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Creativity with wood by Markus Monczka

He's normally an all-rounder with wood at the construction site and so he can be trusted with any kind of building work. Here, in conversation with Gabriele Podzun, he takes us on a tour of his wide-ranging projects and tells us how it all began.

Gabriele Podzun: How did it all begin with you and your career as a carpenter?


Markus Monczka: Well, it was my grandfather who taught me the most important things. He let me mess around with wood and other materials even when I was a child and he passed on to me a load of tips and tricks with tools. He'd be amazed to see just what we can do with today's tools and materials.

Gabriele Podzun: How did you come to land up here in this area and then build up your business in Winningen?

Markus Monczka: It was a complete accident, though I feel really happy and at home here in Winningen. We're a small family business that loves to pay close attention to detail and to work using traditional craftsmanship. We started in 2005 and have since built up a large customer base across Mayen-Koblenz and in the nearby Hunsrück and Westerwald. Commercial and private clients trust in our reliable service.

Gabriele Podzun: You and your colleagues are active across a lot of trades in new builds. We both have really enjoyed working together for a number of years on both new builds and redesigns.

Markus Monczka: Exactly right. These are tasks that go far beyond the usual carpentry work. We also do interior drywall and loft conversions and install complete windows with shutters and blinds. And our portfolio includes not only modern front doors, but also massive traditional-style wooden doors – as well as interior, glass and sliding doors.

And I often take care of the infamous "little things at the interfaces between different trades.

Gabriele Podzun: If I have a creative idea, we often chew it around together and come up with good solutions.

Markus Monczka: I'm also called upon to convert existing pieces of furniture and I really like creating happy clients and lovely results, like the wine bar in Winningen.

Gabriele Podzun: And you do small pieces of repair too?

Markus Monczka: I think of that as good customer service. I'm more than happy to do that.

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Healthy living with MERZ HOLZBAU

If you travel past live construction sites in the region, you often will spot the MERZ HOLZBAU sign with its distinctive yellow arrow on a blue background. They are well known for working on roofs, but less well-known however for their beautiful timber frames for buildings. Here the architect Gabriele Podzun gets some insights from Managing Director Stefan Merz and Michael Merz, who is responsible for Finance and internal operations.

Gabriele Podzun: How did your business start up? Stefan Merz: I worked for over 20 years for the well-established joinery firm Holzbau Pfeil, which could look back on over 160 unbroken years of craftsmanship. On 1st January 2005 I was able to take over the business. My great-uncle Franz-Josef Pfeil is very pleased with how the two of us have developed the business further. We were also able to use the famous yellow arrow in our own logo, as a reminder of the founding Pfeil family.

Gabriele Podzun: That's a nice nod of appreciation to the tradition and life's work of the Pfeil family. And now tell us about the steps you've taken for the future of the MERZ HOLZBAU business.

Stefan Merz: Sure thing. In 2016 we moved to our new building in Bannberscheid with its large, technically modern joinery workshop and attached office complex.

We work with modern CNC machines, that is computer-supported production. This takes strain off our employees, helps them conserve their energy and strength and helps us all to work more efficiently.

Gabriele Podzun: We've worked together as architects on residential roof structures on my own construction sites. However, you also manufacture complete buildings – both commercial buildings, such as your own joinery hall – and residential buildings.

Michael Merz: That's right. We construct buildings with high thermal insulation and therefore low heating costs. We can also construct zero-energy houses on request. Building with wood is ecological construction because wood is a renewable building material. With proper construction, wooden houses will last for years and years. These are important points for our builders these days.

Gabriele Podzun: In Finland I've seen 800 year-old well-maintained wood buildings. That really is fascinating. Wood also feels warm and so helps a sense of well-being.

Michael Merz: Wood has a thermal conductivity of 0.13 watts per metre-kelvin. This, together with the thermal insulation that is incorporated into the wooden structure, is really valuable.

Stefan Merz: Big plus points for this construction method are the short build time and above all no absorption of moisture during the build phase.

Michael Merz: With our approach, in a few days we have the outer walls up, including the windows, and the house is sealed. Depending on the client's preferences, the builders can then either bring in their own resources, or we can take care of it. **Gabriele Podzun:** The well-being factor is very important, isn't it?

Michael Merz: The whole construction method is for a healthy home, because we don't use any artificial wood protection. We build completely individual houses, nothing is "off the shelf".

