



### What do skiers and finches have in common? - By Lucila Fernandez, Tracy Aviary



Biologists team up to launch a new study on a unique bird species found in Alta Ski Area

"We have a Black Rosy-finch!"

A room full of biologists team with excitement at the long-awaited proclamation. With our faces glued to the glass inside of the Alta Town Office, 10 researchers had been watching patiently for a particular bird, the Black Rosy-finch, to fly into a feeder just outside of the building. The mission: to fasten a radio frequency identification (RFID) tag as a light bracelet on the leg of this bird. This is the first step to a regional study that will help to fill a knowledge gap about a bird that lives alongside us in the mountain landscapes that we, as skiers, hold so dear.

If you ever happen to see a Black Rosy-finch, you'll spot the pink markings that give this bird its name. But don't be fooled by its delicate look! This hardy bird is well-adapted to harsh climates, breeding in high alpine areas and dropping down (slightly) lower in the winter to feed at bird feeders in ski areas and mountain cabins. Because Black Rosy-finches are primarily found in rugged landscapes they are vulnerable to threats like climate change, and very difficult to study!

We are capturing rosy-finches using mist nets, which we've strategically placed in front of the Alta Town Office bird feeders. Continued on next page...

### Community Highlight: Our Beloved Alta Java—By Ellie Johnson

This ski up coffee shop has become a local's favorite. A place for the community to gather, to get a caffeine fix, or fuel up for power hour on the slopes. Since Susie Howard bought Alta Java the business has come a long way from the quick espresso in a Styrofoam cup. As one of Alta's only female business owners she has managed to run a successful business, provide steady employment for 10 hard working skiers, and make strides towards sustainability.

"We've been able to substantially cut down on garbage with our composting and 'to stay' options" says Susie. In fact, the business went from approximately 50 gallons of trash per day down to 25. All plant-based materials and coffee grounds are donated to a local skier named Galen for his personal composting efforts. Spent coffee grounds conserve



nitrogen and decompose quickly while promoting sustained thermophilic conditions. The trash is reduced even further by offering 'to stay options' in the form of ceramic mugs and plates. Likewise, Alta Java uses local chefs and roasters. Several studies have shown that buying from an independent, locally owned business, rather than a nationally owned business, that significantly more of your money is used to make purchases from other local businesses, service providers, and farms. This further strengthens the economic base of the whole community and promotes a greener economy. Susie buys from Salt Lake Roasting Co, Lonepine Bakery, and chef Theresa Chamberlin to name a few Salt Lake locals.

So, come and enjoy fresh baked snacks, specialty coffee drinks, and refreshing cold beverages this spring and summer! Yes, Alta Java will be open for this Summer 2019 on Saturdays, Sundays, and Holidays 11-5, July and August. #altajava

#### Birds continued...

After they've flown into the net, experienced handlers safely untangle the bird, take quick measurements, place the band on the bird, and release it. The bird is now free to visit a network of bird feeders around Alta Ski Area (top of Collins lift, Dispatch) and at Snowbird that are fitted with devices that will log each time a tagged bird visits.

The study is being run through a collaboration of a number of agencies, nonprofits, and academic institutions, including: Alta Environmental Center, <u>Tracy Aviary</u>, <u>Wild Utah Project</u>, <u>Utah Division of Wildlife Resources</u>, Utah State University, <u>Friends of Alta</u>, Snowbird Ski Resort, the U.S. Department of Defense, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and the U.S. Forest Service. By learning more about the population and distribution of Rosy-finches in Utah, we will be better equipped to conserve healthy populations of rosy-fiches into the future
