architects Studio Gang, the founder of which hails from nearby Belvidere, Illinois.

THE METROCENTRE

MetroCentre, a 10.000-seat arena/auditorium located in the heart of downtown Rockford, is home to music, athletic and exposition events. In 2007, it is undergoing a dramatic \$23 million renovation.

"There really isn't a bad seat in our building," said Corey Pearson, General Manager. "No matter where you sit, you can have a great experience. This building is not too small and it's not too big. You're virtually assured a great experience, regardless of what event you're attending."

ROCK CUT STATE PARK

Between a Rock and A Soft Spot in Our Hearts

On Rockford's northeast side, just a couple of quick turns off I-90, lies a crown jewel of our region's natural history: Rock Cut State Park. It's the kind of place local folks would rather we didn't boast about - a true Rockford Original and a regional best-kept secret.

From roughly 1655 to 1832, the Rock Cut area was roamed by many native American tribes: Iroquois, Pottawatomi, Chippewa, Ottawa and others. Pierce Lake, the 160- acre centerpiece of Rock Cut today, didn't exist then: it is a manmade reservoir. Today, the lake is home to a menagerie of fish species including surprisingly large northern pike and walleye. It is aggressively fished, but well-managed, so fishing enthusiasts seldom go home skunked.

The lake also hides the origin of Rock Cut's name - an abandoned railroad bed cut through limestone bluffs called the Kenosha-Rockford Line

and an abundance of wildlife, flora and fauna - including over 100 types of wildflowers.

particularly during peak season, we suggest reserving early. A surprisingly high number of campers consider Rock Cut a home away from home and look forward to returning each year to its sun-dappled forests.

Lisa Weis, a Rockford outdoor enthusiast and lifelong Rockford resident, said, "we're lucky to have Rock Cut so close to home. We ride our mountain bikes, our road bikes, go for walks, go snowshoeing. Do me a favor. Don't tell anyone else from outside Rockford about it!"

ALDEEN & ROCKFORD **REGION GOLF COURSES** In The Forest City, Flag Sticks Grow Like Trees

It's often been said that there's a church - and a golf course - on every corner in Rockford. This certainly lends credence to Rockford's tongue-in-cheek tag "Illinois' Holiest City." Without question, the Rockford Region is blessed with an abundance of wonderful and wonderfully low-cost golf courses.

Aldeen Golf Club, the Rockford Park District's crown jewel and a true championship track, was rated 4.5 stars by Golf Digest magazine.

7131 yards from the tips, Aldeen is a devilish Dick Nugent layout featuring ribbony fairways elegantly defined by abrupt hilly rough, abundant trees and bunkers. Fourteen of the holes boast water hazards and high handicappers are encouraged to bring more than their usual ration of balls. In 2007, non-resident green fees were just \$40 on weekdays and \$45 on weekends.

On the other end of the spectrum is **Sinnissippi**, a quaint little nine-holer in a east-side residential district a stone's throw from Sinnissippi Gardens. Don't assume it will yield a low score, though. Many of the children who literally grew up on its verdant greens have developed into champion golfers. In 2007, nine holes set you back \$12.

The three other Rockford Park District courses each have their own personality and charms and cost just \$21 weekdays and \$22 weekends for non-residents in 2007. Ingersoll,

built in 1922, has narrow fairways lined with mature trees. At less than 6,000 yards from the back tees, its confines have added more than a few strokes to many a players' handicaps over the years.

Elliot, the second-newest course in the Park District family, was built on relatively open, hilly farmland in 1968. It features wide fairways, distinct elevation changes and a solid mixture of straight and doglegged holes. Elliot is a bombers' paradise.



Sandy Hollow is a hilly, challenging parklands design with no two holes alike. The greens tend to be just a shade on the slow side, but the golf course itself is spectacular and the green fees are spectacularly low. If you have a morning tee time, show up a little early and enjoy one of Linda's delicious egg sandwiches or other breakfast delights with a cup of steaming coffee.