Gabriele Podzun: You've built unusual but especially beautiful roofs for not only the well-being bungalow but also the solar house. Both buildings have an even higher well-being level because of the application of Feng Shui. That's a project that comes from deep within my heart and is also my special sauce for builders.

Feng Shui: WATER flows and everything is in motion

Humans are made mainly from water – water is life.

It's therefore logical that water is given a significant meaning in Feng Shui too. We see it in the very name **FENG SHUI**, which translates as WIND and **WATER**.

WIND represents moving water here, because standing water quickly can become brackish and unpleasant. So water needs motion in order to stay fresh.

WATER has unbelievable power and this power should be used. In classical Feng Shui, streams and water runs are harnessed into specifically selected directions. This power is special and should be channelled in purposeful ways.



Our culture too is deeply anchored in the use of water for design and practical use. Examples are refreshing water features in village and city piazzas.

Springs and wells were sources of water for humans and for animals. That's why these "water holes" then also became meeting points for business. You could stay for a time and have a bit of a chat while you drew up your water from the well. There is even a Feng Shui symbol that comes from this: DUI, which is the LAKE for, at the same time, joy and communication.

Flowing movements, like water, also do our bodies good. It's not a question of personal bests and records, it's about regular and "flowing" movements.

Swimming is a beautiful combination of water and movement. It's one of the healthy sports, because the water carries the body and so is especially protective of our joints.



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Building with bricks and Feng Shui



It's one of the most impressive manmade structures in history: the Great Wall of China. Constructed around the 7th century BCE, it was built out of fired bricks – filled with clay and sand for stability.

The Chinese refer to its most famous structure as the "10,000 li long wall". However, the number "10,000" is not meant literally as an exact measure, but colloquially stands for "really very, very long".

Various numbers about the exact length swirl around and are continually corrected – upwards – by more recent archaeological finds.

In a straight line it would pretty much go from Beijing to Lisbon. Near Beijing, it is about 10 metres thick at the base and four to eight metres at the crown.

In reality "the Wall" is a complex system of different walls. It was built as protection against nomadic horsemen from the north, though this protective aspect is disputed among experts, as the walls were often overwhelmed.



When talking about Feng Shui, I am repeatedly told that "you shouldn't build a front door facing north, as that would be considered bad in Feng Shui". This cliché about north-facing doors can perhaps be explained by the story in which the Chinese were afraid of horsemen from the north.

The statement is nonsense of course, because such thinking has nothing to do with down-toearth practical Feng Shui, which I use to create the balance needed for better well-being.

For me, the Great Wall of China is a valuable example of the enormous durability of fired brick walls.

Nowadays, you can erect buildings from monolithic brick walls that do not need additional thermal insulation. The indoor climate of these houses is pleasant, contributes to saving energy and a relaxed sense of well-being.



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

Architecture and Feng Shui belong together

During my architecture studies, **Prof. Ullrich Beck** was particularly influential on me. As an experienced, very creative stonemason, he was very strict in his teachings on structure; at the same time he left a lot of room for artistic creativity. His view was, *"architecture and Feng Shui belong together!"*

The Foundation Text for Feng Shui is the I Ging. It is several thousand years old. Diving into the depths of its knowledge is comparable in effort to doing a high school diploma.

Its basis is observation, factual analysis and experience in finding balancing measures. Feng Shui is a very profound theory of harmony. It serves a single purpose – **to enhance humanity's wellbeing.**

Today many findings of Feng Shui have been confirmed by modern scientific research methods, especially in quantum physics. Indeed our European master builders of the past used the same design rules, they just had different names.

And I apply Feng Shui by making sure that I explain everything to my clients in very clear and simple language.

My main mentor in Feng Shui was **Grandmaster Prof. Yap Cheng Hai** from Malaysia.

New design for a garden in South Africa

The main idea behind the new garden design was to generate clear, creative forms that took in the slope of the ground and at the same time minimised the risk of slipping on the incline when gardening. The goal was a low-maintenance and at the same time beautiful garden.

To achieve this, we chose a conversion approach that turned the steep slope into individual step-

ped terraces. This looks nicer and has the side benefit that it also prevents the newly introduced good topsoil from being washed away by the seasonal rains. In winter it can rain very heavily in the Cape Town region.


We have used lots of species of plants that, once established, require almost no watering. Put even a small cutting into good soil and it will quickly grow into a beautiful plant.

