While it still may be snowing in Alta, now is the time to sow your cold weather crops if you live in the valley. The following vegetables can be planted by seed outside in the ground or in a container:

- Arugula
- Lettuces
- Spinach

You should wait to plant other, warmer weather vegetables (i.e. tomatoes and peppers) until around Mother's Day.
