RECEPTION OF HOLY COMMUNION FOR CATHOLICS

As Catholics, we fully participate in the celebration of the Eucharist when we receive Holy Communion. We are encouraged to receive Communion devoutly and frequently. In order to be properly disposed to receive Communion, participants should not be conscious of grave sin and normally should have fasted for one hour. A frequent reception of the Sacrament of Penance is encouraged for all.

FOR OUR FELLOW CHRISTIANS

We welcome our fellow Christians to this celebration of the Eucharist as our brothers and sisters. We pray that our common baptism and the action of the Holy Spirit in this Eucharist will draw us closer to one another and begin to dispel sad divisions which separate us. We pray that these will lessen and finally disappear, in keeping with Christ's prayer for us "that they may all be one." (Jn 17:21)

Because Catholics believe that the celebration of the Eucharist is a sign of the reality of the oneness of faith, life, and worship, members of those churches with whom we are not fully united are ordinarily not admitted to Holy Communion. Eucharistic sharing in exceptional circumstances by other Christians requires permission according to the directives of the diocesan bishop and the provision of canon law. Members of the Orthodox Churches, the Assyrian Church of the East, and the Polish National Catholic Church are urged to respect the discipline of their own Churches. According to Roman Catholic discipline, the Code of Canon Law does not object to the reception of communion by Christians of these Churches.

FOR THOSE NOT RECEIVING HOLY COMMUNION

All who are not receiving Holy communion are encouraged to express in their hearts a prayerful desire for unity with the Lord and with one another. *They are <u>encouraged to come forward</u> with those receiving, <u>cross their arms over their chest</u> <i>and, while not receiving Holy Communion, <u>will receive a blessing.</u>*

FOR NON-CHRISTIANS

We also welcome to this celebration those who do not share our faith in Jesus Christ. While we cannot admit them to Holy Communion, we ask them to offer their prayers for the peace and unity of the human family.

BROTHER IDONIUS TERENCE MCLAUGHLIN John Patrick McLaughlin December 14, 1922 - May 25, 2025

Named after his father, John Patrick McLaughlin was born on December 14, 1922, in Duluth, Minnesota, the son of John James McLaughlin and Mary Ellen (Moran) McLaughlin. His father had been born in 1884 in Glasgow, Scotland and was a stonemason, and his mother was born in Ireland in 1888 and was a housewife. John James, his father, died on April 28, 1968, and is buried in Wayne, New Jersey. Mary Ellen died at the early age of fifty on March 15, 1938, and is buried in Calvary Cemetery in Duluth, Minnesota. John Patrick said he attended "various grade schools" before entering Cathedral High School in Duluth and was "so impressed with the dedication and commitment of the Brothers that he wished to become a member." He entered the congregation in 1938 through the Juniorate and Novitiate programs in Glencoe, Missouri (now Wildwood). After arriving in the Juniorate on January 29, 1938, he quickly settled into the routine of the program. Two months later on March 15, he received the news that his mother had died. Young John Patrick went home for her funeral, but after her funeral he left home and his father and two sisters, Marianne and Helen, and returned to the Juniorate in Glencoe.

After a year and a half, he was admitted to the Novitiate on August 30, 1940, where he received the religious habit of a Brother and the religious name of Brother Idonius Terence. In the following August he professed his first vows, and a day later he was on his way to St. Mary's College in Winona, Minnesota, to begin his Scholasticate studies (college studies). Three years later Brother I. Terence received his B.S.S. Degree and was assigned to St. Patrick High School in Chicago, Illinois. Five years later in 1949 his superiors assigned the young talented Brother I. Terence to Christian Brothers High School in Memphis, Tennessee, as the school was experiencing a new beginning on East Parkway. He was there for only two years when he was appointed Assistant Principal of CBHS in Memphis in 1951. It was that same year that he completed his graduate work in administrative studies and received his M.A. Degree from De Paul University in Chicago. Two years later in 1953 Brother Terence was assigned as a teacher to De La Salle High School in Minneapolis and remained there for two years before being assigned to Central Catholic High School in Vincennes, Indiana. After teaching there for five years he was appointed Principal of Central Catholic in 1959. He served there for three more years before returning to Memphis for the second time. This time, 1962-1964, he was named President of Christian Brothers College (now University) and was an initial planner for the new CBHS to be built on Walnut Grove Road. It was during this time also that he made the courageous decision to admit Jesse Turner, the first black student, to CBHS and thus making the high school the first school to integrate in Memphis. To this day he is considered the "father and hero of integration in Memphis and the Mid-South." Even when the Bishop of Nashville, other clergy, city officials, and parents objected, Brother Terence stood his ground. Jessie came to CBHS

