CLEVELAND PUBLIC LIBRARY: OUR FUTURE IS BUILDING

The Library announces closures and community meetings about upcoming construction projects

FEBRUARY 16, 2020 (CLEVELAND, OH) – Cleveland Public Library's promise to the community is coming to fruition. This year, we will renovate or rebuild our branches to improve the Library user experience in each neighborhood.

Construction will begin this Spring. To prepare for the building projects, <u>West Park</u>, <u>Woodland</u>, and <u>Jefferson</u> branches will not reopen for browsing on February 22 with the rest of the Library system. Curbside and walk-up services will be available until 6 p.m. on Friday, April 2. At that time, West Park, Woodland, and Jefferson will close for construction. Patrons are encouraged to visit another <u>Cleveland Public Library</u> location or utilize our books by mail service, <u>Words on Wheels</u>.

"The Facilities Master Plan has been years in the making. Cleveland Public Library is excited to see these much-anticipated projects take shape," remarks John Lang, Chief Operating Officer at Cleveland Public Library.

As part of the process to reimagine our neighborhood branches, **Cleveland Public Library is hosting a series of community meetings to learn what people want to see in their future branches and how they plan to use the facilities.** The virtual meetings will focus on the design and construction of the following branches: Brooklyn, Eastman, Lorain, Rockport, and Sterling. **All community sessions will be held online. The first meeting is for the <u>Eastman Branch</u> project on Thursday, February 18 at 6 p.m. Attendees are encouraged to <u>register</u>.**

"Cleveland Public Library wants everyone to be a part of the design process. It's important to us that each branch reflects the needs of the neighborhoods it serves," Lang adds.

In 2017, Cleveland residents passed a tax levy set to renew and increase support for <u>Cleveland Public Library</u>, setting into motion a project to dramatically transform our city's libraries. Over the next decade, Cleveland Public Library will renovate, expand, relocate, or rebuild all 27 neighborhood libraries. The project, known as the Facilities Master Plan, honors and preserves our past while preparing us to better handle the future needs of our community. Our goal is to improve neighborhood engagement and create spaces that enable our strategic priorities.
