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



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
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COVER PHOTO

Track Announcer

Grid Marshals—5-7 positions including a pit out marshal and race car splitter; responsible for helping direct cars to the false grid and their grid spot for all practices and races. 8am to 5pm (with breaks when we have enough volunteers).

Runners – 4-6 positions; distributing race results from the timing tower to racers and the Grid

Enduro Pit Lane Observers—5-7 positions; responsible for confirming general rules for the enduro race are observed (fueling, driver changes, mechanical, etc.) during Sunday October 23 morning enduro race(s). Brief training will be provided by PCA National, and no one is expected to be an "expert"; truly observers reporting any obvious infractions.

Driver Celebration Ambassadors—3 positions; this position is designed to assist me getting attendees to the celebration area (the pagoda at turn 2) and assisting with the celebration itself (e.g., supporting food service staff, entertainment, and awards)

Pit Crew Challenge Assistants—2 positions; responsible for assisting with coordinating the Pit Crew Challenge which takes place Saturday October 22 at the go-kart track when the track goes cold (about 5pm) and before the Driver Celebration (which starts at 6pm). Fun event that has pit crew members (no race drivers) for teams race one another in heats for pit crew glory.

I ask that you look through the pages here and find AT LEAST ONE event to attend. We have the BEST roads around...the BEST people around...the BEST FAMILY around.



So this article is about color, sort of. This month, I stumbled upon the site <u>Renbow</u>. I think this is a PCA site. I truly had no idea they did this, but it was a great resource for me. You see, I was in search of a good source of color samples of Porsche paints to use as a color pallet for Tobacco Roads. Boy did I find one. I am happy to say, I used the eyedropper tool sample every color! I now have an extensive Color Swatch from which I can draw colors from. Here are some observations.

The pallet starts with the blues and progresses through the beige and browns transitioning though the warm colors into the greens and yellows ending in the whites. One of the main tasks as the editor is I have to do a layout and come up with some sort of design look and feel. So I have to arrange things and use color to convey information. While doing this, I am trying to learn about color theory. Luckily I found this <u>article</u> to lean how to best use the newly created TR pallet. What I am discovering is that background and text color can be challenging to get a good look. It is easily overdone and I quickly lose the contrast I so need to accomplish my task. I discovered the 60-30-10 rule in this article, and will try to follow it. You have a ratio of your primary color at 60%, your secondary color at 30% and your accent color at 10%. This is kind of like painting your house. The last rule in this article that basic color schemes are the best is one I may not easily learn. I hope to experiment with different combinations of schemes, and I just have to figure out what will work the best.

So obviously I am going to have to figure out how to use this pallet to mix and present the information to you. Luckily there are an unbelievable degrees of subtleties within the TR pallet. Seems like Porsche has many dark colors, but only a few are actually close to black. Rather they use a color property of brightness. Subsequently many of the warm colors (browns, blues, reds, greens) make up the black car pal-


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let. These will be text colors in TR. The white pallet has many of the cool colors. I don't know if I can do it, but I hope to see if I can load the color values into a database and see if I can demonstrate any clusters. If I am successful, hopefully I can write a bit about it later. One of the other things that is challenging relates to color reproduction. Since we are going to be working on electronic devices, I am working in the Red, Green, Blue space as these are the primary colors that make up all other colors. The nuisance comes from adjusting the Hue (the color), Saturation (the amount of color) and Brightness (the degree of white or black).


I know what does all of this have to do with a Porsche club? Well I am going to have a small box in each issue where I will post the color swatch used in the issue and the names of the Porsche paints. I hope you enjoy seeing the different colors and the contrast that can be produced. One of the more interesting things I learned while doing my research into Porsche colors is I discovered Porsche partnered with a <u>paint company</u>, and offers their colors as wall paints. Honestly that is a bit too OCD even for me, but they do have some cool colors.

My web surfing so you don't have to also discovered the DuPont Registry's list of the <u>most iconic Porsche colors</u>. They are at the begining of the article. I put this on an interior Cashmere II background. If you have ever seen that color. (chef's kiss) it's wonderful.