and like his mentor, stood his ground and graduated, and he and Brother Terence remained friends all of Terence's life. He returned to Illinois in 1964 to teach for a year at St. Francis High School in Wheaton, but a year later was named Principal of the St. Paul Dual Enrollment School in Chicago. After great success in this program at St. Paul School, he moved across town in 1968 to become Superintendent of St. Patrick High School in Chicago. After four years of success at St. Pat's he accepted an assignment as an exchange teacher at St. Joseph College in London, England. He loved his time there but returned to the United States to attend the renewal program for Brothers at the Sangre de Cristo Retreat Center in Santa Fe, New Mexico, for a semester before being appointed Principal of Montini High School in Lombard, Illinois. Brother Terence spent six successful years at Montini before accepting the Directorship of the Nonpublic School Administration Program at the University of St. Thomas in St. Paul, Minnesota. The program was legendary for preparing administrators and potential administrators for a lifelong career in private schools.



BROTHER TERENCE AND JESSE TURNER

The Chicago Province leadership team of Christian Brothers appointed Brother Terence to the post of Director of Education for the Chicago Province and, along with that job, he continued as an Adjunct Professor at St. Thomas University until 1990. It was then that he accepted the assignment of President of Driscoll High School in Addison, Illinois. Three years later he was appointed as Director of Adopt-A-Student Scholarship Program, where he remained for six years, a program of which he was most proud.

After fifty-five years of teaching and administrative duties Brother Terence unselfishly became a Volunteer at the San Miguel Middle School in Chicago. After a year at San Miguel, he decided to retire and to return to Memphis and Christian Brothers University for the third and last time, spending the last twenty-five years as a Christian Brother and as the Dean (the most senior Brother) of the Midwest District.

Always the student, Brother Terence studied at four different Universities: St. Mary's University in

Winona in 1941-43 and again in 1961; De Paul University in Chicago in 1945 and again 1969-1971; St. Louis University in Missouri in 1951, 1956, and again 1966; and the National College of Education in 1976. In 1993 he was awarded honorary Doctor of Humanities Degree, *honoris cause* from Lewis University in Romeoville, Illinois, and in 2013 he received an honorary Doctor of Humanities, *honoris causa* from his *alma mater*, St. Mary's University of Minnesota. He served on the Board of Trustees of Christian Brothers University 1970-1971, Lewis University Board 1970, 1973 and 1993. He also served on six high school boards from 1980 to 1995. Early in his career he was a panelist at the 1965 NCEA meeting and a speaker at the 1967 ASCD meeting. He was the Director of a Workshop for School Administrators in 1977, Keynote Speaker at the Christian Brothers Regional Workshop in 1980, and Executive Secretary for the Minnesota Association of Private School Administrators from 1980 to 1985. Brother Terence was a Presenter at the NCEA Meeting in 1982 and 1986 and was Chairperson for the Christian Brothers Educational Conference from 1982 to 1984. He also was a Workshop Presenter for Educational Meetings in California, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, North Dakota, Pennsylvania, Texas, and Wisconsin from 1983 to 1993.

