SYNOPSIS

Part I

In the privacy of her chambers, Princess Ginevra quietly tells Dalinda, her close confidante and handmaid, that she has fallen deeply in love with Ariodante and that her father, the King, has openly supported their union. Polinesso, Duke of Albany, suddenly bursts into the room and interrupts their conversation to declare his passion for Ginevra, but she openly rebukes his advances and forces him to leave. Infatuated with the Duke and blind to his diabolical plot, Dalinda later informs him that Ginevra will soon wed Ariodante and hints that he should abandon his efforts and pursue her instead. In the gardens of the kingdom, Ariodante and Ginevra gather to pledge their love for one another and hear that the King has given the royal order for their wedding to be celebrated the following day. He instructs his courtier Odoardo to begin preparing the festivities. Once alone, Polinesso hatches a devious plan to manipulate Dalinda's emotions and overthrow his rival in pursuit of Ginevra's hand and the crown. In return for his heart, he persuades her to impersonate the princess by dressing in her clothing and giving him access to her quarters. Lurcanio, Ariodante's brother, professes his love for

Dalinda, but she rejects him and swears fidelity to Polinesso. Ginevra and Ariodante celebrate their joy on the eve before their wedding, unaware that their blissful wedding plans will soon be thwarted in a cruel twist of fate.

Later that night, Ariodante, restless and unable to fall asleep, strolls through the royal gardens, where he encounters Polinesso, who proclaims that he is shocked to hear that Ariodante is marrying Ginevra out of love. Lurcanio hides in the shadows and watches this exchange as Polinesso insists that he and Ginevra are lovers. As the conversation unfolds, Ariodante is convinced to witness this betrayal with his own eyes and sees his soon-to-be bride (Dalinda dressed as Ginevra) openly welcoming Polinesso into her bed chambers. Looking on in horror, Ariodante is convinced of the lie and becomes distraught and suicidal at this unfortunate turn of events. Lurcanio urges him to seek revenge instead of pointlessly ending his life, but Ariodante is so caught up in this false narrative that he questions everything and laments his fate. Tormented by the perceived betrayal he is despondent and inconsolable.



Part II

News is delivered to the King that his future son-in-law has tragically thrown himself off a cliff and has presumably drowned in the sea. The King shares this news with a heartbroken Ginevra, who faints in shock and is carried to her chambers. Lurcanio approaches the King with a letter that details what he had observed the night before. In it, he accuses the princess of cheating on his brother and claims that Ariodante has killed himself over Ginevra's infidelity. He announces that he is willing to defend this claim to the death. Furious at his daughter's reprehensible behavior, the King disavows her, and Ginevra falls into a delirious bout of despair.

Ariodante, who has survived his failed suicide attempt, wanders aimlessly until he encounters a woman being attacked. As he rescues her, he discovers that she is none other than Dalinda. Polinesso, in pursuit of the throne, had ordered the court handmaids to murder her, the only living witness to his sinister scheme. Saved by Ariodante, she confesses her misdeeds, and the two unite to clear the princess's name. In the kingdom, Odoardo continues to petition the King to finally forgive his daughter and stop waiting for a champion to arise and defend her honor. Polinesso then appears before the King and offers his services. Ginevra, who has been sentenced to death for her alleged role in Ariodante's death, asks to kiss her father's hand one last time before she dies but is appalled to hear that Polinesso is fighting for her. She refuses Polinesso's aid to no avail. The duel begins between Lurcanio who is defending his brother's honor and Polinesso who is feigning chivalry on behalf of Ginevra. Lurcanio fatally wounds Polinesso and is now prepared to fight his next contender. A mysterious person approaches to defend Ginevra's honor and reveals that it is in fact Ariodante. Ariodante. promises to explain everything if Dalinda is forgiven for her participation in the deception. The traitorous Polinesso confesses all before he dies, and Lurcanio professes his love for Dalinda, hoping she will finally have a change of heart. Ginevra is overjoyed to hear the news from her father that her true love is alive and well. Ariodante asks for her forgiveness, and the King proclaims that love and innocence have triumphed.

DIRECTOR'S NOTE



These days it seems all we do is fight over facts. The truth has somehow become something to be contested, manipulated, and debated over, making trust a rare commodity. *Ariodante* is an exploration of how our perceptions can easily be obscured, testing even the strongest bonds.

In this production, we chose to highlight the themes of light and shadow, reflection, veiling and unveiling. The walls act both as a mirror and as opaque reflective surfaces. The wedding veil is both celebratory and a tool for the obstruction of the character's view of the world. Light illuminates the darkened corners of our soul.

