1 Asbury Park, New Jersey

Often regarded as the Hamptons of New Jersey, <u>Asbury Park</u> is a cultural hub of the Jersey shore, with lively boardwalks, gorgeous beaches, and a bustling music scene. Spend the night at <u>Asbury</u> <u>Ocean Club Hotel</u>, or catch a show at <u>The Stone Pony</u>, where New Jersey natives like Bruce Springsteen got their start.

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2 Myrtle Beach, South Carolina

If amusement-filled boardwalks, long stretches of lively beaches, and seaside culinary classics are among your beach trip must-haves, Myrtle Beach in South Carolina is the place to be. Whether you're taking in the views from the country's second tallest ferris wheel or slurping down oysters at Pier 14, you'll never run out of things to do in this beachy hub.

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3 Ogunquit Beach, Maine

While Maine is home to some of the East Coast's most beloved beaches, Ogunquit's long and sandy peninsula remains at the top for its scenic New England splendor. 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6 Narragansett, Rhode Island

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8 Ocracoke Beach, North Carolina