Other notable area courses include Atwood Homestead, Macktown and The Ledges, all high-quality 18 hole tracks with enticingly low green fees and easy access to visiting golfers.

The Ledges in particular is a handful from the tips for all but the most skilled players. A former private club, it was acquired by Winnebago County some years ago and made available to anyone who wants to accept its considerable challenges. Macktown is a short and sporty track in Rockton that big hitters can easily overwhelm, but if you're a big hitter who can't hit the

> fairway, par might be elusive despite the diminutive length of some of the holes. Atwood is long, long, long - but, relative to the well-forested Macktown, it is fairly open and wind-blown. Bring your "A" game.

At the end of the day, the Rockford region truly is a little bit of golf heaven right here on earth. Visit gorockford.com for details on these and other area courses, or see page 25.

KLEHM ARBORETUM

Relax in Klehm's Historic Beauty

The history of Klehm Arboretum & Botanic Garden is as substantial as the trunks of the many oaks that grace its grounds. From humble beginnings as a nursery planted from scratch by the Taylor family in 1910, Klehm has grown to a one-of-a-kind haven for plant life boasting over 500 different species of trees, shrubs and vines. It is one of the oldest and most diverse in the Midwest.

William Lincoln Taylor (W.T. for short) and his brother Everett planted the trees that are the foundation of the arboretum today. They planted everything in rows, so if you look carefully, you can see the original lines, now surrounded by newer additions.

Klehm is best known for its expansive conifer, oak and magnolia collections (as well as abundant wildlife) which makes walking the 2 miles of paths equally thrilling to the eyes, ears and nose. Every sense is engaged at Klehm. The azalea and rhododendron garden (blooming in early March through September) is the newest addition to the collection and largest in northern Illinois.

"There are so many different species to see," said Barbara Manning, a frequent stroller on the grounds. "I enjoy coming out to see the old Oaks and the gardens in bloom when the weather starts to get warmer, but winter is white and wonderful, too."

Carl Petersen, another regular to Klehm, agrees: "I see something new every time. And, for me, Klehm is a big, beautiful organic stress-reliever."

The centerpiece of the entire collection is what staff members call the Century Oak - the tallest and one of the oldest oaks at more than 150 years old. So unique and precious is the treasured bur oak that it is wired with lightning resistant cable for protection.



Because most of the collection was planted around the turn of the century, many Klehm tree samples dwarf specimens at other Midwest arboretums.

Added attractions include a Children's Garden, Grass Garden and Butterfly Garden. Klehm's programming schedule is as varied and colorful as the grounds themselves. There is literally something fun and educational going on every week, from the Garden Fair to the Summer Music Series and more.

Admission is just \$4.00.

HEAD OF THE ROCK

It's Not Just A Race. It's an Institution.

Come the second weekend of October on the east bank of the Rock River, ducks and geese find themselves in competition for shore space as 1700 plus rowers from across the country convene for head-tohead competition at the Head of the Rock. From prep and collegiate teams to club teams of all ages, the Head of the Rock has become a premier national rowing competition and much-anticipated spectacle for Rockfordians and visitors alike.

Oarsmen and women from more than 60 clubs and universities racing over 400 boats shared the 2.5 miles of the Rock River's prime racing length each year. Major universities represented in both men's and women's events over the years have included Purdue, University of Iowa, Northwestern, Marquette, University of Minnesota, University of Michigan, Notre Dame and others.

Randy Jablonic, the legendary (and now retired) Head Coach of the University of Wisconsin men's varsity rowing team, played an instrumental role in helping initiate Rockford's rowing club and the first Head of the Rock. In 1984, at the request of John Holub, then Executive Director of a local economic development agency, Jablonic visited Rockford to assess the quality of its rowing water. Jay Graham, who ushered Jablonic to town, recalls his reaction after getting out of his car and walking to the spot where the local boat house now sits.