The saving grace of our story is the prevailing of faith and love. Because what is love if not an act of faith? As our young lovers, Ariodante and Ginevra, embark on their journey as a couple, they are tested both in their commitment to one another and in their own constitution as young adults coming into their own. As the characters in this opera are tested, so are we daily. Who do we believe when our reality is constantly shaken? We must be reminded again and again to have faith—not in an abstract concept but in one another and in ourselves.

These are the golden days of new opera. New compositions are being premiered at an exhilarating rate and we are so thrilled to be surrounded by an embarrassment of riches of new voices. For those of us writing and producing new opera, Handel continues to be the blueprint. As a skilled dramatist and a thoughtful explorer of the human condition, *Ariodante* is one of Handel's finest works. With fully rounded characters and a nuanced dramatic arch, he keeps the dramatic action constantly propelling forward. He then offers us, his contemporary interpreters, room to play and challenge ourselves in a work that feels ever relevant.

It has been a tremendous joy to work on this piece here at Curtis along my esteemed colleague, Maestro David Stern. The students have thrown themselves with us wholeheartedly into this challenging and deeply rewarding artistic adventure. They have taken a leap of faith with us and especially with themselves and it has paid off in so many ways.

David Stern

David Stern is much admired in the worlds of music and opera as an exceptional conductor, a creator of inspiring original projects, an educator of the singers of tomorrow and an outstanding musician. His multi-faceted career has three main pillars: symphonic music, opera, and education.

David Stern is currently chief conductor of the Palm Beach Opera, a position he has held since 2015. He is the former music director of the Israeli Opera and of the Theater St. Gallen (Switzerland), and has worked with the Opéra de Lyon, the English National Opera, Boston Lyric Opera, and the operas of Metz and Massy in France, among others.

He founded Opera Fuoco in 2003 as a platform for young professional singers in France, combining both a young artist program and a period-instrument orchestra, which produces semi-staged and fullystaged productions both nationally and internationally. Many of the laureates are the most sought-after singers in Europe today.

David Stern's repertoire ranges from the mainstream to the eclectic. His opera recordings include Giovanni Simone *Mayr's L'amor conjugale* and *Medea in Corinto*, Johann Christian Bach's *Zanaïda*, Handel's *Semele and Jephtha* with Opera Fuoco.

Mr. Stern received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Yale College and his Master of Music degree from the Juilliard School. He is married to the violinist Katharina Wolff.

Omer Ben Seadia Stage Director

Omer Ben Seadia moved to the U.S. in 2012 after a decade with the Israeli Opera. She is praised for her productions of contemporary opera, including the world premiere of The Snowy Day at Houston Grand Opera, Steal a Pencil for Me at Opera Colorado, and Thumbprint at Chautauqua Opera. Other recent successes include Elektra at Canadian Opera Company, Carmen and Ariadne auf Naxos at Cincinnati Opera, Tosca at Utah Opera, Atalanta at the Juilliard School, Idomeneo at Wolf Trap Opera, Charlie Parker's YARDBIRD at Atlanta Opera, Amahl and the Night Visitors with The Philadelphia Orchestra, The Golden Spike (as dramaturg and director) at Utah Opera, La bohème at Opera Santa Barbara, and the double bill of Tom Cipullo's Josephine and After Life at Opera Colorado. She is deeply committed to the development and training of young artists and has taught acting for the HGO Studio and Young Artist Vocal Academy, the Ryan Opera Center at Lyric Opera of Chicago, Santa Fe Opera, and the Merola Opera Program at San Francisco Opera. She completed the prestigious opera directing program at the Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music and was an apprentice stage director at the Merola Opera Program. Ms. Ben Seadia is also a graduate of Seminar Ha'kibutzim, School of Performing Arts in Tel Aviv, with a degree in theater directing, as well as a teaching degree in theater education. Future productions include Lucia di Lammermoor at the Israeli Opera.

Johnathan McCullough Assistant Stage Director

GRAMMY-nominated baritone and director, Johnathan McCullough, recently premiered his production of David T. Little's Soldier Songs produced by Opera Philadelphia which the New York Times called "a pacesetter for cinematic opera." He, alongside Christopher Allen, are the co-creators of *Emily*, a piece centered around works written by Emily Dickinson which was produced by Opéra de Montréal. He has sung leading roles at Opera Philadelphia, Komische Oper Berlin, English National Opera, Opéra de Lausanne, Portland Opera, Wolf Trap Opera, and Opera Theatre of Saint Louis among others. Upcoming appearances include Figaro in Il barbiere di Siviglia with Pittsburgh Opera, Ophémon in The Anonymous Lover with Opera Philadelphia, and Mercutio in Roméo et Juliette with Lyric Opera of Kansas City. He holds a Bachelor and a Master of Music degree and an Artist Diploma from the Curtis Institute of Music. He is the opera program director for the National Children's Chorus leading Vail Opera Camp.

