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What is this product?**Type:**

A Spread Bet is a leveraged contract entered into with ADSS on a bilateral basis. It allows an investor to speculate on rising or falling prices in an underlying Index.

An investor has the choice to buy (or go “long”) the Spread Bet to benefit from rising index prices; or to sell (or go “short”) the Spread Bet to benefit from falling index prices. The price of the Spread Bet is derived from the price of the underlying cash index price. For instance, if an investor is long an index Spread Bet and the price of the underlying index rises, the value of the Spread Bet will increase, and at the end of the contract ADSS will pay the difference between the closing value of the contract and the opening value of the contract. Conversely, if an investor is long and the cash price of the underlying index falls the value of the Spread Bet will decrease, and at the end of the contract the investor will pay ADSS the difference between the closing value of the contract and the opening value of the contract. The leverage embedded within all Spread Bets has the effect of magnifying both profits and losses.

The leverage embedded within all Spread Bet has the effect of magnifying both profits and losses. Conversely, if an investor is long and the price of the underlying index falls, the value of the Spread Bet will decrease, and at the end of the bet they will pay ADSS the difference between the closing value of the bet and the opening value of the bet.

Objectives:

The objective of the Spread Bet is to allow an investor to gain leveraged exposure to the movement in the value of the underlying index (whether up or down), without actually needing to buy or sell the underlying index. The exposure is leveraged since the Spread Bet only requires a relatively small proportion of the notional value of the contract to be put down upfront as initial margin and is one of the key features of trading Spread Bet.

By way of example, if an investor buys a Spread Bet worth £1 per point with an initial margin amount of 20% and an underlying index price of 7000, the initial investment will be £1400 (20% x 7000 x 1). The effect of leverage, in this case 5:1 (1 / 0.2%) has resulted in a notional value of the contract of £7,000 (£1400 x 5). This means that for each 1 point change in the price of the underlying index so the value of the Spread Bet changes by £1. For instance, if the investor is long and the

market increases in value, a £1 profit will be made for every 1 point increase in that market. However, if the market decreases in value, a £1 loss will be incurred for each point the market decreases in value. Conversely, if an investor holds a short position, a profit is made in line with any decreases in that market, and a loss for any increases in the market.

The cash Spread Bet does not have a pre-defined maturity date and is therefore open-ended; As a result, there is no recommended holding period for either and it is down to the discretion of each individual investor to determine the most appropriate holding period based on their own individual trading strategy and objectives.

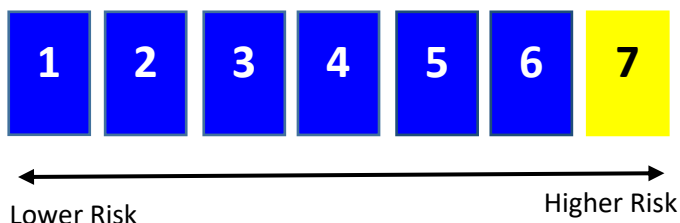
Failure to deposit additional funds in the case of negative price movement may result in the Spread Bet being closed out. This process may be automated and, accordingly, your positions may be closed-out with little or no notice being provided to you. ADSS also retains the ability to terminate any Spread Bet where it deems that the terms of the contract have been breached.

Intended retail investor:

Spread Bets are intended for investors who have knowledge of, or are experienced with, leveraged products. Likely investors will understand how the prices of Spread Bets are derived, the key concepts of margin and leverage and the fact that losses may exceed deposits in a given position. In addition, they will understand the risk/reward profile of the product compared to traditional share dealing. Investors will also have appropriate financial means and the ability to bear losses up to the total margin amount invested in the case of Retail clients.

What are the risks and what could I get in return?

Summary Risk Indicator:



The risk indicator assumes that you may not be able to buy or sell your Spread Bet at the price you wanted to due to volatility of the market or you may have to buy or sell your Spread Bet at a price that significantly impacts how much you can get back.

Spread Bets are leveraged products that, due to underlying market movement, can generate losses rapidly and you may be required to deposit additional funds in order to maintain your positions. There is no capital protection against market risk, credit risk or liquidity risk. Retail clients are subject to negative balance protection which means, while it is possible to lose the entire amount invested, you are not able to lose more than your investment.

Beware of currency risk. You may receive payments in a different currency, so the final return you will get may depend on the exchange rate between the two currencies. This risk is not considered in the indicator shown above.

Performance Scenarios

What are the costs?

Trading a Spread Bet on an underlying Index incurs certain of the following costs:

Cash and Futures	One-off entry or	Spread	The difference between the buy price and the sell price is called the spread. This cost is realised each time you open and close a trade.

	exit costs	Currency conversion	Any cash, realised profit and losses, adjustments, fees and charges that are denominated in a currency other than the base currency of your account, will be converted to the base currency of your account and a currency conversion fee will be charged to your account.
Cash only	Ongoing costs	Daily funding charge	A fee is charged to your account for every night that your position is held. This fee is an interest adjustment to your account to reflect the cost of funding your position and is based on the one month interbank funding rates (LIBOR) and is calculated by the one Month Sterling Libor plus 250 basis points, divided by 365. How long should I hold it and can I take money out early?

Spread Bets are intended for short term trading, in some cases intraday and are generally not suitable for long term investments. There is no recommended holding period, no cancellation period and therefore no cancellation fees. You can open and close a Spread Bet at any time during market hours.
