Stronger targets = better health

A <u>new report</u> from the <u>Health and Environment</u> <u>Alliance (HEAL) and Health</u> <u>Care Without Harm Europe</u> (<u>HCWH E</u>) demonstrates the very substantial health and economic benefits of strong targets for reductions in greenhouse gas emissions. CAHA goes to Canberra

The Climate and Health Alliance will join the Australian Conservation Foundation in an advocacy day meeting with MPs and Senators in the federal parliament in November. The Advocacy Day will include representatives from the Southern Cross Climate Coalition, The Climate Project, the Australian Youth Climate Coalition, Union Climate Connectors, the Australian Solar Energy Society and the Climate and Health Alliance.

The Climate and Health Alliance delegates will provide advice on the health risks from climate change and environmental degradation, and will seek recognition of climate change as a priority public health issue.

The delegation will also emphasise the need for a price on pollution and urge the government to legislate a strong package of climate measures within this term of parliament.

Purchasing low carbon health care

A <u>new study</u> published in the *Quarterly Journal of Medicine* demonstrates the procurement of goods and services in renal care accounts for as much as 72% of the emissions for kidney care.

Pharmaceuticals, medical equipment and waste accounted for the bulk of emissions in the analysis of an individual renal unit's carbon footprint.

Cutting costs and waste with reuse

A <u>new study</u> led by anaesthetist and CAHA member Forbes McGain from the Western Hospital in Melbourne has demonstrated single use anaesthetic trays cost twice as much as reusable trays, produce 5% more CO2 and use three times as much water.
