

Bevinars Glossary to Large-Format Wine Bottles

FOR THOSE WHO THINK BIGGER IS BETTER—AND BETTER IS BARELY ENOUGH.

Α

A-List Pour: Slang for anything magnum or larger served at an event that also features step-and-repeat backdrops. Often Instagrammed before sipped.

Aging Curve: The long, luxurious arc of flavor development in big bottles. Connoisseurs insist that "the aging curve in magnums is slower, sexier, and infinitely more forgiving."

Aristopour: The Lavish act of serving Nebuchadnezzar or above to guests who have no idea what they're drinking. A term of endearment (or envy).

B

Big Boy: Generic slang for anything over 3L. "Bring out the big boy" is a cue to gasp and ready the cradle.

BOTTLE SHOCK: TEMPORARY DULLNESS IN WINE CAUSED BY TRAVEL. FOR LARGE FORMATS, IT CAN BE A FULL-ON MOOD SWING THAT REQUIRES DAYS OF REST IN THE CELLAR.

Balthy: Short for Balthazar. Only used by insiders. "He cracked a '96 Balthy of Salon—no notes."

C

Cradle Case: A collector who owns multiple large-format bottles and the cradles to pour them. Also a flex. MENTION WITH V CANTER

CORK FLEX: THE UNNECESSARY BUT IRRESISTIBLE DISPLAY OF HOW LARGE THE CORK IS IN A BIG BOTTLE.

Cuvée de Crème: A nickname for prestige bubbly in large format, especially Krug or Roederer Cristal.

D

Double Fister: A wine server forced to use both hands—and maybe a thigh—to pour from a Methuselah.

DECANT DRAMA: THE HIGH-THEATER MOMENT OF POURING A DOUBLE MAG INTO A DECANTER WHILE GUESTS FEIGN DISINTEREST.

Dripline: The rogue arc a poorly aimed big bottle makes on your \$6,000 rug. Not to be confused with a vineyard's irrigation line.

E

ELEPHANT BOTTLES: SLANG FOR ANYTHING 9L OR ABOVE. "We WENT THROUGH TWO ELEPHANT BOTTLES OF CHÂTEAUNEUF BEFORE APPETIZERS."

Ego Pour: The overly generous pour from a large format meant more to impress than hydrate.

F

First-Pour Privilege: The honor of receiving the very first splash from a pristine magnum. Bestowed only on the host's favorite.

Fugitive Cork: When a big-bottle cork launches like a missile. Most often happens with improperly chilled Jeroboams of Champagne.

G

Gargantuwine: An absurdly large and likely undrinkable bottle kept purely for display.

Glass-to-Wine Ratio: The inverse relationship of normal stemware to the outrageous scale of Nebuchadnezzar pours.

Н

House Magnum: What a serious wine drinker considers an everyday bottle. Anything smaller is considered a "tasting portion."

High-Shoulder Woes: The difficulty in decanting a Bordeaux-style 6L without triggering a tannin landslide.

I

Imperial Impulse: The irresistible urge to buy the 6L even though you're hosting a party for 6.

Instagrammable Oxidation: That hazy gold hue that only shows up in Methuselah-aged Montrachet. Delicious. Tragic. Worth posting.

J

Jero Jockey: A seasoned sommelier who can pour a Jeroboam one-handed. Mythic. Possibly French.

Jeroboast: To loudly announce you brought a Jero. Often precedes disappointment when it's Prosecco.

K

KILLER CORK: THE 3-INCH STOPPER FROM A 15L BOTTLE. OFTEN KEPT AS A TROPHY, OCCASIONALLY REPURPOSED AS A DOORSTOP.

L

Luxe Lugging: The act of hauling a Nebuchadnezzar up a spiral staircase. Usually ends in applause, or injury.

Library Jeroboam: A unicorn bottle from a legendary vintage. Hushed tones only.

M

Melchy Madness: The frenzied Joy (or panic) of realizing you just opened 24 bottles' worth of DRC in one go.

Magnum Mojo: The undeniable aura of cool when someone casually brings a magnum to a casual picnic.

Nebuchadness: The specific brand of madness that compels a person to purchase a 15L of 1945 Bordeaux. For "investment."

Nose Dive: The sensory overwhelm from inhaling the bouquet of a freshly cracked Methuselah.

Ox-Pause: The dramatic silence before the first pour from a very old largeformat wine, as everyone wonders: "Is it still alive?"

P

Punt Grip: The technique of inserting one's fist into the punt of a giant bottle while pouring. Risky. Sexy. Sommelier gold.

Pour Envy: The green-eyed glare when someone else gets the last glass from a legendary magnum.

Q

Quarter Case Club: Slang for anyone who brings Salmanazars to dinner parties on the regular. Also known as "The Reckless Few."

R

Rehobohemian: A rare soul who brings a 4.5L Rehoboam to a rooftop party. Often a trust fund kid. Always unforgettable.

Rack Rage: The fury of discovering your new 9L won't fit anywhere in your Eurocave.

S

Sabrage Swagger: The body language of someone who sabers magnums for breakfast. Always followed by Champagne showers.

SLEEPER METHUSELAH: A HUMBLE LABEL IN A 6L BOTTLE THAT TURNS OUT TO BE REVELATORY. THE SOMM VERSION OF AN INDIE HIT.

Trophy Format: A large bottle bought purely to be displayed, not drunk. Often stored next to a Ducati or signed guitar.

Transvasage Truthers: Those who claim any Champagne bigger than a magnum is a fraud because it wasn't bottle-fermented.

U

Ullage Whisperer: A pro who can eyeball a fill line from across the cellar and estimate the wine's condition to the millimeter.

Vertical Flex: The act of opening multiple magnums or large formats from different vintages of the same wine. Pure showmanship.

W

Whale Pour: A mythical-sized splash from a Nebuchadnezzar. Equivalent to three standard servings. Seen only at Gatsby-level parties.

X, Y, Z

Xenon Cork: Slang for a giant cork pulled with the aid of an industrial-grade corkscrew.

Yacht Juice: What magnums of rosé become when served off the coast of Ibiza. Accept no substitutes.

ZODIAC MAGNUM: A MAGNUM PICKED TO MATCH A GUEST'S ASTROLOGICAL SIGN.
