

# **Restaurant Role-play**

**Title:** Mastering Arabic 2

**Unit number:** 6

**Topic:** Ordering in a restaurant

**Aim:** To practice speaking/conversational skills

Materials needed:

Role-play cards (one per student)

Role-play in pairs is an effective way of getting all the students in a class talking, as well as being an integral part of many public examinations. Familiarise the students with the format of the cards, so that they can concentrate on perfecting their role.

### Step I

- ✓ Complete Mastering Arabic 2, Unit 6, pages 99–101 and the associated exercises.
- ✓ Print out attached role-play cards.

# Step 2

- ✓ Divide the students into pairs.
- Give each pair a matching set of A and B roleplay cards (there are two different sets on the attached print-out).
- ✓ Establish that they are going to play the role of either the waiter/waitress or the customer, based on the conversation they have been studying in *Mastering Arabic 2*.

# Step 3

✓ Give the students five minutes to study their cards and think about what they might say. They can ask you questions at this point, or refer to the original conversation in *Mastering Arabic 2*.

### Step 4

- ✓ Each pair practises the role-play.
- Move around the pairs listening and making suggestions if necessary.
- ✓ Ask the students to switch roles when they have completed the conversation.

## Step 5

- ✓ Choose a couple of pairs to perform the two different role-plays in front of the class.
- Encourage the students to put some feeling into their role and to add additional expressions if they like.

## Step 6

✓ Students write out one of the conversations in class or for homework.

You can adapt this role-play to many other situations and conversations in the *Mastering Arabic* courses. You may like to make role-plays a regular part of your speaking practice.

<ul> <li>The dish of the day is fish with stuffed tomatoes.</li> </ul>	<ul><li>Ask about the dish of the day.</li><li></li></ul>
	Say your children prefer chicken.
<ul> <li>Say you have roast chicken with fries.</li> <li></li> </ul>	<ul> <li>You'll have one fish, two chicken and a bottle of cola.</li> </ul>