Ryan M. Howell Scenic Designer

Ryan Howell's Off-Broadway credits include Pretty Hunger and Teenage Dick (The Public) and Adoration of the Old Woman (INTAR). His regional credits include Atalanta (The Julliard School); The Magic Flute (Opera Theatre of Saint Louis); Théresè (Sarasota Opera); Ariadne Auf Naxos (Cincinnati Opera); Idomeneo (Wolf Trap Opera); A Few Good Men and School Girls: Or the African Mean Girls Play (Pittsburgh Public Theater); Lights Out: Nat King Cole (Geffen Playhouse); Loving vs. Virginia (Williamstown Theatre Festival); Evita, Newsies, and The Little Mermaid (Westport Country Playhouse); *Grease* and *Altar Boyz* (The Cape Playhouse); *Little Shop of Horrors* and *The Last Five Years* (ACT of CT); and *Dreamgirls, Smokey Joe's Cafe, The Legend of Georgia McBride*, and *Rock of Ages* (Playhouse on the Square). Mr. Howell's Broadway credits include associate designer for *Latin History for Morons* (Studio 54) and *Eclipsed* (Golden Theater), and assistant designer for *Hadestown* (Walter Kerr Theatre) and *Paradise Square* (Ethel Barrymore Theatre). He has also served as assistant art director for HBO's *Succession* (seasons 3 and 4) and Showtime's *Three Women* (season 1).

Ryan Park Costume Designer

Ryan Park's design credits include LatinXOXO (The Public), Atalanta (The Juilliard School), Dial M for Murder (The Old Globe), English with an Accent (Lincoln Center), Kinky Boots (Paramount), ALIEN/NATION (Williamstown Theatre Festival), Evita and Beauty and the Beast (Drury Lane), American Dream Study (Forest of Arden Company), Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat (Drury Lane and 50th anniversary concert at Lincoln Center), Ariadne auf Naxos (Cincinnati Opera), Little Shop of Horrors (ACT of CT and The Cape Playhouse), Cabaret (Boston Conservatory), and Altar Boyz (The Cape Playhouse). Joe Beumer

Joe Beumer designs for opera and theatre both nationally and internationally. Recent designs include *Thumbprint* (Portland Opera); Aida (Cincinnati Opera); Cavalleria Rusticana and Rigoletto (Opera Colorado); Tosca (Utah Opera); Charlie Parker's YARDBIRD (Atlanta Opera); *Elixir of Love* (Permian Basin Opera); Speakeasy Times Square (Bond 45 in N.Y.C.); Indecent (Playhouse on Park); and The 39 Steps, Mamma Mia, West Side Story, Bonnie and Clyde, and Chicago (Summer Repertory Theatre Festival in Santa Rosa, Calif.). Brittany Rappise Hair and Makeup Supervisor

Brittany Rappise is a freelance wig and makeup designer with over ten years of experience in opera, theater, and film. Although based in Pensacola, Florida, she spends most of the year with her car loaded up with wigs and supplies traveling to opera companies all over the country and is thrilled to be back at Curtis designing for the 2022–23 season. Recent engagements include designing operas for Des Moines Metro Opera, North Carolina Opera, Pensacola Opera, Opera Delaware, and Amarillo Opera. She also builds wigs and teaches workshops for Busch Gardens, Disney, and universities across the country. Upcoming work includes *Carousel* (Pensacola Opera), *La traviata* (Shreveport Opera), and the 2023 summer season at Des Moines Metro Opera.

Mary Moon Violence Design and Fight Direction

Mary Ann Moon is a New York City-based artist, actor, and choreographer. As a military kid, she grew up balancing athletics and the arts, finding her passion in stage combat and consent-based movement. Known as Zuzu, some of her recent work includes assisting fight master Michael G. Chin at the Juilliard School and Pace University on various productions. She is a proud member of the Vixens En Garde, an all-female sword-fighting company dedicated toward the empowerment of young adults and tours with them nationally. Through all her work, Ms. Moon strives to build positive, communication-filled relationships and is honored to join the production team bringing Ariodante to life. She extends her gratitude to Curtis Opera Theatre and its students, her Curtis colleagues in administration and production, her husband, the Vixens En Garde, and Banquo.

