LISTS OF SELECTED LOAN-WORDS

The following lists of loan-words are collated by language and date from the preceding chapter lists. They are only selections of assimilated words from the major sources of borrowed words in English. For example, the Urdu list might have included *coolie, hookah, horde, lascar, pilau, shawl* and *typhoon*, quite apart from unassimilated words like *aumil* (a native collector of revenue in India), *brinjarry* (a travelling grain and salt merchant of the Deccan), *kotwal* (a chief officer of police for a city or town in India) etc. For comprehensive lists, but no longer up-to-date, see *A History of Foreign Words in English*, Mary S Serjeantson, 1935.

The Oxford English Dictionary contains words from dozens of languages, as you can see from only the first names on the alphabetical list,

The first language in the list, Abnaki or Abenaki, was spoken by Algonquian-speaking Indian peoples of northern New England in North America. There are 17 entries for this language,

These lists of loan-words, therefore, are not comprehensive either in the choice of source language or in the selection of words, but I hope that they will be useful as a resource for students in their study of the language.
