Practice or Just Shooting?

As hunting seasons begin to wind down, now is a good time to start thinking about shooting winter leagues and tournaments. Prairie Bowmen has an excellent facility to sharpen your shooting skills, or at least keep them sharp during the winter. Target league is on Tuesdays and 3-D league is on Thursdays. These leagues can be a great time, regardless if you want to shoot competitively, just plain have fun, or both.

When I moved to Pocatello Idaho about 10 years ago, I was thrilled to find they had a first class facility for indoor shooting during the winter months. As a matter of fact they had 4 leagues per week, Vegas style, NFAA style, a special traditional league and a couple's league. Pretty much about any type shooting you wanted! Before I moved to Idaho, thanks to a good friend and great target shooter, Jim Hunt, I was introduced to a world class target archer by the name of Dee Wilde. I took Dee turkey hunting for a couple of years here in Nebraska and we became very good friends. Dee lives in Pocatello so I knew when I moved there I would have someone to shoot with, but little did I know how much I would learn from Dee and his sons Reo and Logan.

I think for years I just shot, and figured the more I shot the better I would get....problem was I never really got any better. I became "famous" for being the guy who was always trying the newest and best equipment thinking that would make me shoot better. I made small improvements with some equipment changes but most had no real effect. When I started shooting leagues in Pocatello, I was shocked to see how many really good shooters they had. It seemed there was one common thread, "coaching", not to mention three professional archers in the club! Dee kind of took me under his wing at that point and very patiently began to coach me. Dee's son Reo became one of my best friends and truly spent tons of time with me as well. Dee's youngest son Logan ran the archery shop in Pocatello and was always willing to help with adjusting/changing my equipment. The best part of their coaching was they were patient, plus they had seen and probably coached through just about every bad habit I had. Many times during our practice together we would laugh about some of the bad habits and then we would truly spend some time trying to fix them. I could go on and on about how we tried to fix things, which I will gladly share with you anytime, but I don't want to write a novel.

One of the best lessons I learned from Reo is, count "EVERY SHOT". In his mind, poor practice was worse than no practice at all. His practice sessions consisted to two practice rounds then a full match every time he shot. He might shoot 4-5 matches a day but each match would consist of two practice rounds followed by a full match. He was constantly fine tuning his bow during the match, but counted every arrow, even if his fine tuning caused a poor hit. He constantly amazed me with how he could tell exactly where the arrow would go if he made a bad shot, or over corrected something during his fine tuning. He never started a practice session by waiting till he "warmed-up" before he started scoring....always 2 practice rounds and then officially started scoring. The only exception to this would be during tournaments where they might allow some warm-up period prior to the actual start of the match. Reo and I often shot against each other during our practice sessions, of course he always spotted me points, but never quite enough. He also made me shoot with distractions, like RAP music, which he knew I hated, just to force me to better focus. This was hard for me at first, but pretty quickly I found that this would make me shoot better. I guess I learned there was no such thing as a wasted shot! I still think I shoot much better if I can warm-up for a little bit first, probably because it takes a little time to get this old body ready to shoot, but I still count every arrow, even if it doesn't get on a scorecard. Because of what I've learned during the last ten years....I better understand....the term "Perfect Practice makes Perfect". If your practice sessions don't yield better shooting maybe your just shooting.....not really practicing!

BOWHUNTING AND THE NFAA by John Elliott

I was reading an article in the (NFAA) National Field Archery Association's magazine. I been a member since the late 70's and have done a lot of shooting over the years. I have heard a lot of people tell me they are just a hunter and paper or target shooting is not their thing. This article by Debra Sieloff and a National Indoor Champion is also a Bowhunter. The following is part of her article:

"Avid bow hunters sometimes overlook the fun of hunting species that are available 365 day a year, in many places, including certain small game and coyotes. Depending on your state hunting regulations, you can hunt them year-round with archery or other legal methods. In certain instances, you can hunt without a license, even though most small game licenses are cheap.

Small game hunting can help big game hunters keep their hunting skills sharp in between seasons. It can also offer additional game or problem animal control, as in the case of prairie dogs and ground hogs near ranches, raccoons in areas where conservations are working to bring back bird species, and the notorious coyote, which wreaks havoc on fawn and calf populations, turkey and livestock. Most ranchers welcome hunters who ask permission to legally hunt problem species.

Those times when you are out scouting the woods, fields, and mountains for big game, you can take you archery gear and a small game license, and have a good time. Make sure you comply with hunting regulations when you do so. When in doubt, contact your local authorities for clarification or compliance.

But how does this relate to NFAA? The NFAA has fantastic indoor archery formats that can benefit the small game hunters. The targets are practical, and the distances are reasonable for the size of the target: 20 yards. The two styles of target s allow hunters — one larger, for those who are just starting to learn indoor archery shooting, and a "five spot" for expert-level archers who have a high percentage of shots in the bullseye.

Hunters are used to dealing with low light levels. So, indoor archery lets you put yourself into a shooting situation where you can practice making a shot in low light with the commotion of a competition to distract your concentration. And who doesn't have some sort of distraction while hunting, even if it is the sound of your heart beating out of your chest.

An indoor round is shot with five arrows per end. Then you score and pull the arrow, and shoot again. There are 12 ends per round. You'll shoot 60 arrows per round. Some tournaments are one round, some are two — shot over two days. So review the tournament description if you are entering an official NFAA event. If you are a hunter who is new to NFAA indoor archery, start out with the single spot. It is the biggest version of the indoor-style target. When all of your arrows are in the scoring rings (all blue rings plus the white center bulls eye), graduate to the five spot.

Set goals, such as hitting each spot with one arrow per spot 50 percent of the time (blue plus white bullseye).

You should be able to reach that with the help of an instructor and a bow that's tuned. Then increase your goals to 80 percent SCOring, until all your arrows score. If you want to drive yourself to be a better shooter, set goals for the percentage of bullseyes that you shoot. Try a local NFAA indoor league, a tournament or championship. There are NFAA Indoor sectionals, which represent a multistate championship, that run from January to April. Then there is the crown jewel: the NFAA Indoor National Championships if you want to try your target expertise or just have a lot of fun with hundreds of other archers on the shooting line all at the same time.

There are bow hunter divisions, if you want to show off your skills with your hunting set up."

Ok, you get the idea of the excerpt from her article. Most of the target archers today started as Bowhunters, we are not born good but it takes practice at this or any sport to become that good at it. I once told an individual, that if he went to Indoor Nationals that I "GUARANTEED" that he would not be in last place. Guess what, he wasn't and has like myself, become hooked on this great indoor sport. It does not make you a better hunter because you get that by actually hunting and acquiring knowledge of the game you hunt but it will make you a better shot at the game you hunt with more confidence. We have a great NFAA approved indoor facility provided by your Prairie Bowmen Archery Club. Take advantage of it and come join the league or just come out and make yourself a better shot by shooting a little paper. It is fun and leagues have just started. If you just want to shoot at critters then come to the 3D league and be prepared to have fun and bring a friend and get them started too! I am now retired and a senior citizen but I still enjoy shooting leagues and haven't missed an Indoor National's since the second one they had. (I missed the first one because I wasn't shooting at the time). This all started for me 30 some years ago just 50 miles North of Lincoln in Omaha. It took someone to say: "Let's do this. It might be fun and it is only 50 miles away". Come out and give paper targets a try, who knows, you might like it and become a PAPER JUNKY as I did. See you at the target butt!
