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Hamilton County CVB, City of Noblesville Host "Pushing for Progress" Open House at Historic Judge Stone House

(CARMEL, Ind.) – Hamilton County Convention and Visitors Bureau and the City of Noblesville will host an open house, "Pushing for Progress," on Wednesday, October 26, from 3 to 4:30 p.m. at the Judge Stone House, 107 South 8th Street in Noblesville, Ind. The open house marks the beginning of the restoration work that will transform the historic home into one of the Nickel Plate Arts Trail's teaching and cultural centers.

Browning Day Mullins Dierdorf Architects will kick-off the restoration project by replacing the windows, through a funding partnership with the City of Noblesville. Mayor John Ditslear, who, at one time, lived in the Judge Stone House, will have the honor of pushing out the first window.

Built in 1849 by Judge Earl S. Stone, the Greek Revival style house is one of the oldest structures in Noblesville. \While this home is not exuberant or highly ornamented, it is a

substantial home for a small Midwest town in the mid-1800s and this home must have been a significant construction project and likely drew a lot of attention at the time. It was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1978 and the Interim Report of historic structures, developed by Historic Landmarks Foundation of Indiana, lists the Judge Stone House with the highest rating possible.

The purchase and restoration of the Judge Stone House and the neighboring house were made possible in part by innkeepers tax dollars captured from out-of-area visitors which have been invested under a tourism bond initiative approved by the Hamilton County Council.

The Hamilton County Convention and Visitors Bureau promotes tourism growth through strategic marketing, hospitality and community development initiatives. It has welcome centers in Carmel, Fishers, and Noblesville.
