



Flexible thinking

The more you revised the more the quality of your work really shone through, but this called for flexibility in your thinking and the willingness to play devil's advocate. To ensure that your ideas were expressed with absolute clarity and consistency, and your arguments were developed as clearly as possible, you had to be willing to make the really difficult decisions. You had to show that you are not so fixed in your thinking that you cannot bear the thought of changing anything once you've done something. This meant cutting out some sections and rewriting others even when this involved sections that you really liked.
