Snow Rangers - By Liz Rocco

Alta has a unique and varying history from the early days of mining to the modern days of high speed quads. This history is displayed in countless books, articles, pictures, and relic ski equipment. Some of you may have heard of the influences of Alf Engen; but I believe fewer have heard of his older brother Sverre. In the 1940's Sverre was the first employed "Snow Ranger" for the United States Forest Service

(USFS). As a Snow Ranger, Sverre Engen was on the slopes most often alone gaining knowledge of terrain, snow science, and meteorology. Sverre was hired to patrol the slopes and monitor the snow conditions for slide potential; and then given authority to close certain slopes and work with the road crew on the opening of the canyon road. For five years Sverre gained knowledge through observation and record keeping. Then in the late 40's Sverre passed the snow ranger torch on to Monty Atwater and Ed LaChapelle. Monty and Ed took the job of Snow Ranger to the next level by intensely studying the science behind avalanches and weather and also developing techniques to start avalanches with artillery, and the 'avalauncher', a device Monty designed to fire a lit charge of dynamite, which operates on compressed air.

Over the years the USFS Snow Ranger job was absorbed into the job description of an Alta Ski Patroller. As a result of the early Snow Rangers at Alta, Alta is looked upon to this day to be leaders in snow science and avalanche mitigation techniques. Although the duties of the 'Snow Ranger' has changed over the years for the USFS, you can still "Tour with a Ranger." These

The Rangers of today are out and about on skis sharing their knowledge of Alta's natural history with all those that desire to learn and explore. In partnership with the <u>Cottonwood Canyons Foundation</u> and Alta Ski Lifts, highly trained volunteer 'Rangers' will be around throughout the winter to ski with participants and discuss topics from mining history to watershed and winter ecology.

The Tour With a Ranger program is complimentary and operates weekends and holidays, meeting at the top of the Sunnyside lift, from December 19th, 2015 to March 27th, 2016. So get out there, ski with a ranger, or stop in at the Alf Engen Ski Museum in Alf's Restaurant for a cup of hot cocoa while immersing yourself in Alta.
