1. Desert Solitaire (Edward Abbey)

This is one of Edward Abbey's best works. He "reflects on the nature of the Colorado Plateau desert, on the condition of our remaining wilderness, and on the future of a civilization that cannot reconcile itself to living in the natural world."

2. Voluntary Simplicity (Duane Elgin)

A short book about living simply and purposefully. Duane uses a variety of ancedotes and quotations to make his point about living a less consumptive life.

3. Hot, Flat, and Crowded (Thomas Friedman)

In this book Friedman addresses the environmental crisis and America's loss of focus since 9/11.



4. The Monkey Wrench Gang (Edward Abbey)

An entertaining story that relates the tale of how one group of environmental activists goes about trying to restore the Colorado River system to its original state.

5. Wallace Stegner

Any of the works by Stegner are worth reading. To appreciate the West, he once remarked, "You have to get over the color green; you have to quit associating beauty with gardens and lawns; you have to get used to an inhuman scale."
