

# **Bracketed Lines in Medea**

## 234

Some editors bracket line 234, but it stands pretty well as a summary of why getting married is such a bad deal for women.

#### 246

This line has been bracketed by most editors. Wilamowitz called it a 'schoolmaster's interpolation'. The objections to the line are (a) metrical (the alpha of  $\eta\lambda\iota\kappa\alpha$  should be long but, for various reasons, it must be short); (b) what Page in his commentary calls 'the removal of the indelicacy' of line 245 (where men console themselves with other *women*).

## 262

Most editors bracket this line as they think it gives too much away of her plans in too much detail and may not be quite grammatical.

## 304

Most editors have bracketed 304, suspecting it to be an interpolation, because of its similarity to line 808.

#### 355-6

Diggle brackets these lines on the basis that the reasoning is absurd and that 354 is a good ending to Creon's speech.

#### 725-6

As well as the discussions surrounding the order of lines here, most editors bracket lines 725–6.