A prolific writer and researcher Brother contributed three articles in the La Salle Catechist: in 1954, "The Value of High School Athletics"; in 1958, "Creating Interest in U.S. History Classes"; and in 1963, "Hinterland High School." Publications for Teachers and Administrators by Brother Terence from 1974 to 1980 include "View from the Control Tower" (a principal's view of the school), "The Teacher at Montini" (describing the effective teacher), "The Christian Brother School" (checking the mission statement), "Square-One Interviewing" (guide to faculty selection), and "The Christian Dimension of the Catholic High School." In Today's Catholic Teacher Brother Terence published ten articles from 1982 to 1986, numerous articles in Newsletter for Teachers (Quarterly) from 1986 to 1990, and over twenty papers for teachers from 1986-1990. In 1985 he wrote Catholic School Finance & Church-Relations, Booklet #5 in the NCEA Keynote Series (80 pages), and in 1994 he wrote the Life of Brother Joel Damian Wilhelm (70 pages). His Folk Literature Series includes "FSC History" 1999 and 2000, "When Sparks Fly," and "Chicago Fire Impacts Lasallian Education," 2000. From 1985 to 2015 Brother Terence authored or coauthored thirteen publications: Catholic School Finance and Church-State Relations (1985); Brother Joel Damian FSC 1918-1991 (1994); Folk Literature Series – Brothers of the Midwest (1999 & 2002); Our Enduring Milestones (co-author) (2003); The Schools That Faith Built (2006); CBC Leaves East Parkway South (2006); The Huether Workshops (2006); The Passing of the Baton (2008); Blessed to Teach (2010); Silent Acceptance (2012); Lasallian Volunteers (2013); Press On! (2014), the life story of Brother Terence's beloved friend James C. McWillie, AFSC; and *Listen – CBU Is Speaking* (2015).

Brother Terence's honors and recognitions are many. He received the Distinguished Service Award from the University of St. Thomas in 1985, as well as two Honorary Doctorate Degrees. He received the Religious Service Award from St. Mary's University in 1994; the Distinguished Graduate Award from St. Michael School in Duluth, Minnesota, in 2000; and the Hero Award from the Chicago Juvenile Protective Association in 2000. He received the Honored Guest Award at the CBU Memphis Reunion in 2000 and Leadership Award at the 2022 CBU Gala. On February 25, 2016, Brother Terence received the Trailblazers of Memphis Award given by CBU's Black Student Association and the NAACP *"to help*"

celebrate and honor those who have fought to blaze trails in Memphis." In 2022 Brother Patrick Conway FC created and founded the Brother Terence McLaughlin, FSC Social Justice Institute of Lasallian Practice, naming it in honor of Brother Terence *"who taught in and led Christian Brother high schools and Christian Brothers University for more than 55 years before retiring to Memphis. In 1963, he made history by integrating Christian Brothers High School before any other all-white high school – public or private in Memphis.*" He received the highest award from Ave Maria Home and has been cherished as a friend and confident to ten Christian Brothers University presidents: Brother Theodore Drahmann, FSC; Brother Bernard LoCoco, FSC; Brother Vincent Malham, FSC; Mr. Lance Forsdick, a former student of Brother Terence; and Brother Michael McGinniss, FSC; Brother Stanislaus Sobczyk, FSC; Dr. John Smarrelli; Mr. Jack Shannon; Mr. David Archer; and Brother Christopher Englert, FSC.

His teaching and service as an administrator lasted for fifty-four years and, when he died at 102 years of age, he had been a De la Salle Christian Brother for eighty-four years.

We, his Brothers, pray for God's blessing on our living benefactors and affiliated members, and for eternal rest upon our beloved Brothers, affiliated members, friends, students, family, and benefactors who have died. May perpetual light shine upon them, may their souls and the souls of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. Amen.

He does not claim to be courageous, yet lives by the strength within, confronting fear, uncertainty, and intimidation. He does not see himself as humble yet deflects every question about him with a story about the inspirational deeds of others. He does not admit to being a visionary yet continues to see things as they should be and works to make them a reality. He is a man for all seasons, and a Christian Brother for life.

I first met Brother Terence McLaughlin when I was a graduate student in his finance class. He couldn't inspire me to be excited about reading financial statements or constructing budgets, but he did convince me of the importance of running a school like a business, a novel idea 30-plus years ago. And he was right. This year he celebrates 75 years as a Christian Brother, teaching others inside the classroom and out.

