

ICE-DYED TOP

Fabric dyeing is like watching magic happen before your eyes! There are many different types of fabric dyeing, such as batik or tie dye. Ice dyeing is an easy way to create shapes on fabric.

Essentials

2 Cotton top

Draining rack

Tray or pan

Plastic gloves

Plastic spoons

Powdered fabric dye

The powdered dye

sinks onto the top as the ice melts.

Leave the ice to melt Leave your top for 6-8 hours until the ice is completely melted. Put on plastic gloves before taking the top out of the tray. Using cold water, rinse the top in the sink until the water is clear.



Make sure the dye and the fabric you use work together. If your top is 100 per cent cotton, use a dye for natural fabrics. Synthetic (man-made) fabrics need special dyes. The finished result!

Be careful when

(on its own). Leave it to dry and enjoy your new top! Next time, try mixing the powdered dyes together before sprinkling them on and see what colours you can create.

Wet your top and scrunch it up

Place your top on the rack inside the tray. Cover it with lots of ice. Put on plastic gloves and use a spoon to sprinkle dye on the ice. The more you use, the stronger the

colours will be.

Use plastic spoons to carefully sprinkle colours onto the ice.
