Global Nephrology Congress to give Melbourne's Knowledge Economy a Boost

Minister for Tourism and Major Events John Eren today announced that Melbourne has been chosen to host the prestigious World Congress of Nephrology in 2019 at the Melbourne Convention and Exhibition Centre (MCEC).

Minister Eren said the Congress is the most significant conference in the world for global kidney health and a significant victory for Melbourne and Victoria.

"The City of Melbourne with support from Kidney Health Australia will see an active kidney health public screening and awareness campaign across the city centre during the congress, ensuring a health outcome with a lasting legacy for our local community. The conference will also have a focus on educating neighbouring developing nations."

Ms Bolinger said that securing the bid would not have been possible without support from Melbourne's medical sector, including world leaders from Monash Health and St Vincent's Hospital with support from all major Nephrology units across Australia and New Zealand.

Lord Mayor, Robert Doyle, said Melbourne has the deserved reputation as the knowledge capital with a global reputation for innovation in medical and research facilities.

"As the world's most liveable city for five years running, Melbourne is the ideal location for international conferences of this calibre," Cr Doyle said.