Commitment is an elusive concept in a rapidly changing world. Yet his commitment to a purpose-driven life is what led him from his first days in school, on a one-room schoolhouse in Minnesota, to positions as teacher, principal, superintendent and college president throughout the mid-west, London and Memphis, inspiring thousands of students along the way. Perhaps his finest moment, and the public witness of living out his commitment to his vocation as a Christian Brother, came in Memphis on August 26, 1963.

When Brother Terence was president of Christian Brothers College (now University), there was a high school on the same campus (now CBHS) that also was under his leadership. On that day in August, two days before Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. delivered his "I Have a Dream" speech in Washington, D.C., Brother Terence admitted Jesse Turner, Jr., an African American, to the high school. With that act, Christian Brothers College High School became the first desegregated school in Memphis.

It was a peaceful desegregation and without fanfare; however, it was not without risks and suffering for Brother Terence at the hands of those who opposed his decision. He took his usual stance of doing his job based on the school's mission and his mission in life. He has always been lifting the poor and marginalized of society. Of course, Brother credits Allegra Turner, Jesse's mother, and her courage and determination for the peaceful desegregation of the school, and Jesse for being the real hero.

Brother was transferred to Chicago the following year. He returned to his beloved Memphis in 2000 to continue his retirement in residence on the campus of CBU. He has authored mime books, including one, "Silence Acceptance," which chronicles the events of 1963. As a former history teacher, je gives modern meaning o past events. He still hears from many of his former students, me included. Once you have experienced the inspiration of greatness you continue to seek it.

"Seventy-five years is a long time," he said, "to continue to find joy in what you do."

INTRODUCING » THE MCLAUGHLIN SOCIAL JUSTICE INSTITUTE

This summer, the **McLaughlin Social Justice Institute of Lasallian Practice** at CBU held its first annual sessions for college and high school students from across the United States, offering them an exciting, life-changing opportunity to immerse themselves in learning about some of the most critical issues of our day—such as

generational poverty and homelessness, food scarcity, challenges faced by immigrants, and inequity in education and healthcare. These intensive two-week programs blended classroom instruction, visits from leading experts in law and medicine, and trips throughout the Memphis community, all designed to teach students how their own social identities impact their engagement with others.

The Institute is named in honor of **Brother Terence McLaughlin**, the former president of CBU (1962-64) who also served as a teacher, athletic director, coach, and administrator in other Lasallian schools in the U.S. and England for more than 55 years before returning to Memphis for his retirement in 2000. During his tenure as president of Christian Brothers College in 1963, Brother Terence made history by accepting the application of Jesse Turner Jr. to the high school division (now CBHS) and making it the first racially integrated high school in the city. As Brother Terence approaches his 100th birthday in December, we celebrate his lifelong dedication to quality education for all, his tireless advocacy for social justice and inclusion, and his call to see the world through eyes of faith.

Proclamation

WHEREAS it is befitting that we pause in our standard proceedings to honor those luminary personalities whose overall commitment t the greater good strengthens our local community and its underlying moral fiber, and

WHEREAS a lifelong champion of education in the Lasallian tradition of faith, community, and service, BROTHER TERENCE MCLAUGHLIN

is a native son of Duluth, Minnesota. He attended Cathedral High School which was staffed and administered by the Christian Brothers. He was so impressed with the dedication and commitment of the Brothers that he wished to become a member of the Institute of the Brothers of the Christian himself; and

WHEREAS Brother Terence entered the Roman Catholic congregation in1941 and professed his final vows six years later, in 1947. He came to Memphis in 1949 as a teacher and administrator and was then transferred to Vincennes, Indiana as a teacher, principal and director of the Brothers Community; and

WHEREAS, upon completing his mandate, Brother Terence was reassigned to Memphis and served as Director and President of both Christian Brothers High School and Christian Brothers College from 1962 to 1964; and

WHEREAS, following many years of leadership in schools in the Legacy District of Chicago and Minneapolis/St. Paul, Brother Terence returned to Christian Brothers University in 2000 to serve as a consultant and Assistant to the President; and

WHEREAS Brother Terence McLaughlin is a well-respected and treasured member of our community. His commitment to work, service and giving, his joy of living, and his constant desire to know and do better is an example that we should all follow.
