## ¡Buena suerte! MONEY PLANT CUTTINGS

Stop for a moment and reflect. What you are holding in your hands is not a more or less realistic, pop or Japanese anime-style reproduction of a plant. You have been given a wish for Good Luck! by the express will of the artist Ruth Gómez, who carried out a similar action in her exhibition of the same name a few months ago. This plant, whose screen-printed version you have been able to see at the New Castle Foundation, is called Plectranthus Veriticillatus, commonly known as the money plant. In America they call it the "dollar plant". This, and not any other, was chosen by the artist following a line of chained thoughts. The first, of a scientific nature and with metaphorical implications, is that it forks extraordinarily quickly: if it breaks, if someone cuts it down, it will take root again and proliferate abundantly when it returns to the earth. Related to the previous one: this plant, in the face of adversity, grows and multiplies while maintaining its beauty intact. It has a proverbial capacity to regenerate itself and lead a new prodigal life. Finally, and in a symbolic or liturgical way: this plant, according to custom, brings wealth to those who give it as a gift. You have received it as a gift. In a world whose palpable economic crisis is dragging you into a moral crisis, where minds and their ideas are suffocated by peremptory material needs, it is intended to help you regain your illusion. Getting better is possible. Don't lose it.
