## Medea

At *Massolit* there are two courses on *Medea*. The first is by Professor Judith Mossman, now at the University of Nottingham. There are six films, roughly ten minutes each (<u>https://www.massolit.io/courses/163</u>). The second course is by Dr Lucy Jackson, which is also a six-film course (<u>https://www.massolit.io/courses/77</u>).

The *Archive of Performances of Greek and Roman Drama* has already been mentioned (<u>www.apgrd.ox.ac.uk</u>). There is much information here about earlier performances of the play.
