In the spirit of de La Salle, may we


see everything with the eyes of faith, see the person of Christ in the students, and approach our ministry with great zeal for the evangelization of youth.



#### **Future in Motion**


The **CBU Robotics Club** is a new club on campus that launched in September under the guidance of Engineering Technology Professor Dr. Peter (Phuc) Bui.