"Randy got extremely excited," Graham said. "He saw our river and his jaw literally dropped. He was practically jumping around. He said it was the finest stretch of rowing water he had seen in the United States and we HAD to have a rowing club and we HAD to have a race in Rockford."

"We've heard that from so many other people over the years," says Dennis Kaderabek, Regatta founder. "I've been Race Director for 20 years now and I'll tell you - I've become very proud of our river. It's the envy of all the clubs that compete at our race. For a number of reasons it is unique in the nation."

Not the least of the Rock River's assets is its spectatorfriendliness. The riverside Recreation Path, which runs the length of the course on the east bank, affords terrific views of the action, as do positions on the Auburn Street, Whitman Street and Riverside Boulevard bridges - Auburn Street being the best of the three.

The Rock River runs through the center of Rockford. Our region also boasts three other rivers! Visit the beautiful Pecatonica, Sugar and Kishwaukee Rivers and find your favorite view from every bank.

Other attractions include art, jewelry and clothing for sale at the "Urban Market" or a myriad of different carnival thrill rides for both kids and adults.

Also, it's reassuring to know that your admission for the 4-day event will go toward a worthy cause. Led by generous volunteers, this not-for-profit earns around \$400,000 every year for worthwhile community causes such as local schools, animal shelters, hospitals and various other social service organizations.

Year after year, visitors to OTW have a great time, evidenced by the many positive testimonials people send to Genoways.

"We receive notes from people throughout the region saying 'we came this year and we're coming back next year with several friends because of the production, the music, the small crowds and the free parking. It's a combination that is hard to beat," she said.

Even most longtime Rockford residents don't know that Maria's is in its second location. The restaurant first took roots across the street in the Cason family Italian grocery store, circa 1913.

The little store is long gone, but under the loving hands of Maria Dal Cason's grandsons Joe and John, and her daughter-in-law Carmella, Maria's is still cooking in the same kitchen the cafe moved to in the early 1930s.

Maria's son, Jake, was unable to serve in the war due to a serious childhood injury, but serve the soldiers he did: gladly and generously.

You will most likely approach Maria's from the parking lot, walking past the sliding screen door that leads to its kitchen. Golden light glows inside along with the historic aromas of red sauce, fresh-cut steaks on the grill and olive oil and garlic. It's the perfect visual and aromatic appetizer - and stands in contrast to the laughter and conversation you'll hear when you open the front door and enter the restaurant.

BEEFAROO

Beefaroo Is Still Cooking It Just For You

Jean Vitale, owner of Beefaroo, is not one to rest on her laurels – or her burgers, for that matter. She's more interested in building on 30 years of burger building success than just, umm, relishing it.

"A lot of people in the restaurant business fall into the trap of counting sales," said Vitale. "But, yesterday is not what Beef-a-Roo is about. It's about the customer that is in front of me right this moment. If I listen closely, that customer will tell me the key to future success."

There's a small TV in the bar, but fellowship is obviously the most entertaining thing in the room. Most nights, you'll get the feeling that everyone knows everybody else - and they all have a lot to say to each other.

As you might expect, the walls are festooned with photos of visiting Presidents and celebrities, Cason family memories (Jake trying on a buddy's US Army uniform he so badly wanted to wear himself) and old newspaper articles.

There's plenty to tempt you on the menu - from pasta and pizza (Maria's was the first sit-down restaurant in Rockford to offer pizza) to the famous garlic-spiced New York strip, sirloin and porterhouse steaks. Don't miss Maria's Special Salad with tangy oil and vinegar dressing, homemade Italian sausage, red peppers, bleu cheese and olives.

Unless you're extraordinarily hungry, chances are you will be taking tomorrow's lunch home with you tonight; the portions are generous, to say the least. You can just hear Maria, with a musical Italian accent, saying, "eat something! You're too skinny!"




