

WASTE SORTING guidelines

Waste sorting is an essential part of sustainable development. We encourage all users of our premises to do their bit for the environment by sorting waste correctly. Please note that this is a general guideline. If your property has a more specific sorting policy, adhere to it accordingly.

Biowaste

- Food waste and spoiled food
- Peelings of fruit, vegetables and eggs
- Coffee and tea grounds with filters, tea bags
- Wilted flowers and parts of plants
- Household paper, napkins and handkerchiefs



Paper

- Newspapers and magazines, advertisements
- Writing and copying paper, white drawing and notepaper
- Envelopes (including window envelopes)
- Telephone and product catalogues
- Postcards



Staples do not need to be removed.

Cardboard

- Cardboard, corrugated board and kraft paper
- Carton packaging for liquids
- Carton food packaging
- Egg cartons
- Carton multipacks for beverages
- Cardboard disposable containers
- Toilet and kitchen paper tubes
- Paper bags and sacks
- Wrapping papers, such as copier paper wrappers



Metal

- Cans and non-refillable beverage cans
- Metal lids and caps
- Aluminium foils and liners
- Metal coffee capsules
- Empty and dry paint cans
- Empty aerosol cans
- Pots, pans and utensils



Plastic

- Empty plastic food packaging, such as yoghurt pots
- Plastic bottles and cans without a deposit
- Plastic packaging fillers and polystyrene
- Plastic bags and wraps
- Empty plastic detergent bottles



Glass

- Glass bottles without deposit
- Glass jars



Remove caps and lids. Do not put any other glass, such as glass containers or drinking glasses, in the glass sorting.

Energy waste

- Non-recyclable plastic products (not PVC)
- Gift wrapping paper and plasticised paper
- Foamed plastic, soiled paper and cardboard, paper towels
- Clean and treated wood



Mixed waste

- Plastic items that are not suitable for recycling, such as dirty food packaging
- Plastic envelopes, markers and ballpoint pens
- Mirror glass, porcelain and ceramics
- Hygiene products such as nappies, sanitary towels and masks
- Vacuum cleaner bags
- Padded textiles



Hazardous waste

(formerly problem waste)

Take hazardous materials and electrical appliances to their own sorting points. Hazardous waste includes:

- Energy-saving light bulbs and other fluorescent tubes
- Solvents
- Batteries and small batteries (remember to tape the poles)

- Medicines, needles and syringes (only available in pharmacies)
- Alkaline detergents and cleaning products
- Pesticides and disinfectants
- Mercury-containing thermometers
