Strategic Issue: Community Health Needs Assessment and Implementation Plans 2016 - 2018

Issue: Report of Year 1 results of Community Health Needs Assessment Implementation Plan

Background: The Affordable Care Act requires that nonprofit hospitals conduct a community health needs assessment and develop implementation plans to address the needs prioritized every three years. The most recent needs assessment was conducted in 2015. The ACA requires that the boards of nonprofit hospitals approve the assessment and implementation plans.

A work group of Baptist Nassau clinicians and administrators reviewed the needs identified in the assessment and prioritized: **Access to Care, Cancer, Health Disparities and Mental Health**. Implementation plans were developed in consultation with community organizations to address the prioritized health needs and approved by the Baptist Medical Center Nassau Board January 27, 2016.

2016-2018 Prioritized Needs and Implementation Plans:

Access to Care: Partner with Barnabas and Council on Aging of Nassau County to provide access to care and transportation to medical appointments. Provide health screenings in low income communities and connect people with abnormal results to a medical home.

Cancer: Leverage Baptist MD Anderson partnership to increase screenings and education about prevention activities including HPV vaccine and smoking cessation. Register women for mammograms offered through the Florida Department of Health.

Health Disparities: Offer nutrition and physical activity program, diabetes education and screening through faith-based and community organizations within the African American, Hispanic and low-income population. Register women for mammograms offered through the Florida Department of Health.

Mental Health: Partner with United Way and other community organizations to reduce stigma associated with mental illness. Offer training on the warning signs of mental illness and what to do to help youth and adults in the community through faith and community partners. Increase access to services through integrated care clinic collaboration.

Questions for the Board:

- 1) As a Board member, what role can you play to support the implementation of our plans?
- 2) The next assessment will begin in 2018. What issues should we review as potential priorities for the next three-year plan?
