Eschenbach Leads Bruckner 3

A Voyage Through Symphonic Expression.


Curtis Symphony Orchestra launches its 2025–26 series with a dynamic program tracing the evolution of orchestral music. The afternoon opens with *The School for Scandal*, Curtis alumnus Samuel Barber's witty and fast-paced overture inspired by Richard Brinsley Sheridan's 18th-century comedy. Grammy-winning conductor Christoph Eschenbach leads Krzysztof Penderecki's Concerto Grosso for Three Cellos, featuring Curtis alumni and faculty Nicholas Canellakis, Yumi Kendall, and Christine Jeonghyoun Lee—a striking work that blends lyrical beauty with bold dissonance and rhythmic intensity. The program culminates in Bruckner's monumental Symphony No. 3, a sweeping and heroic masterpiece that unfolds in waves of majestic brass chorales, soaring themes, and a staggering sense of scale.

Epic Sounds. Boundless Orchestral Brilliance.

Embark on a musical odyssey with renowned Finnish conductor Osmo Vänskä. The afternoon begins with Missy Mazzoli's Sinfonia (for Orbiting Spheres)—a swirling, celestial work inspired by planetary motion and the roiling drone of the medieval stringed instrument, the hurdy-gurdy. Henry Dorn's powerful *Transitions* follows—a deeply personal tone poem reflecting on loss, transformation, and resilience. The program features the world premiere of a new concerto for woodwinds and orchestra by David Serkin Ludwig, performed by Grammy-winning quintet and Curtis faculty Imani Winds. The concert concludes with Béla Bartók's Concerto for Orchestra, a virtuosic showcase that transforms each section of the ensemble into dazzling soloists. Charting a bold musical journey across five movements—this masterwork blends folk-inspired melodies, modernist harmonies, and brilliant orchestration—making it one of the most beloved orchestral pieces of the 20th century.

Yannick Leads Mahler & Dawson

Echoes of Legacy in Symphony and Song.

Join Curtis Symphony Orchestra and Grammy-winning conductor Yannick Nézet-Séguin for an evening of powerful musical storytelling. The program opens with Richard Wagner's *Rienzi* Overture—a dramatic and rousing early work that reveals Wagner's emerging theatrical voice—led by conducting fellow Yoann Combémorel. Next, rising stars of the Curtis Opera Theatre bring Gustav Mahler's *Des Knaben Wunderhorn* (*The Youth's Magic Horn*) to life in a set of orchestral songs that transform German folk poetry into richly expressive vignettes of love, loss, and the surreal. The evening culminates in William L. Dawson's *Negro Folk Symphony*, a 1934 triumph that weaves African American spirituals into symphonic form, resonating with emotional depth, cultural pride, and rhythmic power.

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L'Orfeo

Monteverdi's Groundbreaking Masterpiece on Fate and Music.

Curtis Opera Theatre opens its thrilling 2025–26 series with *L'Orfeo*, Monteverdi's groundbreaking masterpiece that reshaped opera. Inspired by the Greek myth, this timeless tale follows Orpheus, a musician whose love for Eurydice drives him to challenge fate itself. Renowned conductor David Stern leads the cast of rising opera stars in acclaimed director and playwright John Matsumoto Giampietro's production. Premiered in 1607, *L'Orfeo* merges Renaissance polyphony with baroque drama; its stunning score brims with passion and beauty, placing raw human emotions at its core. More than 400 years later, this legendary work remains as powerful and moving as ever.

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La Passion de Simone

La Passion de Simone

A Musical Journey in 15 Stations.

Curtis Opera Theatre and Curtis New Music Ensemble present *La Passion de Simone*, a mesmerizing meditation on faith, sacrifice, and resistance by Finnish composer Kaija Saariaho and librettist Amin Maalouf. Subtitled "A Musical Journey in 15 Stations," this opera-oratorio explores the life and writings of Simone Weil, the radical French philosopher and activist whose pursuit of justice shaped 20th-century thought.

Directed by Marcus Shields and conducted by Marc Lowenstein, this powerful requiem is inspired by the baroque Passion Play and unfolds through a soprano narrator, guiding audiences through Weil's philosophical and spiritual journey. A stunning fusion of music, poetry, and theater, *La Passion de Simone* offers an unforgettable portrait of a fearless thinker who challenged the limits of thought and action in her quest for truth.

Magic and wonder intertwine in Benjamin Britten's enchanting adaptation of William Shakespeare's romantic comedy. Critically acclaimed director Sarah Ina Meyers and dynamic international conductor Vinay Parameswaran lead a dazzling cast of young opera stars and members of Curtis Symphony Orchestra in this spellbinding production. Prepare to be transported to a twilight world where feuding fairies meddle with mortals, hearts are led astray, and the surreal world of dreams blurs the edges of reality.

In the depths of a dark forest outside Athens, the fairy king Oberon and his queen, Tytania, clash in a battle of wits and wills as a group of impulsive lovers and an unsuspecting band of amateur actors wander into their moonlit realm. Seizing the opportunity to manipulate fate, Oberon entrusts the impish sprite Puck to squeeze the juice of a mystic flower into the eyes of his queen and the quarreling lovers, sparking a night of romantic chaos and surprising transformations.

Curtis New Music Ensemble's We the Artists explores groundbreaking American composers of the 20th and 21st centuries. Marking the nation's 250th year, the program reflects America's diverse musical tapestry. It features Clarice Assad's Canções da America, inspired by South American rhythms and Indigenous traditions; Carlos Simon's Giants, honoring five iconic Black Americans; and Valerie Coleman's Freedmen of the Five Civilized Tribes, exploring Black Indigenous heritage. The concert also includes selections from Joan Tower's Fanfare for the Uncommon Woman. We the Artists highlights creativity, resilience, and the voices shaping America's evolving soundscape.

Portrait of Jessie Montgomery

Curtis New Music Ensemble celebrates composer-in-residence Jessie Montgomery with a concert featuring works by the Grammy-winning composer, violinist, and educator. Praised as "turbulent, wildly colorful, and exploding with life" (*Washington Post*), Montgomery's music fuses classical with vernacular styles, improvisation, poetry, and social consciousness—offering a profound reflection of 21st-century American sound.

A winner of the Sphinx Medal of Excellence, Leonard Bernstein Award, and *Musical America*'s 2023 Composer of the Year, Montgomery explores themes from social justice to the Black diasporic experience with remarkable depth.

The program includes Concerto Grosso, a bold reimagining of the baroque tradition where the solo violinist embraces "choose your own adventure" spontaneity. It concludes with *Musings for two violins*, inspired by Béla Bartók's 44 Duos for Two Violins and honors composers such as Bach, Hindemith, and Vivaldi. This captivating evening showcases Montgomery's dynamic voice in modern classical music.


