Using Songs for Teaching EFL or ESL to Young Learners



"The Garden Song" By Dave Mallett

Experience and Rationale

Listening to songs in the target language is a great way to get children familiar with the sounds of the language, with words and phrases, and with grammar structures.

This slideshow gives some ideas for using English songs with children for listening but also for singing.

Experience and Rationale

Songs add variety to lessons and can be used as warm-up or closing activities. Songs provide situated practice for vocabulary, grammar, and pronunciation.





Experience and Rationale

Songs provide opportunities for learning "chunks" and formulaic expressions, which may be available for analysis later.

Songs may appeal to varied learning styles and multiple intelligences.

Songs involve "tonal memory" for learning. Children can sing while doing other things (like drawing or cleaning the room).

"The Garden Song" was written by David Mallett. It tells about planting a garden.

The vocabulary and length of this song probably make it better for older learners (I'd estimate 10 and older), though its jaunty tune and clever rhyme scheme make it fun for anyone.

Language note: There are many examples of casual speech in this song:

Gonna = going to (also wanna, gotta, dunno) 'Til = until 'Cause = because Tumblin' = tumbling





Activities with the Garden Song

This song can be used with a unit about food, gardening, agriculture, or the environment. It can be used separately as a listening exercise (e.g., have the students hold up pictures of particular vocabulary items).