Anyway, as you can see here, I will use the whites as the paper color. There are plenty of main, secondary and accent colors to choose from. I will use these as background colors in the frames as our layout program calls it. One thing I picked up from our previous editor Julie is she made a color code for each regain. So, in the area reports you will see the banners, and the TR shield will have the color of that area. I will also offer the area the ability to claim the paint color for their region on a first come first serve basis. If there are region specific events, I will try to highlight them with the area color. So it's a week later, and I am fly fishing in Montana. I was able to load the database and graph the colors in RGB space. It was hard, but you can see some areas. That central line is the brightness influence. So blacks are towards the back bottom of the graph where the axis meet, 0,0,0. The whites are up at the top of the graph, 255,255,255.




You can see there is a big cluster of higher values. These are the whites and silvers. I also showed how the warm colors move from reds to yellows. You can see that Guards Red, Orange Red, Signal Orange and Speed Yellow are some of the more pure or primary colors. Without flipping the graph around, it is hard to show how micro clusters look, but I can zoom in to show you some groupings. The graphs below are of the blue family. You can see there are some



small clusters emerge where subtle changes are used. In the second graph, I wanted to see what the difference between Gulf Blue and






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Making Tracks to Octoberfest!

I sometimes feel we are the luckiest people alive. We get to own one of the premier cars in the entire world! - a Porcshe! I know when my husband and I decided to get a 'fun' car, rather than a practical one, and he said he wanted a Porcshe, I was ecstatic. On our anniversary when we went by the dealership to have a look at her, I couldn't believe it. Even better was the day he brought her home. I certainly never thought he'd let me drive her... but he did! I remember taking her out to visit my friends and showing her off - one of my friends mentioned as we sped through town, "What good is having a sports car if you don't drive it fast?"

We muddled over that one. We don't like getting tickets. We don't like having to share the curvy mountain roads with bicycles who take up the entire lane. We don't like getting surprised at other corners when a motorcycle comes zooming towards us in our lane! The unexpected pedestrian, or driveway as we venture out on the fun wooded lanes isn't fun either. What were we to do?

A month or so into our new ownership, he asked me if I would mind if he participated in an autocross explaining that it was basically doing a challenging turning course through a parking lot. That seemed harmless enough, so he tried it. He enjoyed it, but it involved a lot of waiting around for a few moments of excitement... So, a month later when he brought up the idea of 'tracking' our beautiful new-to-us Boxster I said "Yes". I was worried about his safety, and the car being damaged, but also knew he would have fun, and I had to support that idea.

It was so much more than I had anticipated. It looked a bit crazy when I arrived one day into the event, but he assured me that it was all good. He had me attend the class that he was asked to go to, being a 'new' Drivers Education (DE) student. The class had some good points, and I even learned a few things. Later, I was able to go out on a track ride with his instructor and decided that this was definitely some fun stuff!

For those of you who have not tried it, or think that it isn't for you, you may want to re-think that thought. The Carolinas Region Porsche Club of America (or any of the PCA regions we have 'tracked' in so far) really care about YOU and YOUR CAR. Occasionally there are things that go wrong, but it is extremely rare that it is car on car - as the rules they set prevent that from happening. Other track incidents are also uncommon, as they put precautions in place to ensure the cars and the people are protected. I have found that I am actually at less risk on the track than driving around my neighborhood - even when I obey the posted speed limit.

The first day at the track or "Driver's Experience/Driv-



er's Education" (DE) is an awesome opportunity to spread your car's wings and fly – while still being in a secure environment with no fear of getting tickets or running over bicycles or pedestrians. After getting your car inspected (to make sure that we are all putting sound vehicles on the track) the first thing that happens is you drive at street speeds around the track with your assigned instructor – you really didn't think they would put you directly on the track without some instruction, did you? The instructor points out how to make best use of the track and how to navigate it carefully – and quickly! Shortly after that you go to 'class' – really a 45–60-minute crash course in:

- Flags, which are how they communicate with cars on the track.
- Definition of an apex (the best place to put your car in a turn to get speed and a good exit) and how to best handle the corners on the track you are at.
- How to brake on the track versus braking on the street.
- How to communicate with other drivers that it is a good time to pass. (You are not allowed to pass a car unless the driver ahead of you acknowledges you and knows you are passing ~ both the passer and passee know what is happening and agree.)