Water scarcity is also a major issue in South Africa. A few years ago, the winter rains were far too low and the drinking water reservoirs were almost empty.

Since then, we have paid even more attention to possible water savings.

We have incorporated large amounts of good topsoil and this will retain soil moisture better in the future. This topsoil helps provide the nourishment that enables the plants to thrive.

Designs with 3D-CAD-Visualisations

TOP MAGAZIN: How did you come to settle on this job?

Mike Podzun-Timmermann: It's actually a mix of several jobs. After finishing school I studied Computer Game Design. Then Covid came. Luckily I'd been working for a long time with my mother in her office, helping put together the architectural drawings. We are both similarly creative and can work well together because we are on the same wavelength. I then became independent on 1st January 2021.

TOP MAGAZIN: Aren't your mother's and your jobs completely different?

Mike Podzun-Timmermann: No, not at all. Our jobs are, in fact, closely related. I've created fantasy worlds for video games, and these have to include realistic- looking houses and towns with surrounding countryside – naturally all virtual. I design in the virtual world, whilst my mother plans buildings for the real world. Both worlds need good ideas and plans. **TOP Magazin:** How did it continue, once you'd started the job?

Mike Podzun-Timmermann: I made my own design and colour suggestions for a particular client. She implemented my ideas 100% and was excited by the results. I'd noticed that I really enjoyed this kind of work – especially selecting colours – and so I went on to become an interior designer.

TOP Magazin: Can you show us an example of a visualisation?

Mike Podzun-Timmermann: I'd be delighted to. Here's an idea for a teenager's room, designed with my 3D-CAD. With this software I can work up realistic-looking visualisations for my clients and at the same time measured-up plans for the craftspeople who will do the work. This helps everyone involved.

The client can get a really clear understanding and virtual view of everything, whether it's interior rooms, a bathroom, a pool in the garden, or even a complete house. It's all possible.

TOP Magazin: What do you see yourself doing next?

Mike Podzun-Timmermann: I'd like to build up my visualisation business more. That really is my thing and the knowledge I've gained from my different studies and experiences are now all flowing nicely together. It's always better to correct something while it's still on the computer screen. Once it's under construction and has to be changed, then it costs a lot of money. My motto is: *"Visualisations save money and nerves."*

Blauweg: a new life for your favourite jeans

Gabi Podzun and I... we know each other through Feng Shui. At a super-interesting lunch together, this led on to us talking about everything under the sun, including career paths. This led me to begin to talk about myself and what my brand is all about and how what the basic idea is behind it.


Gabi: How did you get the idea for your business?

Christina: I can explain that really quickly. I've always wanted to do something with clothes and fashion, but I hadn't thought I'd end up in the jeans industry. First of all I got a solid qualification in tailoring. Then I was able to stay longer in the company and so built up my knowledge in the different parts of the business: quality, jeans washing, development and production of the materials. As well as that I was active as a buyer and was on site a lot. After a job change, I then broadened my knowledge by training in the technicalities of cutting.

Gabi: When did you have the brilliant idea for BLAUWEG?

Christina: For ages I've thought how cool it would be if you could take "old pairs of jeans" and turn them into new products. However, it first became a concrete idea for me when I had time at home during my maternity leave. Gabi: What happened next?

Christina: I first went back to my original job. Then two seamstresses quit their repair workshop. Plain and simple I was therefore asked to repair jeans. This laid the foundation stone for my studio and my workshop.



Gabi: Exactly how's it meant to be? You have to tell me more, my friend.



Christina: The main idea is the Recycling Principle. Recycling is an important theme. My idea is not to destroy the old jeans completely, but instead to build them up from new again. In this way the "favourite piece" can be used again in a new form, as described exactly by the word "reuse". One-time use has had its day. The time is right for reuse. For jeans that means BLAUWEG.





Gabi: Why this particular material?

Christina: Of course it would work with practically any material. However, denim (as we call jeans material in the industry) is always individual and changeable. What also takes us to denim is that jeans lovers buy their jeans raw – that is untreated and unwashed – and look forward to the time that the first creases become visible. It's the rubbing and sheen that make jeans unmistakable. This all gives washed and well-worn jeans their own special colour pattern. Turning all this into a new product makes the whole thing so exciting and at the same time unique.

Gabi: What kinds of reused products do you have?

