#### "Behold, I am about to do a new thing. Look, it springs forth!" Isaiah 43:18-19

As I was entering a local coffee shop this morning (okay, it was Starbucks!), a guy was coming out wearing jeans and a sweater. It was already 85 degrees! I must have given him a strange look, because he blurted out, "It was cold yesterday!"

A lot of us dress for the weather from the day before. Much of the time we plan for and worry about things that have already happened. It is often easier to look at the past than to try to figure out what the future is going to be. We know what happened yesterday. What's going to happen today is anyone's guess. We don't all live *in* the past, but we certainly live *by* the past. Of course we do. It's easier to see where we've been than to try to figure out where we need to go.

#### However, God lives by the future.

I love the passage in Isaiah 43, where God expresses a gentle frustration at our proclivity to see only the things that have already happened. If we need the message to be more explicit, in the preceding verse, God tells us, "Forget the former things. Do not dwell on the past!" We miss the point if we read the Bible as only stories about the past. Don't read the Bible solely to figure out what is past. Read the Bible to figure out today and tomorrow. The Bible shows how God guides our present and our future.

Psalm 96 says, "Sing to the Lord a new song; sing to the Lord, all the earth. Sing to the Lord, Bless God's name; tell of God's salvation from day to day. Declare God's glory among the nations, God's marvelous works among all the peoples. For great is the Lord."

July 1st has become known in many UMC circles as "Methodist New Years," as it is often the day when clergy begin serving in new appointments. I am thankful to be starting a new year with you here at Bethel! Travis, James, Ray, and Marlow join with me in saying our family is excited to live into God's future here, as we love, worship and serve alongside of all of you this second year together. I have confidence that God is with us: bringing Hope, Love, Joy and Peace to all people. I know our time together will be fruitful and blessed.

I hope that we remember to sing a new song all the days of our lifetime: to embody as witnesses the glory of God in all that we say, do and think.

As a child I was always so excited when my school's summer reading list was published! If you're anything like me, you may be searching for a good book to take to the beach, Lake Murray, or simply sit with in comfortable chair at home. Here are some of the books I'm reading this summer. I'd love to discuss them with you if you decide to read them as well!

#### Learning to Walk in the Dark by Barbara Brown Taylor

Follow Episcopal Priest Barbara on her journey to understand darkness, which takes her spelunking in unlit caves, learning to eat and cross the street as a blind person, discovering how "dark emotions" are prevented from seeing light, and rereading scripture to see all the times God shows up at night. With her characteristic charm and wisdom, Taylor is our guide through a spirituality of the nighttime, teaching us how to find God even in darkness, and giving us a way to let darkness teach us what we need to know.

#### Before We Were Yours by Lisa Wingate

Based on one of America's most notorious real-life scandals, in which Georgia Tann, director of a Memphis-based adoption organization, kidnapped and sold poor children to wealthy families all over the country, Lisa Wingate's riveting, wrenching, and ultimately uplifting tale reminds us how, even though the paths we take can lead to many places, the heart never forgets where we belong.

#### The Residence by Kate Andersen Bower

Full of stories and details that are dramatic, humorous, and heartwarming, *The Residence* reveals daily life in the White House as it is really lived through the voices of the maids, butlers, cooks, florists, doormen, engineers, and others who tend to the needs of the President and First Family.

#### Half Truths by Adam Hamilton

They are simple phrases. They sound Christian — like something you might find in the Bible. We've all heard these words. Maybe we've said them. They capture some element of truth, yet they miss the point in important ways. United Methodist Minister Adam Hamilton searches for the whole truth by comparing common Christian clichés to the message and ministry of Jesus. The clichés include:

- God said it, I believe it, that settles it.
- Love the sinner, hate the sin.