And a bunch of other techniques and physics principles that will gradually sink in over time.

Now the fun really starts. You and your assigned instructor get into YOUR CAR, that wonderful Porsche that really WANTS to go fast, unhampered by the rules and laws put in place outside the track to keep



society (and the slow cars) safe. The engine revs, and you pull onto the grid to wait for the thumbs up from the grid manager and you're off! The only limit is your skill and expertise – and of course, the advice of your instructor/coach who knows the best way to get the most out of the event.

With your helmet on and windows open you turn into the first curve of the track, with your tires biting into the pavement as you accelerate out – putting the 'pedal to the metal' and really seeing what she can do. The landscape flies by and you learn what braking is all about – as you come to a 90 degree turn at a higher speed than you had previously imagined. And YOU-DO-IT! Successfully navigating that turn and subsequent straight-aways – with your very own personal coach helping to guide you through.

All too soon, you see the corner worker wave the checkered flag – and your first session is over. You won! – along with everyone else in your run group. You had the experience of a lifetime! Most people can only dream of taking a car on a real-live racetrack, and you have now accomplished it! Not only completed it but executed it in style - your Porsche is MADE for running on the track, pushing the limits (and staying in first place).

Did I mention – it isn't just a one-time event? You will be able to return to the track several times over the course of the day or weekend. Each time you will learn new things and become more confident in your abilities. Eventually, after a few weekends as you gain awareness and skill, you will be able to shed the instructor/coach and fly 'solo' ~ as you are now ready.

The ability to do all of this is within your grasp. The only requirements for a DE event are that you have a valid driver's license, a vehicle that passes the inspection (which is done pre-track-day, where a competent mechanic signs off on the car so you know before you get there that you are good to go), and a helmet that can easily be ordered online. What are you waiting for? The fun and fellowship that are available to all at the DE events are fantastic and well worth the price of admission – even without the track time. You will make new friends, and learn new skills, and feel new highs – all of which you miss by not participating.

The next DE event hosted by the Carolina's Region is this November $15^{th}-17^{th}$ at VIR – Virginia International Raceway, a country club of a racetrack if there ever



was one. They have a fun Octoberfest planned: good food, great beer, and gregarious people! We hope that you can join us! Sign up is on <u>ClubRegis-</u><u>tration.net</u>.

LIPS (Ladies in Porsches): The ladies did not meet in September due to a conflict of their regular meeting time with the Labor Day Holiday.




The gang at Linville Falls Winery

The Seven Lakes Veterans group also had an event that attracted 70 cars and several hundred spectators to Seven Lakes golf club.



Hi Jeff,

I "enjoyed" seeing the latest Tobacco Roads and thought I would give you an update on my tire debacle - we will miss next week's meeting since we will be on the beach.

We made it home ok on the donut after pumping it up to 60 psi at the nearby Spinx. The next morning when going in the garage, the donut was completely flat. So now it was time to do a postmortem on both the regular tire and the spare. When blowing up the regular tire, it became very evident there was a large cut in the tread where air was escaping (I would guess I ran over a piece of metal of some sort). Therefore, no matter whether the wheel was bent (which wasn't obvious to me) or not, I would need new rear tires. If when mounting the new tires they noted a bend, I would then pursue getting the wheel fixed. As for the spare, air was escaping from the valve stem (actually at a rate that it was a miracle we made it home).

I got the new tires installed the next day - they didn't detect any issue with the wheel - yay! I asked them if they could check the spare -Discount Tire has a policy not to touch tires older than 10 years old - boo!. Option 1 for the fix of the spare was to get a new tire (it is 22 years old). 