Christina: I start off with handbags and shopping bags, but also covers for favourite chairs. All parts are unique; no product is like any other, because each time it's a different bit of denim used. Of course you can always choose to have a product made out of your favourite jeans. However, not every pair of trousers can be used, and I only use those that I can make things from. For that I have standard products, by which I mean that the form for a handbag stays the same – the uniqueness comes from the way we work with what we're given and its associated extras. That also requires us to schedule in enough time. If you'd prefer not to do this, then you can buy finished products straight from our shop.

Gabi: So it's not mass-produced products; instead each piece is individual?

Christina: I tend to think of us as more of a manufacturer. I'm always keen to take on new ideas and new products. It's all very exciting!

Gabi: And how do you get hold of the jeans?

Christina: They get dropped off with me or sent in the post once we've got details via mail or phone.

Gabi: And have you used Feng Shui in setting up your studio?

Christina: Yes of course. That's why I feel so comfortable there and can be so creative at work.

We're finally there. The warm summer days are calling us into the open air, out for walks, into pub gardens and ice-cream parlours – and best of all - time together with family and friends.


"It's simply about quality of life", says a delighted Hans Wissman. He explains enthusiastically that he has started to enjoy going out in his free time again, because, thanks to his new super-tiny inear hearing aid system, he can communicate without any limitations. And he loves that. "It's now not just my dog that I can communicate with properly, it's also my fellow human beings", he adds with a wink and a smile.

Hans Wissman is convinced that everybody can do something about their hearing. For him this means a regular annual hearing test, so that any hearing loss can be quickly spotted and taken care of. "And you lose your mental fitness, as well as your active participation in a social life", says Hans.

Once he'd established that his hearing was getting worse, Hans sought advice from his local acoustic specialist – BECKER. Since then, Yvonne Fiand, a BECKER expert practitioner has led him on the best way back to good hearing.

Top Magazin: You're a wine connoisseur and South Africa expert. Where do your experiences originate from?


Podzun: I've been involved with the subject of wine for 50 years. I visited countless countries across the world in my role as Founder and President of the German Wine and Sommelier School. And I looked after the Mittelrhein section of the Gault Millau wine guide for 18 years.

Top Magazin: What do you find so fascinating about South Africa?

Podzun: Its nature, climate and friendly people. And of course the wine.

Top Magazin: The overall size of the wine growing area in South Africa is similar to that of Germany. Where does the difference between the two of them lie?

Podzun: South Africa is about 50/50 white wine and red wine, and the vineyards are on average a lot bigger. It's therefore quite common that grapes are bought and sold by farmers. Almost every vineyard offers professional wine tasting for a fee, sometimes with cheese or sausage on the side; in Germany that is a lot rarer. Lots of the larger vineyards also offer their own restaurant and even overnight accommodation. And another thing I've noticed is how professional



the website designs are, with all their facts about each wine. Germany can still learn something there.

Top Magazin: And what about the wine quality?

Podzun: For each of the last five years I've visited 17 vineyards across five months to do professional tasting and so I've got a goodoverview. I'm impressed by the variety and the quality of wines. The Chardonnay, Cabernet Sauvignon, Merlot and Shiraz can hold their own internationally. And the main grape variety here, Pinotage, is improving year on year.

Top Magazin: You're a fan of Spätburgunder (Pinot Noir) and, as initiator of the "chamber wine of the year", you've tasted lots of Spätburgunder and Frühburgunder along the Ahr river in Germany. What is the state of Pinot Noir in South Africa?

Podzun: Pinot Noir is very rare there. For the most part the climate is too hot. Exceptions are the Heemel en Aarde Valley with exceptional Pinot Noir and Chardonnay; as well as Elgin Valley and Robertson Valley with their cooler climates. They are about an hour and a half drive from Cape Town.

Top Magazin: What role does South Africa's wine play in Germany?

Podzun: Germany is the second-most important export country, after the UK. However, it's mostly ever-

yday wine. It's called "bulk wine" because it's shipped in large containers and then bottled and labelled in Europe. At discounters it's always less than €5. The renowned vineyards have experienced importers and a different customer base.

Top Magazin: Does South Africa grow Riesling?

Podzun: Riesling is very rare indeed. Neither climate nor soil are suitable. Each year I invite the winemakers to a Riesling rarity wine tasting. I present the latest champion wines from the Vinum Wine Guide and top-ranking sweet rarities and auction wines from the last four decades. Each time it's a real highlight.
