Module R6 Quiz Answer Key

Question 1:
A Bystander is a person who is observing something happening but is not directly involved.
An “Upstander” is a bystander that chooses to get involved when they observe injustice.
Question 2:
An intervention interrupts something that is happening in order to help or change what is happening.
Distract, Delay, Document, Delegate, Direct
Question 3:
Interrupt the harm by doing something silly or getting attention focused elsewhere, or get a teacher or other adult involved.

Question 4:
Only use direct if it is safe for you to do so. Delay means you are watching to be sure it doesn’t escalate and then checking in with either person—or both—later.

Accept all relevant student thoughts.
