Origins of American Traditional Archery

After the American Civil War, two Confederate veterans, Will and Maurice Thompson, were very instrumental in the revival of Traditional Archery in America. The two brothers, along with a former slave by the name of Thomas Williams, lived in the wild in the Okefenokee Swamp in Southern Georgia. The brothers being ex-confederate soldiers and Williams a black man in the south, the men were not allowed to own firearms, so they needed to figure out other ways to hunt for food.

Thomas Williams knew something about English-style Archery (using a longbow), though it is unclear where he gained this knowledge. Mr. Williams shared this knowledge with his newfound friends and together the three men became very proficient at their craft. Several years later, Maurice wrote a book, *The Witchery of Archery*. The book became a bestseller and suddenly people all over America became very enthused about the sport of Archery. Will and Maurice were among the original members responsible for the creation of the *National Archery Association*, founded in 1879 in Crawfordsville, Indiana. However, the 'Association' did little to advance the sport as anything more than a novelty and public interest in archery soon subsided.

That all changed when Ishi came out of hiding in in 1911. Ishi was the last surviving member of the Yahi Indian tribe who had lived in the wilds of Northern California for hundreds of years. He lived his last five years at the University of California at Berkeley Anthropology Museum as somewhat of a live exhibit, making bows and various beadwork and leather items as spectators watched. His doctor, Saxton Pope, was an instructor of surgery at the medical school. Dr. Pope was very interested in Ishi and his culture, he was especially interested in his archery skills. Ishi took great pride in teaching Dr. Pope about his culture. How to make tools the way the Yahi did, and how to shoot and hunt using a bow and arrow. Also interested in Ishi's history and culture were accomplished archer and bowmaker Will 'Chief' Compton and archery-enthusiast Arthur Young.

Ishi died in 1916 of tuberculosis. Dr. Pope and Mr. Young learned much about making bows and arrows from Mr. Compton and with the archery skills taught by Ishi honed to perfection, the two men set about proving that archery could be used to bag large game. They hunted all over the world, and in Alaska and Africa took several large game animals. Because Dr. Pope and Mr. Young demonstrated to Western society that archery was effective on not only small game, but large game as well, archery once again began to take on a new life in America.

Many methods that Ishi taught Dr. Pope are still used today by archers in small-scale societies. From the 1920s, professional engineers took an interest in archery, previously the exclusive field of Traditional Craft Experts. This led to the commercial development of new forms of bows including the modern recurve. The compound bow was invented in 1966 by Wilbur Allen of Missouri. These modern bows with their superior technology and amazing accuracy have increasingly become the bow of choice in modern Western archery. As of yet the compound has not been accepted for use by the Olympic Committee.

Traditional bows (recurves and longbows), although the origin of the craft and the sport, have now become the minority. In the 1980s, longing to return to their roots, the skills of traditional archery were revived by American enthusiasts and is again beginning a resurgence across the country.
