We write to urge you to consider universal family planning reform as the **most fundamental** and long-run effective solution to the climate crisis. Previous conferences have focused on industrial emissions. It's time that we start at the source, and avoid the mistakes in past family planning modeling that created the ecological and social crises of today.


Having Kids is human rights organization dedicated to replacing patriarchal and parent-centric family planning models with the human rights-based, child-centric and socially and ecologically regenerative <u>Fair Start family planning model</u> to ensure every child a fair start in life.

It's simple: Fair Start family planning means smaller families sharing resources to invest more in every child. The model is described in detail in a recent peer-reviewed article in the journal *Social Change*.

Fair Start family planning is the best construction of the fundamental, but complex, human right to have children. It is designed to replace shortsigted, outdated and isolationist family planning models that have ignored child welfare, equity, and our world's ecology — and helped create the climate crisis and threaten to exacerbate it in ways that will harm millions. We simply cannot use the same pre-climate change crisis modeling, which we doesn't account for the needs of future children.

The Facts

As 11,000 climate scientists recently noted, promoting smaller families is crucial to the sustainability of the planet. Families choosing to have one child fewer can have twenty times the impact of alternative approaches, and world population in the decades to come will vary by billions depending on whether the average person reduces their family size.



But Fair Start family goes beyond mitigating climate change. We need a family planning model that <u>invests more in each child in order to make them more resilient</u> in the face of a degraded world ecology, and more equal — and thus capable of navigating that world without <u>the massive inequality that will create civil strife.</u> We need family planning policies designed to give every child born a fair start in life.

This is not just about population growth. This is qualitative. This is about accounting for the welfare and development of every child that enters this world, and ensuring them levels of welfare and opportunity **comparable to what the children of people attending this conference enjoy.**

And it's not just about one other policy lever we might choose from. <u>Family planning is the first</u>, <u>human right</u>. It's the right that puts the *humans* in human rights, and most determines human agency and our shared future. It must be prioritized, and ensuring the resources necessary to give every child a fair start in life must be seen as preceding, <u>and therefore overriding</u>, competing property claims.

Specific Avenues for Reform

There are many avenues through which we can make advancements in family planning to improve lives and the future of our planet. Here are just a few.

- Tax policies that encourage large families can be reformed to encourage delaying parenthood, planning smaller families, and a transfer of resources to ensure every child gets a fair start in life. <u>This would include guaranteed minimum incomes for all children, pegged to better family planning policies.</u>
- Ending the patriarchal and unsustainable culture of pushing women to have children as
 a means of creating consumers, as well as future labor and taxpayers to grow state
 economies. A human rights approach to family planning means never treating children
 as economic inputs. This reform would include UN agencies.
- Fully funding the development and availability of new male long-acting contraceptives.
- Bringing global attention to the need for child-centered policies <u>with informal statements</u> from United Nations representatives addressing the key issues raised above.
- Using expressive and non-coercive approaches to prioritize child welfare and to
 accelerate a change in family planning culture, using current crises to show the urgent
 need for reform.
- Urging public figures to speak out, given the massive impact that role modeling better and more sustainable family planning can have, <u>as Meghan Markle and Prince Harry</u> <u>recently did</u>.

If it takes a village to raise a child, it takes a village to plan for a child. Please consider promoting a universal ethic of cooperative Fair Start family planning, and smaller and more equitable families, as the most effective and comprehensive way to achieve a socially and ecologically regenerative society, and address the climate crisis.