BIOGRAPHIES Singers

Mezzo-soprano Lucy Baker (Ariodante: May 4 and 6), from Wilmington, N.C., a student of adjunct faculty member Julia Faulkner, is the Gene and Jean Stark Fellow and entered Curtis in 2021. Ms. Baker's recent roles with the Curtis Opera Theatre include Dorabella (Così fan tutte), The Hostess (Triple-Sec), and covered Emilie and Marquise de Merteuil (The Dangerous Liaisons). Other roles include Cherubino (Le nozze di Figaro) and Hansel (Hansel and Gretel) with DePaul Opera Theatre, Serse (Serse) with the Chautauqua Institution, and cover for Justice Ginsburg (Scalia/Ginsburg) with the Chautauqua Opera Company. Ms. Baker has performed in concert with the Philadelphia Chamber Music Society and Chautauqua Symphony Orchestra, and has sung the national anthem for the Chicago Bulls. Ms. Baker received the Edith Newfield Award from the Musicians Club of Women and was awarded first prize from the Chicago Chapter of the National Association of Teachers of Singing. In the summer of 2022, she was a fellow at the Ravinia Steans Music Institute. Ms. Baker holds a Bachelor of Music degree from DePaul University.

Soprano Sarah Fleiss (Ginevra: May 4 and 6), from North Bergen, N.J., a student of adjunct faculty member Julia Faulkner, is the Jack Wolgin Fellow and entered Curtis in 2019. She recently sang Despina (Così fan tutte) and Monica (The Medium) with Curtis Opera Theatre, toured with Eric Owens in the Neue Liebeslieder with Curtis on Tour, and premiered a song cycle by Tania León with the Musical Fund Society and Curtis's Ensemble 20/21. She recently attended the Music Academy of the West. Prior to Curtis, she was a student at Columbia University, also participated in the Juilliard Exchange program. Other roles include Pamina (The Magic Flute), Cherubino (Le nozze di Figaro), and Annio (La clemenza di Tito).

Bass-baritone Evan Gray (King of Scotland), from Zurich, Switzerland, a student of adjunct faculty member Mark Schnaible, is the Jill and Sheldon Bonovitz Fellow and entered Curtis in 2019. Mr. Gray has performed as soloist in Haydn's Missa in tempore belli with the Kirchenchors Pfäffikon; C.P.E. Bach's St. Matthew Passion with the Sinfonietta Zürich: Mozart's Mass in C minor, K. 139 with the Zürcher Kammerorchester; and Monteverdi's Laudate Pueri with the Zurich Boys' Choir. At age 10, Mr. Gray toured China with the Zurich Boys' Choir, singing Haydn's Creation, and at age 13 he performed as Third Boy in The Magic Flute at Theater St. Gallen. In 2019, he appeared on a master class recital with Robert Holl. He has also performed as a guitarist for the pop/rock band Just Monday. Earlier this year, Mr. Gray performed as Dulcamara (The Elixir of Love) for the Curtis Opera Theatre. Before entering Curtis, Mr. Gray studied at the Pre-College of the Konservatorium Winterthur. In his spare time, Mr. Gray enjoys studying languages and history, playing sports, and raising chili plants.

Tenor Jason Kakuk (Odoardo), from Queenstown, Md., holds a Bachelor of Music degree in vocal performance from Temple University. There, he appeared as Pelléas in Debussy's Impressions de Pelléas and covered the role of Don Basilio in Le nozze di Figaro. Earlier this year, Mr. Kakuk performed with Curtis Opera Theatre for the first time as a member of the ensemble in L'elisir d'amore. Mr. Kakuk's other roles include Lamplighter (Rachel Portman's The Little Prince) with Teen Opera Initiative and Monostatos (Die Zauberflöte) and Beadle (Sweeney Todd) with Bethesda Summer Music Festival. Other engagements include masterclasses at Classical Singing and New York in June 2022. He is preparing for graduate school auditions this fall and is an active performer in the Philadelphia area.

Soprano Emilie Kealani (Dalinda: May 4 and 6), from San Francisco, a student of Joan Patenaude-Yarnell, is the Walter and Leonore Annenberg Fellow and entered Curtis in 2022. Curtis Opera Theatre credits include Miss Jessel (The Turn of the Screw) and Adina (The Elixir of Love). She recently made her professional debut with the Santa Fe Opera as an apprentice artist, performing in productions of Carmen, Falstaff, and the world premiere of *M. Butterfly*. In their renowned Apprentice Scenes program, she also portrayed the roles of Sophie (Der Rosenkavalier) and Zerlina (Don Giovanni). Holding a bachelor's degree from the Manhattan School of Music, Ms. Kealani is the winner of numerous awards from organizations, including the Gerda Lissner Foundation, National Shirley RabbWinston Scholarship, Beach Blanket Babylon, and Schmidt Vocal Arts.

Mezzo-soprano Sophia Maekawa (Ariodante: May 5 and 7), from Kyoto, Japan, a student of adjunct faculty member Julia Faulkner, is the Edith Evans Frumin Fellow and entered Curtis in 2016.
